1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The institution has an efficient mechanism for curriculum delivery and documentation of all activities conducted throughout the session. The institution conducts all its activities as per the academic calendar prepared by the commissionarate of college education, Rajasthan. The syllabi of various streams running in college is designed by the affiliating universities in which a few faculty members of our institution also contribute as members of BOS. The college follows the following procedures for implementation of the above: 1. A master time table of all faculties is prepared in the last week of June so as to ensure the smooth running of classes on the onset of the new academic session. 2. The college administration ensures that all faculty members take their classes regularly and term tests are conducted after every three months to monitor the progress of the students. 3. Most of the faculty members are registered in the examiner's panel of the affiliated University and thereby contribute by setting of question papers for university examinations and assessment/evaluation process of the university. 4. The faculty members are always available to resolve the problems of their students and extra attention is given to slow learners. After completing the syllabi, revision and practice test sessions are also conducted to enhance the performance of the students in the university examinations. 5. Documentation of all records viz. the number of students admitted in each class, teacher and room-wise time-table, practice test question papers, assessment and attendance details is practiced by all

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

A moderate continuous internal evaluation system is followed in the institution. Term test are conducted in all subjects and students are awarded marks for each internal assessment. The entire paper is discussed in the class and the common shortcomings are discussed and necessary suggestions are given to improve the performance of all the students. In the last term a detailed three-hour practice test is conducted on University Exam pattern so as to train the students for their annual examination. The papers are assessed and common mistakes and weaknesses are discussed in class. Also necessary model answers are provided to the students on demand. Science laboratories are open for students to practice practical's for nearly a week before the main university practical examination. All essential suggestions and guidance are provided to the students to ensure good performance of the students in university examinations. v

Academic calendar of various comes for the session 2017-18 was prepared by the college education department with different defined dares and was strictly adopted sincerely followed by the college as per guidelines. The date purpose of incorporating academic calendar is to improve the teaching leaving qualities finish the assigned task within the deadlines instil among teachers students about the importance of professional standards. Regular admission process was carried out before the session and admission list of respective classes in all faculties was published. After that date of commencement of regular classes was announced and were taken in a regular manner as pre monthly division of syllabus. The activities given the calendar included quarterly internal arrestment thoroughly classroom test to focus on learning, outcomes. Simultaneously it was achieved through many resources including projects, seminars and filed activities of practical subjects. As per schedule acuity in academic calendar, proper revision classes were carried out by the facility before the commencement of final exams. The college strictly followed the time table announced by university of Rajasthan and final practical theory paper were carried out respectively as pre scheduled time table, with strict measures of discipline in the institute.

The institution has well equipped laboratories for all science subjects. The laboratory staff including the lab assistant, lab-bearer and peon work hand -in hand with the department faculty members under the supervision of the Head of the respective department. The departmental purchases are made via the general store in accordance with the requirements and funds received from various sources like State Government grant, UGC grant, RUSA etc. the students are benefitted by these rich laboratories for conducting their practicals and each and every student has equal opportunity to enhance his/her knowledge and skill. The college library is partially automated with nearly 60,000 text and reference books. There is a separate reading room and UGC section in the library where students have the facility to sit and read the reference books, magazines etc. issued to them for a few hours. The institution has a big athletic track, volleyball and a badminton court. 1. Title of practice -Saving the Environment The context that required the initiation of the practice Our environment is under distress and it is not a hidden fact anymore. The threat it is facing right now is alarming and it is our duty to save it before it gets too late. The college is located in rural area and large open space is available .There were some peacocks seen in this area and it was found that peacocks in need of food reached the road and got trampled by the trucks that ply on the road. Swachh Bharat Abhiyan was carried out on college campus driving students to use dustbin for throwing garbage, planting green trees and adopting the plants so as to hold responsibility for ones own plant. Obstacles if any The practice to save peacocks was an initiative taken up by the teaching and non teaching staff, hence there were no problems faced. However grooming the student towards developing a healthy and pollution free environment takes a lot of effort. Impact ? The number of peacocks has increased many folds since the inception of this program. The beauty of campus increases when these beautiful birds flock around in the campus. ? A drive to keep the college clean and polythene free is clearly visible. . Resources required The money is collected from the faculty members who willingly donate and an account is maintained for the same. 2.
