Topic wise question banks are provided for all subjects. 4. Students are encouraged to solve previous years university exam questions papers. 5. The college regularly conducts, group discussions, seminars and guest lectures. 6. Poor performance due to frequent absenteeism is dealt by sending registered letters to the parents of such students.

The academic calendar is prepared by the commissionrate, College Education, Rajasthan, which is implemented effectively by the college. The college strongly trusts on in its functioning. The college has a well defined standard operating procedure to develop the academic teaching plans as per the calendar given by commissionrate. The activity calendar shows the start and end of each session stating various activities to be conducted. The internal evaluation schedule and the tentative schedule of external evaluation. Each course and that respective teacher of it has his/her own pattern of internal examination like practical, Seminar, presentations and projects etc. As per their teaching plans, each teacher takes a liberty to schedule their own internal subjects concurrent evaluation. Calendar immensely contributes to achieving this. The academic calendar helps as a source of information and planner for students, faculty, staff and other stakeholders of the college. It encompasses all the process of the college such as the student section, Adminstrature, academic, cocurricular and extra curricular activities. The classes usually commence by the first week of July. The syllabuses are completed every year sometimes by conducting extra classes even on Sundays.

The college has developed a rich infrastructure base for maintaining the quality of academic and other programs. There are 28 adequately ventilated and well equipped grand size rooms in this college. Separate rooms with all facilities are also available in the college for smooth conduction of NSS, NCC, YDC, Scout and Guide activities. Besides, a well equipped room for UGC activities is also there. The department of Chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Botany and Geography have their own separate room with all basic facilities for proper conduction of respective departmental activities. Department of Chemistry,

Zoology, Botany, Physics, Mathematics and English have well equipped laboratories. PG department of Chemistry is using modern teaching aids like LCD, Smart Boards and audio visualizes. The institution possesses its own spacious play ground for various indoor and outdoor games. Main funding source of the infrastructure development are the state government, UGC, Donors, Alumnis, MP and MLA led funds and college Vikas Samiti. Separate girls common room and girls hostel in the college is available to take care of the specific needs of girls students. Ramps for disabled students have been constructed at various places in the college Building. The institution has got a rich library with necessary computer facility. The library is accessible to the readers from 10:00 AM to 05.00 P.M. Spacious reading rooms are also available. The magazines and various newspapers remain available in reading room for the students. There is an effective mechanism for the maintenance of the infrastructure facilities. The institution has separate 34 seated girls hostel with all the facilities. A small well laid down garden with tree plantation and greenery in front of the college building contribute to the ambience of the surroundings. Portion of the fund received under RUSA Scheme has been utilized for upgradation and repairing of the existing laboratories and other existing infrastructure.

Institutional distinctiveness "No vehicle day" IntroductionThe atmosphere of the Earth is surrounded by different gases. Among these gases 99 percent part consists of non green house gases and only 1 percent is of green house gases. The definite proportion of green house gases is required for survival of life on this planet, because these gases maintain the Earth's average temperature, which is necessary for the flora and fauna on it. In the complete absence of these GHGs, there will be a great variation in the day and night temperature. According to the data of GISS (Goddard Institute of Space Studies) the global average temperature in the period 195180 was 140C but in 2017 the global average temperature has increased to 14.90C. The main reasons behind this drastic increase in global average temperature are anthropogenic activities

such as: (1) Overexploitation of fossil fuels indiscriminately like petrol, diesel, LPG and coal etc. (2) Deforestation (3) Industrialisation and Urbanisation (4) Unsustainable approach in practice (5) Lack of integrated and holistic approach in the development of science and technology (6) Thermal power stations In comparison to preindustrial era, the concentration of GHGs has increased manifold in the industrial era [CO2 (31), CH4 (151), N2O (17)]. Apart from these facts, there are 21 crore registered vehicles (four wheelers and two wheelers) plying on roads. The average consumption of fossil fuel per vehicle per day is 5litres. Thus total consumption of fossil fuel will be 105 crore litre per day in India and there are approximately 205 countries in the world, so we can assume how much the amount of total emitted GHG gases is liberating in the atmosphere globally. These gases are harmful for the human health and environment. 2.5 is contributed only by air transport. Side effectsThe increasing concentration of GHGs in the atmosphere causes global warming and the adverse effects of environmental pollution especially air pollution can be mentioned as follows (1) Human health (2) Agriculture (3) Water resources (4) Ecology of the hill areas (5) Forest (6) Coastal areas (7) Polar areas According to the recent report of 'Green Peace' organisation, out of 62 countries India's capital, New Delhi, stands at first position in air pollution. Out of top 15 most polluted cities in world 14 cities are from India. As per the recent report, released by SAFAR, the quality of air in most of metropolitan cities is severe (AQI greater than 400). Remedies -In above mentioned context of depleting environmental conditions, it is necessary to take following appropriate remedial steps timely (1) Collective efforts at global level (2) Individual efforts at local level (3) Intense plantation (4) Rational use of ACs (5) Promotion of public transportation for long distance travelling (6) Encouraging the use of bicycles and ebikes, for short distance travelling. In continuation of the above steps, SNKP Government has taken initiative to celebrate "No Vehicle Day" in the college campus every weekend. Under this initiative, fossil fuel based four wheelers and two wheelers are not allowed in the college
