Committees are constituted for the smooth functioning of various activities in college and allowed to function with full autonomy in their respective fields. The members of committees are working as per the module opted by them within the time frame given by the college. Co-curricular activities are being planned and organised by the committees which includes extensive activities, community services and academic pursuits. Student leaders are appointed to regulate and monitor the participation of their groups. Students are encouraged to plan and execute activities which enlighten the students about their duties towards the society. Pratiyogita Dakshata is a leading program of the Higher Education Department started in session 2018-19 for competitive examination. Government

recruits youth in many departments through examinations conducted by RPSC, UPSC, SSC, RSMSSB, IBPS, CBSE, RBSE and NTA. Through this program, students are provided basic knowledge of various topics by the college teachers, totally free of cost. The CCE appointed Dr. Jagrati Meena, faculty of the college as Nodal Officer for this program. Thereafter a Pratiyogita Dakshata committee was formed. The classes were conducted according to the time allotted and topics from different subjects were covered by the faculty members viz., Political Science, Sociology, History, Geography, Economics, General Science, Everyday Science, Environmental Science, Botany, Chemistry, Zoology, Hindi and English literature, etc. The lectures were taken in Smart classrooms. 559 students registered for Pratiyogita Dakshta Programme. RAS officer Smt. Krishna Shukla guided students about pattern of examination. 12th January is National youth day. It is celebrated to commemorate birthday of Swami Vivekanand. Functions were organized in college from 12th to 19th January 2019 as youth festival. During this festival speech on Swami Vivekanand by Dr. H.C. Jain, Principal Modi College, Kota delivered his speech to motivate youth through ideas of Swami Vivekanand. A lecture on Nasha mukti was delivered on 16th January 2019 by Dr. R.C. Sahni. Drug addiction, its symptoms and awareness about the topic was discussed with students. State convenor NSS Mr. Banay Singh addressed students on 13.01.2019 about NSS and its benefits. He discussed that how NSS makes student confident, develops leadership skills and other skills which help student to lead a better life in various situations. With the joint aegis of Youth Development Center and Women Cell, a group session was organized on Stress management and Women safety on 17th Nov. 2018. The resource persons were Dr. Kulwant Gaur and Dr. Sangeeta Gaur.

Student feedback was taken and analysed by IQAC and improvements were made regarding teaching and learning. Extra classes were being organized for slow learners.
