2.2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile:	 Admission is duly done through online. The cut off percentage for admissions at the entry level is 45%, 48% and 55% marks for various courses. The college strictly follows the reservation policy as per Government rules.
2.2.2 Catering to Student Diversity:	 The College admits SC, ST, OBC and minority students in each of the faculty as per Government Rules. Remedial classes for SC/ST/OBC students in different subjects are conducted.
2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:	 College follows a proactive teaching method in traditional way. Medium of instruction is primarily Hindi. Use of technology needs to be enhanced.
2.2.4 Teacher Quality:	 Out of total of 84 teachers (permanent, 78 and temporary, 06) 53 teachers are Ph.D., 11 M.Phil degree holders and remaining 20 are PG degree holders. Teachers are recruited by the Government of Rajasthan as per guidelines of UGC. Teachers are encouraged to participate in Seminars and Conferences to update their current knowledge of the subject.

2.2.6 Student performance and Learning out comes:	 Annual examination conducted. Reforms in examination process done as per University rules. Good pass out percentage of students with a few university rank holders. Students participate in inter collegiate games/sports and cultural activities, baging Gold Medals. The mechanism to monitor the learning outcome is needed.

2.3.1 Promotion of Research:	 Ten laboratories of the college are permitted by the University to do research work. Most of the teachers participated in refresher/ orientation courses. Budgetary support needed to promote research.
2.3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research:	 One major and eleven minor research projects yielded Rs. 38.62 lacks rupees in total during last five years. Teachers need to apply for funds from national level funding agencies. Further promotion of fund mobilizing initiative needed.
