Department of Zoology

The department of zoology is a well settled department of this college. It started in the year 2008. Though there is only one sanctioned post in the subject, the faculty has always tried to impart quality education and give practical knowledge to the students along with the subject.

There are 256 students in the subject at UG level and at least one more faculty member is required for the smooth running of the department but due to government policies of recruitment the process is delayed. The department has fully equipped laboratory which can be used for PG classes also and the Education Minister during his visit in the college has promised to upgrade the department at PG level from the next session.

Department doesn't have separate departmental library but the students are provided books time to time by the faculty member as most of the students are from the rural area and belong to weaker section.

The faculty member present is experienced, engaged in research activities, participates in seminars and conferences and remain updated.

The Department also organises various activities for students during the science council which include extension lectures, excursion and quiz etc.

Conservation of natural resources and promotion of environment cannot be done without involving the student in planning and training for promoting the value for conservation and promotion of environment.

Students are the upcoming talents of the society and can contribute and participate for protection of the environment in many ways:-

- To develop hobby of Gardening, they can at least keep the environment of their houses healthy by growing plants as medicinal ornamental plant and vegetable plant which can be easily grown in houses.
- We are in habit of throwing the rubbish and waste after cutting the vegetable, graining wiping and cleaning the floor on the municipal road just outside our house. Use of garbage box, kept by the municipality can be developed as habit in student. It keeps not only our house clean and healthy. But also our city and surrounding environment will become orderly and healthy.
- Development of good habit among student-
- 1. Not to spoil and harm the plants/tree during their visits to garden and public areas.
- 2. To love and respect the nature
- 3. Keep the things in tidy manner in parks, schools, gardens etc.

The green belt movement is one of the biggest movements in environmental history. Nobel prize winner Wangari Maathai founded this movement on the environment day in June 1977. We are also encouraging plantation habit in the college to understand students for the aim to bring environment restoration along with beautification as well as good climate for us.

NSS volunteers play major role in awareness of plantation and cleaning the college environment. They visit the adopted communities alongwith NSS programme officers to communicate with the inhabitants of the community and make them learn how to keep houses and surrounding areas clean, and make avare of its benefits to avoid all harmful effects.

Government Girls College, Chomu is located 33 kms far from Jaipur in Chomu on NH-11. The area of land is 5.01 hectare. A large part of land is not constructed; vacant land is planted with the help of the forest department. Plants which are selected can be grown in minimum water resources Tree, shrubs, climber and herbs, and seasonal flowers are planted in the botanical garden which assist the students in their study. Medicinal plants like *Aloe Vera, Azadirachta indica, Tylophora* and *Ocimum sanctum* etc. are also maintained in the campus.

Quality Sustenance and Enhancement Measure

Government Girls College, Chomu was established in 1999 to give impetus to women education in Chomu and adjacent rural areas. The college has great responsibility in equipping the girl students for their overall social development including better job prospects. The IQAC was set up on 9, January 2016 in this college. It plans to work for accessing the goals, quality enhancement and sustenance.

The IQAC includes two local nominated external members, who monitor the quality sustenance and quality enhancement efforts. The other members include the Principal who is its chairperson, two members and few other members from the college. Progression / performance of students are adjudged after every academic session based on their results of annual examination. If there is a decline in the pass %, measures are suggested by the Cell to ensure improvisation in the forthcoming session. Suggestions made by IQAC has also been executed at the levels of developing IT Infrastructure, effective teaching, proper allocation and maintenance of funds, research and student support.

Quality Sustenance and Quality Enhancement Indicators

Curricular Aspects:

- Participation of the faculties in International/National Conferences, Workshops, Refreshers and Orientation Courses, frequent visits to Research Institutions and Industries, etc. equip the faculties with new trends.
- Two compulsory subjects viz. Computer Science and Environment Studies have been introduced at the first year level to expose the learners from rural back ground to latest technology and generate awareness for social and environmental issues.
- The college offers under-graduation courses in 10 subjects, post-graduation courses in 03 subjects out of which 02 courses are under self finance scheme.

Teaching -Learning and Evaluation:

- A number of measures have been taken to make classroom teaching more student-centric.
- It is mandatory for the students seeking admission at the first year level to opt for any of the extra-curricular activities offered by the college. Co-curricular activities are undertaken with an aim to move beyond the realm of formal learning and foster creative and critical thinking. Extra-curricular activities that fall outside the educational curriculum are regular features in the college and are conducted by Youth Development Centre (YDC), Women Cell, NSS, Ranger units etc.

Research, Consultancy and Extension:

- The college has 02 registered PhD supervisors.
- The faculty has published research papers and books.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

• There are 19 traditional class rooms 09 Practical Laboratories, 01 staff room. Separate rooms for each department, girls' common room, an independent Women Cell, UGC Cell, Career Counselling Cell, Health Care Centre and Student's Union office. All the blocks have proper and

- separate wash rooms / toilets for students, drinking water points fitted with water coolers.
- The college library is well stocked with 7618 till date books which are systematically arranged in almirahs, racks and shelves. They are classified on the basis of subjects and indexed which helps the reader to locate a particular book without any difficulty.
- Students not only get their subject related books but also gather information related to current events, burning issues, latest developments, reports etc.
- The college has more than 03 computers in offices.

Student Support and Progression:

XIIth Plan may be treated as equivalent to GDA+ merged schemes of XIth Plan period, Ratio of All Finn may be treated as equivalent to GDA+ merged schemes of XI Finn period, Ratio of allocation under budget heads 35 & 31 (Non-recurring & Recurring) may remain 80:20 as in UGC's guidelines. There should not be any re-appropriation from budget head 35 to 31 or vice versa. The release for SC/ST may be made as per the allocation of 15% and 7.5% respectively.
