#### 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

#### 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Bharatpur, the Eastern gateway of Rajasthan, bordered by states of Haryana & U.P, has also been declared a part of Delhi NCR. It is expanding its wings to educate its women in holistic manner. Our college, Rameshwari Devi Girls College, Bharatpur is the first college developed exclusively for women studies in Bharatpur district. It has been established since 1971 with introduction of seven courses in Faculty of Arts which later on extended up to twelve subjects at Undergraduate level followed by introduction of Commerce faculty in 1977-78, which was followed by Science faculty in 1986-87. Later, Post graduation classes of Sanskrit & Sociology were introduced in 1994-95 whereas in 2009-10 PG- Hindi got incepted.

**The objective** to open this college was to promote girl education by the Rajasthan government.

This college offers free education to the girl students as per the government norms.

Rameshwari Devi Girls College offers diverse programs in 20 departments belonging to three faculties -Science, Arts and Commerce

Our college has very appreciable records in sports and academics.

- In 2016-2017, **Ms. Ritvi Singh,** a Math's student solved a mathematical conjecture which, according to Guinness Book of World Records, could not be solved earlier. The solution of this Mathematical Goldbach's Conjecture is published in Journal of Mathematics, **International Organization of Scientific Research (IOSR) Volume 12, issue 6, version.1, Nov-Dec 2016, pp-113-117.** For her work she was felicitated by the District Magistrate on recommendation of CM (on celebration of completing 3 years of governance.)
- Ms Prachi Singh obtained Gold Medal in world Archery Championship in 5th youth Commonwealth Games in 2015. She was felicitated by the then CM of Rajasthan for winning gold in Recurred Individual Olympic round. To add, Prachi also secured "7th place" in Archery women's Recurred Team: 29th summer Universidad 19-30 Aug 2017. In 2018, July 8-13 event of Recurve women Division in Asia cup World Ranking Archery Tournament, she bagged Bronze medal.
- Priyanka Sharma received "certificate of Participation for Asia cup women softball held at Jakarta, Indonesia.
- NSS Cadet Ms. Shivani Singh received the Gold Medal for Best Cadet during National Integration Camp (NIC) in 2016-17.

#### **Institutional Strength**

- Well qualified faculty.
- Despite many challenges, the girls are doing fairly well in Games & Sports. (Archery & Softball at International level)
- Diversity of students from all section of society.
- Enriching cultural pursuits.
- State level awards in extension activities to the NSS Officers.

#### **Institutional Weakness**

- Teacher student ratio, 50% posts are falling vacant.
- Building area not sufficient.
- Scarcity of playground.
- Unavailability of girl's hostel.

#### **Institutional Opportunity**

- Many programs pertaining to skill development are run.
- Safe and conducive atmosphere for all round development.

#### **Institutional Challenge**

- In spite of low pupil-teacher ratio, the examination results are fairly high due to committed faculties.
- The location of college building falls in the preview of limits of Archaeological Survey of India, restricting infrastructural development.
- Fairly low number of chances for campus placement.

#### 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

#### **Curricular Aspects**

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The college is affiliated to Maharaja Surajmal Brij University, Bharatpur, Rajasthan started in 2014, and its first examinations were conducted in 2016. Earlier the college was affiliated to University of Rajasthan, Jaipur.

The college offers B.A, B.Sc. and B.Com. Programmes at UG level & PG in Sociology, Hindi and Sanskrit.

Some of the teaching faculty members are engaged in research and are working as research supervisors in the affiliating university and other universities.

Faculty members hold the positions as members and conveners of Board of Management, Academic Council and Board of Studies of the MSB University. They are involved in designing of the curricula at the university level. Also they bear the responsibilities of subject experts and research supervisors of the affiliating university.

Affliating University appoint the faculties as members of different committees e.g as dean student welfare, convener of Internal Complaint Committee of University.

Faculties also take part in evaluation process of theory and practical examinations of the university. They also act as the paper setters of the university examinations.

The college follows the curriculum of the affiliating university and other programmes as per Government of Rajasthan.

The Institution follows the unified academic calendar as issued by the Commissionerate of College Education for all the colleges of state. Accordingly, the college design its own academic calendar to be followed by all the faculties and office staff to perform activities, arrange meetings.

College offers 64 combinations out of 20 subjects in Bachelor of Arts Program to choose as a combination of three subjects at the time of admission. The second & third year of Economics, Third year in ABST and EAFM and first year of PG Sociology provides optional papers as prescribed in the curriculum.

Subjects like Hindi, Environmental Science include the study of issues related to gender sensitization environmental awareness, Professional Ethics and Human Values which are also inculcated in students through NSS, Women Cell, Eco Club activities through out the session.

Institution makes efforts to encourage the students to enhance their knowledge through field study and Project works. Feedback is collected from students, Parents and Alumini

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The college admits students on percentile/percentage basis through a centralized online admission process governed by Commissionerate of College Education. The reservation policy of the state government is also taken into consideration while admitting the students. The admission policy and procedure is totally transparent. An admission policy is announced every year by the Govt. of Rajasthan and all colleges are adhered to it.

Traditional (chalk and duster method) and ICT driven teaching methods are in vogue for teaching. E-contents are also provided to the students through video lectures on Mentor's and college's You Tube channels and PDF notes on WhatsApp groups created by Mentors. The teaching is also supported with departmental field trips, charts, models and practical classes. The students are evaluated through annual examination (end of the year) & terminal and monthly tests.

All faculty positions who are working are permanent. There are 59 sanctioned posts for 20 subject departments out of which only 32 are filled. Among the faculties 22 are Ph.D , 3 are M.Phil and 7 are Post Graduates.4 members have already been registerd.

Performance of teachers is evaluated through ACRs on the basis of university result, and self appraisal on academics and participation in curricular activities within the college and outside the college.

College has appointed Mentors for every class. A group of students have been allotted to each mentor.

As a part of curriculum, students perform Practical in resoective science laboratories and some of Arts labs like Home Science, Music, Drawing & Painting and Psychology.

#### Research, Innovations and Extension

- In addition to classroom teaching, the faculties are also involved in carrying out research activities and have freedom to participate in conferences, seminars and workshops and share their research findings. The permission is granted by the Principal within the Rajasthan state. Commissionerate, College Education grants permission to forwarded applications for necessary action when events are held out of state.
- The Affiliating University appoints the research supervisors on UGC guidelines. The college has a research committee to take care of the proposals submitted for financial assistance to the agencies like UGC, DST, etc. The research scholar's database is maintained and their relevant papers are forwarded after proper scrutiny.
- 10 Faculty Members are working as research supervisors of the Affiliating University, despite of teaching Undergraduate classes only at the institution.
- However, our college has been marked as Research Centre in three Post Graduate Departments viz. Sanskrit, Sociology and Hindi from the session 2021-22.
- Many of the teachers have Authored books or have chapters in books, published papers in renowned Journals, also have Citations
- Students are regularly mentored for academic and co-curricular activities like seminars, quiz programs, paper presentations, debates, essay writing, models and chart presentations, etc through the respective Faculty Association activities.
- Sensitized for gender indiscrimination through different activities under the aegis of Women Cell and NSS.
- The college has four NSS units. The teaching faculties bear the responsibilities of Program Officers of individual unit as an additional charge for at least three Financial years.
- The extension activities taken up by these NSS units are in the areas of awareness programs on Health and Hygiene, AIDS concerns, Medical camps, Blood donation camps and Environmental awareness.
- The college collaborates with NGOs and GOs for organizing activities in these areas.
- College Magazine Prerna provides a suitable platform for studwnts to showcase their writing and thinking skills and creative mindset.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

College has Principal, Vice Principal Chambers, Administrative office, Staff room, five Science Departments, two ICT Laboratories, seventeen classrooms and two seminar halls and one PG departments in the main building. The second campus named Laxmi Rani Mahal, a heritage building is housing the Library, Home science, and Drawing & Painting, Music, Psychology, two PG and Sports departments. College has the well qualified teaching faculty.

Out of total 2 Crores received as RUSA Grant, five rooms are newly constructed (Construction grant). One Room is under construction

Facilities such as CCTV Surveillance, RO Plant, Generators of 30 KW and 20 KW each in both the buildings, Water Coolers, Wheel chairs & Ramp facilities for Physically Challenged (Divyangjan), Fire Extinguishers (5 cylinders of 75kg. Capacity each) are available in the campus.

A lease line connection of 8 Mbps is available and at least one computer is linked to internet facility in all departments.

College has fully automated Library, rich in Text and Reference books, Journals, newspapers and magazines with two Reading Rooms. Inflibnet facility is also available.

Sports facilities like Basketball ground, Badminton court, Table Tennis table, Gym equipments, Mattresses for Wrestling and Judo are available. The college is recognized state champion in many sports. Girl students hailing from rural areas are flying high/vibrantly.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

College being a government organization follows all the government implemented schemes for the promotion of the economically and socially weaker section. Since a large number of girls hail from the adjoining rural areas, a number of flagship schemes of Government get implied for them.

Government of Rajasthan provides:

- i. Free basic education for girl child(No tution Fee).
- ii. Scooties to the girls of MBC and General category girls (Limited to 50 in Number with top to down percentage).
- iii. Scholarships to SC, ST, OBC and girl students of Economically Weaker Sections (EWS)- General category.

Along with the regular curriculum teachers prepare the students for competitive exams as well (through extra classes).

There is a grievance Redressal cell for addressing any disputes but since due discipline is being maintained by

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the students, though no serious issues have been reported so far.

The students of this college perform very well in competitive exams of RPSC (School and College teaching and non teaching), Journalism, Entrepreneurship, defense, Judiciary, Administration, etc

The Sports girls and Athletes capture Gold, Silver and Bronze medals in various Inter university games and Athletic activities at State, National and International level.

College always works in the direction of the overall development of the student. To accomplish this, along with the regular curriculum, various programs regarding Women Empowerment, National Unity, Ethics, Cultural Exchange under cultural and literary activities, NSS, Women cell, YDC, Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat Scheme, are organized through related committees. Student union, NSS cadets and Rangers of the college actively take part in blood donations, Shram Dan and other social services.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

College makes full efforts to achieve its visionary goals under guidance of Head of the Department and Faculty members. The organizational culture of imparting education with moral values and maximum participation is aimed to achieve its set mission and goals. Strategy Development and Deployment is gained through number of activities in and off campus.

Our college practices decentralization and participative management in all areas. Teachers are allotted different committees to perform the tasks and activities involving students.

College is administered by Government of Rajasthan and all information is exchanged online. Employees have their own SSO ID's. Through their personal log in, all informations like IPR, ACR resolved from Government information portal.

College has fully transparent Online Accounting System. Salary Bills are generated through Pay manager. Procurements are done through SPP Portal, for payments to agencies, we are using PFMS

The Faculty Empowers Student Admission and support by implementing merit based centralized and transparent online admission system governed by the Commissionerate of the College Education.

Process of filling the examination forms has also been made online by the University.

Internal Quality of the Institution is managed by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) by accomplishing the objectives of holistic development of students and preparing them for global competitiveness.

The planning procedures and implementation of IQAC initiatives in the area of teaching learning is reflected in the feedback given by students, parents, teachers, alumni, etc. They render their advice on all aspects related to development of the college. Constructive feedback is provided by the parents in Parent Teacher Association (PTA).

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The college meets its responsibility & is proactive in being responsive to its environmental challenges and burning issues through various active platforms and functioning.

The core values of truthfulness, honesty, mutual understanding, cooperation, righteousness carried from homes, schools are further promoted through various activities at college. Such values are supported by programs and extracurricular activities highlighting moral/ethical values of our national leaders through their Birth Anniversary celebrations or contributions such as blood donation, collection for army day celebrations.

The Institute ensures that Vision and Mission, in every aspect, gets reflected in the personality of the outgoing students.

Our institution take full measures regarding environmental awareness by discouraging use of single use plastics and thermoplastic items for food & beverages purposes.

Solid waste in the form of leaves, grass, clipping twigs, paper scrapping etc are collected from various department and corners of college and dumped into a big pit for compost development

The college has facilities to provide barrier free environment to Disabled (special ability) or Divyang students.

#### Institutional distinctiveness

The Institution indistinctively provides equal opportunities to all girl students irrespective of caste and creed. Girl education is promoted and empowered through Extra Curricular activities enforcing women literacy, national unity ethics, cultural and literacy exchange, sensitization issues. This college is known for its unique work culture, ethics, environment friendly practices and powerful Judo and Wrestlers of Brij Belt. Social responsibility is contributed through participation via NSS and Ranger activities. Institution also motivates girls for their legal, electoral, human rights.

# The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The college is affiliated to Maharaja Surajmal Brij University Bharatpur. Students are assessed through annual examination conducted by the affiliated University. Besides regular courses the demands brought by the students are discussed with college development committee and various other academic committees before the commencement of any programme. Career oriented programmes have been added by the Institute.

- Students are classified as slow and advanced learners on basis of scores of their last qualifying examination and introductory classes and interrogations with them in classes.
- All students are provided counselling and mentoring by the faculty members.
- Each faculty member is assigned with a group of students belonging to their subjects.
- The performance is monitored regularly and progress in terms of attendance and academic performance is observed, reports are also shared with the seniormost member of the subject to solve related issues.
- Apart from academic performance, behavioural traits—such as behaviour to peer group, dressup sense, overall personality, proper grooming is also taken care of.
- Regularity and other discipline related issues are also tackled by the faculty counsellors.
- Mentors offer advice and guidance in academic matters.
- They assist the students in finding college resources such as library and e-resources, participating in extra-curricular activities, preparing for seminars, notes for certain subjects etc.
- They assist students in choosing course, external project also. Mentors also inform the students for perceptions about departmental culture and related issue.
- The teaching-learning modalities of the institution are rendered to be relevant for the learner group.
- E-content monitoring committee and Mentors are available round the clock on each calendar day for any query and help seeked by any student.CCE keep abreast of IT and imparts training to faculties and students for betterment of learning.

#### Special programmes run by college for slow learner students.

- Extra classes are taken by the subject teacher for slow learners'.
- The teacher pays special attention & helps such students in each and every possible way.
- Mentoring services are also provided with an emphasis on professional and personal problems, discussing issues related to student.
- Mentors of students working for anti ragging committee also give special attention to slow learners in general, so that they may not develop inferiority complex.

#### Special programmes are run by college for advanced learner students

- Through hawk's eyes of teacher, advanced learning picked and required training session for student's choice of career is provided.
- Mentors also provide counseling to advance learner for their future prospects so that they can prepare themselves for their career.
- Some also avail opportunities to find place in summer projects and paper reading at seminar/conferences along with their guides
- .Advanced students are also allowed and sent for inter college activities and competitions within district, or with parents concent to other districts and states.

- The College runs various activities under the banner of Faculty association, Eco Club, NSS, YDC, Women cell, Red Ribbon Club where direct interaction among students and society occurs.
- Enhancing the body language is a ladies charm. For this, occasionally, Beauty Self-Grooming training courses by the respective service providers are organized by the institute which catch maximum participation.
- Yoga, Aerobics, sports are conducted from time to time to make students active and physically fit.

## Internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Since this college is regulated by the Government of Rajasthan, the academic calendar is prepared at the level of Commissionerate, College Education Rajasthan, (CCE) Jaipur. All government Colleges of Rajasthan need to strictly adhere to the academic calendar provided by CCE. Our college is affiliated to Maharaja Surajmal Brij University, Bharatpur, which schedules the examination framework for annual examination. However, internal assessment of students is done at college level and dates forassessments, tests, pre-finals are scheduled by internal assessment committee members.

- Each department follows a module of effective internal assessment in form of class tests, home assignments, question in form of multiple choice/ Quiz formats etc.
- Internal tests are generally scheduled according to the dates mentioned in the calendar of CCE or at the ending date of month. Class Tests are conducted by faculty members which tests the syllabus covered till the organizing date of the paper.
- Coordinator of every faculty is assigned the job of preparing the test time table and monitoring of the test process.
- The Senior Most member of the respective subjects reviews the question paper to ensure its qualitative standard and transparency. Questions are framed as per the pattern and the syllabus prescribed by the university.
- Lesson plans are framed by every faculty member keeping provided by passed test out come in mind of classes mentioned in the calendar of events for effective and timely coverage of syllabus.
- Random check for Internal questions paper are conducted by Principal, senior most members and IQAC as well.
- Students are given set of instructions to follow and no unfair means is allowed.
- Transparency of evaluation and examination is maintained and test results with required improvement are conveyed to students and their answer sheets are return back.
- Occasionally some surprise test/quizzes & seminars are organized

- For convenience of students and effective time management the dates of examinations are displayed on notice board and also in whatsapp groups by the mentors and college examination committee.
- Students give their class tests in their regular class schedule time and answer sheets are examined by teachers and returned back to the students with required suggestion/ improvements discussed and written on test paper.
- Results of Internal Examination, class test, home assignments and quizzes are shown to students and their grievances solved by teachers & thereby referred if required to a committee working actively to sort out student grievances related to internal examinations, that comprises of Principal and Senior members of faculty.
- During 2019-20, due to Covid -19, teachers have made a shift to Google quizzes / pictures / pdf notes. Students have become more confident sharing their personal issues related to exams and also grievances.

- Generally, student face the problem of downloading admit card/hall ticket and finding name missing from lists of examinees.
- These problems are solved at college level and if when required the affiliating University is contacted by the examination committee.

#### 3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

#### **Response:**

The College has built uniqueness in organizing programs, focusing on the holistic development of girls, environment, gender related issues, taking social responsibilities and participation for creation of healthy, literate and gender unbiased society.

'Art of living' foundation conduct Yoga classes from time to time. Students visit 'Apna Ghar Ashram' (an NGO serving India's poor, deprived and helpless persons) quite regularly. They learn to take care of the elderly and sick ones, motivate them to live a joyous life and keep their surroundings clean. Adopted societies like Anah, Shri Nagar, Nagla Jheelra, Rampura, were visited. People were made awared about various schemes of state and central government. Various Street Plays, Dance Dramas, Songs, Folk songs are performed to spread awareness against anti social issues like dowry system, child marriage, ill effects of alcohol and drugs addiction, importance of cleanliness, demonetization, cashless and Bhamashah schemes, cleanliness drive was also conducted in these village time to time. Women in rural background are made awared about personal health and hygiene. Student distributed sanitary napkins to the women and girls in the society and made them learnt its use, benefits.

Students actively participate for environment protection by planting in college campus adopted villages and society, collecting single use plastic and thermocol items around their surroundings, Keoladev National Park. They distributed cloth bags in market to discourage the use of polythenes.

HIV society of Bharatpur made the rural people acquainted with HIV. Its impact on the body and the preventive measures. NSS volunteers and officials taught kids in Jeevan Niraman Sansthan, an orphanage, they also motivated them to participate in sports and extra-curricular activities.

NSS volunteers interact with women and children in the adopted villages and societies.

Our rangers distributed masks during the Covid 19 pandemic.

Students participate in Blood donation camps regularly by donating blood, they make resolutions to donate blood as and when required.

In the session 2020-21, Students of UG first year performed extension activities during the session under the newly added compulsory subject, Anandam.

College prospectus has defined the norms for selection of all portfolios in various Faculty Associations. The students with highest marks in the last qualified classes are nominated for the executive posts inrespective faculties.

Active student participation is observed through Faculty Associations. The Executive councils of Arts, Science and Commerce, students are nominated for the posts of President, Vice President and General Secretary and Joint Secretary. The top position holders in each stream is selected for these posts. This executive council acts as mediator between college administration and students. These associations offer the students, the chance to perform academic activities in their respective Science, Arts or Commerce associations. This helps in enhancing their knowledge and Skills through academic activities like Chart and Model making competitions, Quiz and various competitions like Rangoli, Story Writing ,Slogan writing, Greeting, Card making, Group Discussions etc. Extension lectures by Guest Speakers are also arranged under these Association activities.

Administrative support of students, their representation and engagement in extra-curricular activities in college is also a part of their Grooming. Students of the college are involved as representatives in the Women Harassment Prevention Committee. Student representatives are also nominated in the Women's Cell and Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti.

#### Strategic plan of Institution for conduction of Hassle free examination:

The college has constituted an examination cell headed by coordinator of examination who is a senior faculty member nominated by the Principal.

• Centre Superintendent (CS) is the Principal of the college/ vice Principal/ the senior most faculty.

The **examination coordinator** along with other cell members distributes various works related to examination. **Work of Coordinator is most specified** 

- Appointment of **Assistant CS / Additional CS/ Flying Squads/ Supervisors/ invigilator** is made by the coordinator examination six days before the commencement of examination.
- An **office assistant** carries out the work related to internal process of Examination which includes preparation of invigilators list, notices, seating arrangement, exam hall/rooms facilities.
- **Allotment of subordinates** for cleanliness in rooms/halls/labs/departments, toilets and general ambience.
- **Invigilators** such as faculties/ lab assistants / Govt. school teachers
- According to the examinee number and in proportion to the requirements of the examination day and time, assigned number of question papers are taken out from sealed packets and arranged by coordinator.
- He / She then disburse them for distribution in required quantity to the invigilators.
- Invigilators enter the examination room / hall at least 15 minutes before the start of examination, checks the admit card of the students, guides for correct seat, distributes answer books and question papers. The invigilator check entries done by examinee and verifies signature on the attendance proforma, mark ABSENT for the students who do not turn up and maintain the attendance record of examination room/ hall.
- Vigilance is maintained by frequent moving and giving alerts in the examination hall/room.
- Reported case of Unfair means used by students are sent to university for further necessary action by the Grievance committee at University.
- Answer books are collected by invigilator and handed over to Exam cell .Collected bundle of answer books from office in-charge are received by university for assessment.

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etc. Therefore college has identified two examples of institutional reviews and implementation of teaching learning reforms facilitated by IQAC.

### **Teaching learning & evaluation**

All possible ways to improve students' learning is practiced by all teachers and mentors

### The Curriculum is constantly reviewed, received and updated.

A number of faculty members are part of board of studies in MSBU, Bharatpur who interacts with academicians of other universities and try to implement syllabus updating. The suggestion of the board of studies will be taken up by higher bodies such as academic council where some faculty members are associated with. A number of teaching community engaged in orientation, refresher programme and enrich oneself as well provide their suggestion to board of studies.

**Besides classroom teaching and curriculum** the college also offers activities and programme that compliment teaching and learning experiences. It is mandatory for students seeking admission at the first year level to opt for any of the extracurricular activity offer by the college. Extracurricular activities are a regular feature in the college and are conduct by YDC, Women cell, NSS, NCC, Ranger, Rovers etc.

Structure and methodologies of operation

The planning procedures and implementation of IQAC initiatives in the area of teaching learning is reflected in the feedback given by students, parents, teachers, alumnus etc. They render there advice on all aspects related to development the college. Constructive feedback is provided by parents in Parent Teacher Association.

**Learning outcomes** are displayed on the college website and reviewed by IQAC. The same is also discussed with the in charges of various departments and mentors.

The Student Advisory Bureau of the college provides academic, personal, psychosocial guidance and counselling to the students.

The learning process of student is facilitated by congenial academic environment prevalent in the college campus. There is a good library with a separate section of books meant for preparation of competitive examinations. The ICT lab is well equipped. ### **Best practice 1**

### Title of the practice

MINIMISING SINGLE USE PLASTIC : BAN ON PLASTIC CARRY BAGS, THERMOCOL CUPS AND SECTIONED PLATES IN COLLEGE PREMISES

### Objective of the practice

- To BEAUTIFY & GLORIFY the college by freeing it from the littering plastic materials.
- To raise awareness amongst students and stakeholders through providing information via poster/essay writing competitions speeches, workshops, discussions, mass participation rendering to institution's social responsibility.
- Awaking students and society for concern towards stray animals who accidentally gulp down plastic carry bags thrown by layman in garbage and get prone to throat chokes.
- To provide protection and improvement in environment quality as burning of plastics diffuses harmful & toxic gases.

### The context

The factual and conceptual information on plastics is indispensable for youths. Following contextual features or challenging issues were before us in designing and implementing the practice of ban on plastic thermocol cups & polythene bags.

- Inculcating values, moral responsibility and judicious environmental use culture among students and stakeholders.
- Plastic littering in form of empty bottles, thermocol cups and polythene bags gives bad ambience to college setup and sense of irresponsible citizens.
- Mortality in cattle and stray animals due to choking hazards of plastic along with garbage.
- Single use carry bags and plastic tea cups are made from non-renewable resources such as polypropylene & their extraction and production causes greenhouse gases emission which contributes to climate change.
- Recycling of plastics is very costly process.
- Plastics are oncogenic: causes blood cancer and other incurable diseases in human beings.

### The Practice

- College endeavors sensitization programs of students, staff, society and stakeholders regarding enactment and publicizing this practice for minimizing use of plastic in day to day life through various means that include mouth to mouth canvassing, awakening through contests, seminars, workshops etc. Help from (SAB, YDC, NSS and NGO) is also sought in this regard
- College canteen is not allowed to use plastic cups. It is banned at college level and a moderate

amount of fine is imposed when violation of rule is observed even after few warnings by college administration.

- College uses all possible resources to materialize the practice towards success. College Principal
  and staff members, NSS volunteers, Ranger volunteers, student members of Eco club collectively
  work in direction of popularizing this practice of college at college premises. Efforts for promoting
  and caring for environmental health is popularized even to adopted villages of NSS Units and all
  persons directly or indirectly related to college.
- A viable Eco Club functions in the college which makes college environment eco friendly. For this purpose, the club organizes the seminars and co-curricular activities to educate on acts such as Environment (Protection) Act, 1986 and aware the students about the harmful effects of plastic to human and wild life. Reports regarding activities are shared as various platforms.
- College shows Multi sector involvement with local administration especially Municipal Corporation, Keoladeo National Park to keep their premises free from single use plastics
- This group of human resources of college also volunteered to stitch cloth bags and distribute amongst class fellows within college, faculties of college, and amongst other stakeholders. Some cloth bag material was collected from college faculties & some was collected by volunteers on their own .Some students and home science department volunteered stitching though Maximum bags were supplied by volunteers of NSS & Eco-Club.

Direct interactions were held with public at various marketplaces of Bharatpur (such as Bijlighar Chauraha, Kanni Gurjar Chauraha etc.) in 2018, 22-25 January with an intention of exercising social responsibility of college for awareness towards beautification and protection of nature. The principal of college Dr. A.K. Bansal addressed laymen, shopkeepers, kids and all passersby regarding minimizing usage of plastics in their everyday life. Students from NSS, & Eco Club distributed cloth bags in general public with an appeal for non-use of plastic bags for groceries and to use cloth bags as alternatives for plastic carry bags.

### **Evidence of success**

- Instead of polythene bags, paper/cloth bags are used in the Institute by staff and students Monitoring is done at college level by a committee. This committee keeps total check on the practice successfully.
- Now tea is provided in Kulhad (Earthen pots) and coffee in ceramic cups or best quality paper cups in college canteen of our institution.
- Staff uses kullads and leaf made Dona- Pattals in different functions organised by Staff Club thus contributing its bit in the drive against single use plastics
- The college campus is single use plastic free since 2010 College is free from littering plastic carry bags.
- One faculty member has been awarded by local administration for the effective functioning of this practice.
- This practice has prompted other colleges to replicate this best practice in their own campus.

### **Problem encountered and Resources Required**

• Some resistance to this practice was raised by few non teaching staff members and students and canteen staff who were initially habitual of plastic use, but after some time they understood the long term positive effect of this practice. This group has now taken up this practice and happily follows

it and contributes to college campaign of this practice in routine.

• No funding agency is supporting financially in sustaining this practice.

### **Notes**

Plastic is a non-biodegradable as well as harmful material. Plastic material on the land is a threat to plants and animals as well as humans. Plastic releases harmful chemicals into the surrounding soil, which can then seep into the ground water or other water sources and also the ecosystem. Toxic chemicals released from plastic enter the body and can cause cancers, birth defects, impaired immunity, endocrine disruption and other diseases. Plastics also pollute the groundwater, poison the food chain and threaten the wildlife. Plastics are very slow to degrade. We the students and staffs must avoid using plastic carry bags and instead carry our own cloth bag or some bio degradable bag with us while going for shopping and say no to plastic bags.

### Best practice 2

### Title of the Practice

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT THROUGH MAKING COMPOST IN COMPOST PITS WITHIN COLLEGE CAMPUS

### Objective of the practice

- To Recycle the organic waste of the campus through compost pit method for good quality manurecompost
- To aware students of campus and our stakeholders about benefits of compost as natural fertilizer and its role in plantation for environment sustainability.
- To awaken students and stakeholders about cleaning and making pollution free campus and getting rid of waste. Compost from bio-waste from canteen and organic waste within campus area is of good quality and campus is rendered pollution free. This college practice would help healthy growth of plants leading to healthy green ambience.

### The Context

- Within the college, instances of solid waste making nuisance was observed. In order to manage solid wastes such as paper wastes, clippings, branch twigs, chalk-dust and such matter an effort to manage waste for best use was identified. Hence practice of compost making within college premises made its way.
- Plants require nutrition for growth, that's why fertilizers are applied to them. Fertilizers provide plants with essential nutrients, so that they grow healthy, bigger and faster. Compost is organic

matter that has been decomposed in a process called composting. It is used, in gardens, landscaping, horticulture, urban agriculture and organic farming. The compost itself is beneficial for the land in many ways, including as a soil conditioner, a fertilizer, addition of vital humus and as a natural pesticide for soil.

• Students can learn and make it a practice at their homes as well.

### The Practice

Nowadays, using **compost** as a substitute to chemical fertilizer has become a global consensus. Composting is a form of waste disposal where organic waste decomposes naturally under oxygen-rich conditions. A mass of rotted organic matter made from waste is called compost. Compost is rich in nutrients and can be used for plantation projects taken up all the year round. Compost acts as a soil conditioner as well.

The application of compost could promote soil productivity and also helps in waste disposal in an environment friendly way.

In the educational institutes, usually, organic wastes like dried leaves, grass, clippings of paper and other sorts, etc. are observed regularly and these are either thrown away or burnt to ashes. But in our institute this waste is used in making useful compost using these methods:

### 1. Open Compost Pit:

The Institute has an open compost pit in which the organic waste material of campus, like greens and browns are dumped regularly. It is moistened regularly for the transformation into compost. Slowly the organic material decomposes into humus like material known as compost. This compost is a good booster for the growth of plants in flower pots.

2. Composting in Waste Over-head Water Tanks: It was observed that the time consumed for filling the open compost pit was too much and also it contained some surrounding sand, when extracted, which effected it's quality.

Considering this point, another innovative method was implemented. The waste plastic 500 litre overhead water tanks were cut open from upper side and these were used as Compost Bins. For this, first of all, some garden soil was spread on it's bottom and then the organic waste from institute premises was dumped into it. It was moistened from time to time. When it was completely filled, a thin layer of garden soil was spread over it. After few months, it was transformed into useful compost. In this method, Waste plastic overhead water tanks were also reused.

In addition to **disposal of waste**, the process of composting also creates a usable product. The final compost, humus, is nutrient-rich and it is used to amend poor soils and fertilize flower pots and garden, instead of using chemical fertilizers. The added compost also helps soil retain water and therefore can improve growing conditions.

By these methods of composting, the students of this institute are learning the concepts of **Eco-friendly Practices**, **Composting**, **Reuse of Plastic Waste etc.** 

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### Evidence of success: This practice started in session 2019-20

## Now, college has started making use of compost in plants within its premises.

- Yard waste, such as grass clippings and leaves, can also be used for composting. When these items are placed in a pile, have water added to them and are turned to increase oxygen levels, the perfect environment is created for microbial organisms to naturally break down the organic materials.
- Benefits of Compost: It enriches soil, helps to retain moisture and suppress plant diseases and pests. It reduces the need for chemicals fertilizers. However, it is now an established fact that applying too much chemical fertilizers can be a problem to soil, environment and living beings.
- Compost encourages the production of beneficial bacteria and fungi that break down organic matter to create humus, a rich nutrient-filled material

### **Problem encountered and Resources Required**

Shortage of human resourses within institution provide less hands to achieve handsome results.

### **Notes**

• This is environment friendly practice. Besides college, it can be easily taken up massively by other institutes and departments with pinch of contribution to environmental sustainability measures.

Compost reduces methane emissions from landfills and lowers carbon footprint. Compost is useful for erosion control, land and stream reclamation, wetland construction, and as landfill cover.

- Scholarships to SC, ST, OBC and General category girl students of EWS.
- Udaan Yojana- helpsto improve health amd hygiene conditions of girls through sanitary napkin distribution sheme.
- All the faculty members bear their moral responsibility to cater the girl students with values like discipline, moral values, respect to teachers & fellow students & mutual coordination.
