1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Ch. Balluram Godara Govt. Girls College, Sri Ganganagar, a pioneer college for women education in the north of Rajasthan is one of the oldest government colleges for women in Rajasthan. Situated in the heart of the city Sri Ganganagar, the college strives to enlighten the girls from semi-urban and rural vicinities of the district to enable them to hone their creative potential to assume positive and fulfilling roles in nation-building. Established in 1958 by the Government of Rajasthan, the college is named after Choudhary Balluram Godara, a distinguished philanthropist of the district. In his fond memory, his family magnanimously donated for the construction of the building of this college.

Presently affiliated to Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner, the college started its journey with inter-classes in 1958 as an affiliated college of University of Rajasthan, Jaipur. In 1987, the university affiliation of the college was shifted to M.D.S. University, Ajmer. In 2003, the college got affiliated to Bikaner University, Bikaner which is presently known as Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner. The college was promoted to the status of Graduate College in 1960 with the UG programme in Arts. Extending the range of academic programmes for girls, UG programmes in Science, Commerce and Home Science were introduced respectively in 1964, 1981 and 1989. The college was raised to the status of a PG college in 1994 with the introduction of PG Programmes in two subjects in Humanities i.e., Hindi and Sociology. Later on, PG Courses in Political Science, Zoology and English were introduced in 1999, 2006 and 2013 respectively. In compliance of the orders of the State Government to address the needs of the students the college introduced some PG Programmes through “Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti” under the Self-Financing Scheme; these courses include PG in Botany, Chemistry, Mathematics, ABST, Geography, Economics, Indian Music, History, Sanskrit, Home Science.

.In its journey of 65 years, the college has chiseled the rural youth with endless potential into women of substance who are serving the society as dedicated teachers, academicians, entrepreneurs, administrative and civil servants as well.

Vision

The college is committed to spread the light of knowledge and self-awareness among the girls to make them realize their true worth and use their potential for creating a better society as it is enshrined in its logo “Tamsa Ma Jyotirgamaya” (Lead us from darkness to light). The lamp of learning in the logo of the college mark the institutional commitment to create and sustain the learning ambience that enables its students to experience an enlightening journey that is academically, socially and personally transformative .

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- The College offers 4 Under Graduate Programmes and 15 Post Graduate Programmes. **The college adopts elective course system and displays available subject-combinations at its website. The students pursuing graduation can choose their subjects from a wide range of 175 subject combinations in Arts, 2 in Commerce and 2 in science.** The four core subjects offered during the first year of graduation are Hindi, English, Elementary Computer Application and Environmental Studies. **The PG programmes also offer elective courses of contemporary significance.**
- The college is affiliated to Maharaja Ganga Singh University, **Bikaner, Rajasthan and follows the curriculum designed by the University. The curriculum is updated periodically by the respective board of studies of the affiliating university. At present 10 teachers are the members of the Board**

of Studies.

- The College has developed a structured and documented process to ensure effective curriculum-delivery. **The in-charges of the departments headed by the principal regulate the whole process to ensure desired teaching-learning outcome in the stipulated time in tune with the academic schedule given by the Commissionerate of College Education and the affiliating University.**
- At the beginning of the academic session, a class-wise and teacher-wise time table is prepared and is shared with the students through college notice board, college website and social media platforms also.
- **Every faculty member prepares individual term wise teaching plan incorporating tests and assignments for internal assessment with adherence to student-centric approach.**
- Feedback is regularly collected from the stakeholders and action is taken accordingly by the respective committees.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- With 3000 thousand students on its rolls and a team of qualified and committed teachers, the college endeavours to promote women-education in learner-friendly environment.
- The college follows an online transparent procedure for admissions into different programmes as per admission time-chart and admission policy given by the Commissionerate of College Education, Rajasthan. The admission process is managed by a duly constituted Admission Committee which ensures strict adherence to the admission policy in terms of the statutory reservation provisions for the students of weaker sections.
- Being an affiliated college, the college follows the guidelines set by university regarding evaluation of the performance of the students in their respective courses and programs. The university conducts an annual examination at the end of each academic session for summative assessment. The university has introduced semester system for PG (Science) and all UG Programmes for the academic session 2023-2024.
- In the academic session 2022-2023, the semester system has been introduced by the affiliating University for PG programmes in science. **The pass percentage of the students during last five years have been above 95 %.**
- The college works through a well-defined mechanism for internal assessment for the formative assessment through terminal / monthly class tests in all the courses. The marks of these tests are not given any weightage in final University examination.
- The students can meet the teachers in person for teaching-learning and counselling and they can contact them through mobile -calls, text-messaging and WhatsApp as well.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The Research and Development Cell is constituted to encourage the faculty members to participate in research-oriented activities viz workshops, conferences and undertaking research projects.
- The faculty members have been engaged in research projects, writing research papers, writing and editing research books. Their research articles are published in reputed, Peer-reviewed and UGC Care-listed journals. Seven of the teachers are registered as Ph.D. supervisors in 3 different subjects viz.

Hindi, English and Sociology.

- During COVID lockdown, the faculty members prepared e-contents in the form of video-lectures and PDF notes for students. Consequently, the college has **a rich repository of video-lectures i.e., Rajiv-Gandhi E-content Bank.**
- The College has established Innovation & Skill-development Cell, Career guidance and Placement Cell to encourage the students move beyond the syllabus-oriented learning and join various short-term skill-oriented courses. **The Innovation & Skill-development Cell co-ordinates short-term skill-enhancement activities presently named as ‘Saksham’ Programme like extension lectures, workshops, competitions based on traditional cultural practices through women cell, Career guidance and Placement Cell.**
- The institution has one NCC unit, three NSS units, three Ranging units that conduct several extension activities and community services in and around the campus like Road safety, Electoral Literacy, plantation, cleanliness drives, women education, health and hygiene Corona Awareness and Relief Programme etc. The committee for Unnat Bharat Abhiyan conducts various activities in the five villages which are adopted by the college under UBA scheme. **During the session 2020-2021, the college students did a commendable job to serve the community under ‘Aanandam’ (Joy of Giving) Project too.**

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college has adequate infrastructure to accommodate all essential amenities for a hassle-free teaching-learning experience. The double-storey main academic building i.e. Arts & Commerce Block has one lecture theatre and 35 traditional classrooms out of which 09 form the part of newly built PG block. There are well-furnished staff-rooms for all the departments along with one common staff room. The campus houses a spacious girls Common-room too.
- There are well-equipped laboratories for Physics, Botany and Zoology located in the Science-block; for Chemistry, Computer-application in the Arts and Commerce Block, Geography lab, Language Lab and Home Science labs in Home Science block.
- The college has two smart-rooms and one conference room.
- The college has automated central library with a spacious reading room.
- The computerized administrative block houses Principal’s Chamber, separate rooms for Establishment, Academic and Accounts sections, IQAC and Student Union.
- There are three lush green lawns and one botanical garden in the campus. The college has adequate arrangements for fresh water supply in the campus with its 4 underground water tanks and overhead water tanks.
- There is a well-furnished Girls Hostel with the capacity to accommodate 150 students.
- Committed for the all-round growth of the students, the college has adequate facilities for co-curricular activities too. There is a multi-functional Open-stage and an auditorium, a gym along with playgrounds for Kabaddi, Cricket, Handball, Volleyball, Hockey, Kho-Kho and Athletics.

Student Support and Progression

- Ever since its inception in 1958 with the mission for women empowerment, the college is committed to execute the policies of the state government like full admission –fee reimbursement for all registered students and various scholarships for the students to encourage women education.
- Girls Mentoring Cell, Internal Complaints and Grievance Redressal Cell, Sexual harassment and Anti-

Ragging Committees are in place to resolve the grievances.

- The Student Council contribute actively in arrangements of activities like sports-events and annual cultural and literary festival 'Umang'.
- The Alumni Association of the college is a registered body. The faculty members who are the alumnae of the college actively participate in informal interactions with the principal and the other faculty regarding the planning and execution of activities for the optimum benefit of the students.
- The college provides career counselling to the girls through the activities conducted by Career Guidance and placement Cell. **The college has conducted two Campus Placement Drive collaboration with Recruitment agency NIIT and ICICI during last five years.** Responding enthusiastically, 91 students got themselves registered for the place drive in 2021-2022. 08 students out of 91 applicants were selected for the post of Relationship Manager in ICICI Bank. In the academic session 2022-2023, 134 students participated and 06 students got selected.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The leadership and governance of the college is well reflected in its vision and mission.
- Following the action-road map given by CCE Rajasthan, Jaipur, the principal of the college works through IQAC, College Advisory Committee and Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti to prepare for an action plan for quality enhancement and sustenance. In the meetings of the staff-council, all the faculty members are invited to contribute their suggestions on issues like managing admission process, examination etc. More than 40 committees are constituted by the principal to manage administrative as well as co-curricular activities.
- The college implements all the welfare schemes of the State Government for the staff.
- The State Government, CCE and RUSA sanctions funds on the basis of the number of enrolled students, the nature of the academic programs offered and the requirements by the college. The funds are utilized as per GF & AR of the State Govt. The funds for the programs run under Self-finance scheme are managed by the Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti. PG Programmes viz. Botany, Mathematics, ABST, Economics, Music (Vocal), History, Geography, Sanskrit, Chemistry and Home Science have been introduced under Self-Financing Scheme to provide the students more options for continuing their higher studies.
- Working with noble objective to update the college faculty across the state about initiatives for teaching-learning excellence, **the college organized 5 Short-Term Online Faculty Development Programs under "Gyan Ganga" initiative of the Commissionerate of College Education for ABST, Public Policy, Music, Philosophy, Music and Sanskrit in 2021.**

Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	<p>With its 22 departments/ subjects spread-across Humanities, Science and Commerce faculties, along with extensive facilities for a range of extra-curricular activities, the college is all set to cater to the basic requirements of the NEP 2020 in terms of multidisciplinary /interdisciplinary education. • As an affiliated college to Maharaja Ganga Singh University (Bikaner), the college follows interdisciplinary approach in many of the core courses as-per curriculum prescribed by the parent university. Courses like Geography incorporate Botany in the papers on Biogeography and Agriculture Geography whereas the paper on Ecology and Phytogeography in Botany adds in Geography.</p>
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	<p>Biochemistry in Botany and Zoology deals with chemistry in biological systems while in Chemistry; there are papers on ‘Modern Techniques and Scope of Chemical Biology’, ‘Heterocyclics and Natural Products’. Statistics is another subject that is incorporated in various courses of Humanities as well as Science and Commerce. • Credit based courses and projects in areas of community engagement and service and Environmental education form a part of the curriculum of graduate and postgraduate programs in courses like Sociology, Botany, Zoology and Geography. The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

- The college is affiliated to Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner, Rajasthan and follows the curriculum designed by the University. The curriculum is updated periodically by the respective board of studies of the affiliating university. At present 10 teachers are the members of the Board of Studies.
- The college offers Under-Graduation in 19 subjects and Post -Graduation in 15 subjects. The college adopts elective course and displays available subject-combinations at its website. The students pursuing graduation can choose their subjects from a wide range of subjects-combinations in Arts. The PG programmes also offer elective courses of contemporary significance.
- All the faculty members headed by the principal regulate the whole process to ensure desired teaching-learning outcome in the stipulated time in tune with the academic schedule given by the Commissionerate of College Education and the parent University.
- The continuous internal assessment is not a part of the evaluation framework of the affiliating university presently, but the college follows a well-defined process for the conduct of CIE as it is placed in Annual Academic Calendar given by the Commissionerate of College Education. Each department schedules its activity-chart for internal assessment as per requirements of the students of a particular course in the form of monthly tests, quarterly terminal tests, online assignments and quizzes. At the end of the academic session, the students appear for the final University Examination for summative assessment. The teachers of the college contribute as question paper-setter for the Annual university examination as per duties assigned by the examination cell of the affiliating university.
- Committed to the holistic development of the students, the college follows well-defined planning and implementation process for the effective curriculum delivery: -
 - Preparation of the teacher-wise and class-wise timetable by the Time -table Committee.
 - Display of the time table on college notice-board and web-site.
 - Allocation of the course-contents by the in-charges of the departments to the faculty members in accordance with their specialization and expertise besides preference.
 - Preparation of individual term wise teaching plan with adherence to student-centric approach.
 - Proper documentation of attendance of the students.
 - Delivery of course-contents through offline as well as online modes which include classroom lectures, notes, You-tube -video lectures, interactive sessions, WhatsApp.
 - Project work and field surveys are the part of curriculum in courses like Geography, Botany, Zoology, Home Science and Sociology.
 - Availability of text books and reference study-material to the students through college library,

community library and Rajiv Gandhi e-content bank.

- Departmental seminars for PG students to enhance their critical thinking skills and communicative competence.
- Continuous internal assessment in the form of terminal tests, monthly tests along with online assignments.
- The University examination results are analyzed by each faculty and reported in Performance Appraisal Report annually, to be reviewed by the principal as well as the Commissioner, College Education, Jaipur.
- The students are mentored by the faculty members in small groups for their academic and other problems.
- Feedback is collected, analyzed and action taken concerning the curriculum and other aspects of the institution.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

The college practices a teaching methodology which focuses on imparting education through student-centric approach.

- Apart from traditional classroom teaching, the experiential , participative and problem-solving methodologies are implemented inside and outside the classrooms which include:
- The faculty members encourage the students to actively participate in field-surveys and laboratory work in courses for Zoology, Botany, Geography and Sociology, in projects on case-studies in Hindi for experiential learning. Preparing the ground for the participative learning, the faculty members ask the students to work in collaboration for the group projects.
- The college provides ample opportunities for experiential and participative learning through various Extra-curricular activities in NCC, NSS, Ranging, Unnat Bharat Abhiyan. It is mandatory for students seeking admission at the first-year level to opt for any of the extra-curricular activities offered by the college. These activities are undertaken with an aim to make the students move beyond the realm of formal learning for all-round development.
- The co-curricular activities viz. debates, quiz, poetry recitation, essay writing, declamations, class seminars , rangoli, mehndi, poster making, song, and dance competitions and College magazine 'Aalokita' etc. give them the opportunity and confidence to exhibit their creative potential. Our best practice Umang – Annual Cultural, Literary and Sports competitions, is an event that involves the active participation of the student council and other students in organizing the events.
- During 2020-2021, the 'Aanandam' project was introduced in which the students took a first-hand experience of serving in society and recording their learning experience in the form of a group project file under the supervision of their mentors. Several social themes like Health and Hygiene Awareness, Save Environment, educating under privileged children, plantation, Corona -Awareness were covered in these projects. The students-maintained diaries of doing tiny acts of kindness every day.
- Research work conducted by Ph.D. students already employs the format of experimental and problem-solving mode of learning.
- **Use of ICT-Enabled Tools: -**
- The teachers use available ICT-enabled resources which include two smart classrooms, conference hall, computers in departments and share information about open access e-resources like e-PG Pathshala, Gyandoot and Gyan Sudha You Tube Channels. INFLIBNET membership is regularly upgraded.
- The teachers use and train the students for using Hello English App for English language proficiency.
- In addition to classroom interactions, the students can approach the teachers for counselling through WhatsApp and You tube. Additional study material PDF notes and PPT is shared with students to simplify the course contents.
- Each faculty member has created own You tube channel for delivery of the related course contents. The links of these you tube videos are updated in Rajiv Gandhi e-content Bank available on college website are regularly.
- Feedback forms are shared with students, teachers and parents through google forms.
- In 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, 08 teachers contributed as subject experts for Gyandoot and Gyandoot 2.0 respectively , an initiative by CCE for providing students quality e-contents in the form of You-tube videos.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Being an affiliated college, the college follows the guidelines set by the parent university regarding evaluation of the performance of the students in their respective courses and programs. Annual examination at the end of each academic session is conducted as per the schedule given by the university which is displayed on the university website. Admit cards are generated online.

- The examination process is looked after by the principal as Centre Superintendent. The question papers sent by the university are kept in safe custody. The answer books are coded. The answer books are dispatched to the university after examination for evaluation. Most of the teachers are involved in setting the question paper and evaluating answer books. The college acts as an important center for assessment of answer books as per allotment by the university. The answer books are provided with a code number by the University and the evaluation process is transparent. The marks are filled in the OMR sheet and complete secrecy is maintained during evaluation and dispatching the report to the University.
- The results are displayed on university website. Any grievance of the student regarding question paper, examination related issues and evaluation is forwarded to the University. During the exams, unfair means case (UM) and grievance related to question paper are forwarded to the university immediately for necessary action. The examination procedure is completely transparent. Students have an option of re-evaluation if they are not satisfied with the marks awarded in university examination. Unsuccessful students in the final year of UG/PG degree courses are given a chance to appear in Supplementary Examination.
- Practical assessments are conducted in subjects like Chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Botany, Geography and Home Science and the students are evaluated on the basis of their practical files/ fieldwork-reports and viva-voce as a part of the internal assessment.
- The college works through a well-defined mechanism for internal assessment for the formative assessment through monthly /terminal class tests . Every faculty member keeps the record of these tests in terms of the preparation of question-paper and attendance of the students. For the Internal tests, the dates of these tests are informed by the teachers to the students well in advance.

The answer -sheets of these class-tests are returned to the students with necessary suggestions to continue with the same or to make improvements. This practice helps the students in preparing for university examination. The answer sheet is shown to every student separately with a view to avoid embarrassment for low performance, it is not made public.

- The marks of these class tests are not given any weightage in final University examination. When the campus activities were banned due to lock down, the assignments were shared with students on WhatsApp.

If any student has any grievances regarding the evaluation of her performance in these class tests the faculty members compassionately address them.

- Committed to the mission of women empowerment, the college offers 4 Under Graduate Programmes in Arts, Science, commerce and Home Science and 15 Post Graduate Programmes in Arts, Science and Commerce Streams. The college is affiliated to Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner and follows the curriculum prescribed by the university. The faculty members contribute in the capacity of members and conveners of Board of Studies of the University for curriculum enrichment to ascertain the attainment of desired learning outcomes.
- The well-defined course-specific learning outcomes of all the programs are displayed on the college website.
- The courses are designed in a manner that the students learn the latest concepts in the subject as well as understand the importance of professional values and critical thinking. The Course Outcomes (CO) are prefaced to each paper in syllabus prescribed by the affiliating university and shared with students and faculty. In general, the Course Outcomes of different programmes are intended to make the students capable enough for progression into higher degree programmes, research programmes, employment in private/public sector, self-entrepreneurship, and to have readiness for competitive examinations. The specific learning outcomes of various courses are built into the curriculum of each discipline and are available on the institutional website.
- Course Outcomes of the programmes help the students update their knowledge about the concerned field and connect this theoretical epistemology to the scope of higher education and

employability.

- The Admission Help Desk and admission committees of the respective programmes also educate the students regarding the programme outcomes and course outcomes to facilitate the right selection of courses.
- In an orientation program for the newly admitted students at the commencement of the academic session, the students are made aware of the outcomes of the programs and the courses they have chosen.

Response:

- The college has an ecosystem for innovation to cultivate research culture and to develop a creative ambience to encourage the faculty members as well as students to craft a craving for continuous advancement in the areas of their interest to keep pace with swiftly changing global scenario in terms of job-opportunities.
- The College has established an Innovation and Entrepreneurship Skill-development Cell to encourage the students move beyond the syllabus-oriented learning and join skill-enhancement courses. The workshops and training Programmes of short duration (named as 'Saksham' Activities for skill-development and vocational trainings) are organized. An entrepreneurship training programme on Vermi-composting was conducted as an MOU with SWIDS under 'Saksham' Programme during 2022-2023.
- The students are encouraged to join skill-oriented courses organized by RSLDC (Rajasthan Skill and Livelihood Development Corporation) Mukhyamantri Yuva Kaushal Yojana. In 2019-2020, the students joined course on HBTS (Hair Styling and Beauty Therapy Skills) run by RSLDC. In 2020-2021, the students and the faculty members joined the online short term skill courses

conducted jointly by IIT, Kota & CCE.

- Career Guidance & Placement Cell conducted two Campus Placement Drive successfully. 08 students in 2021-2022 and 06 students in 2022-2023 were selected for the post of Relationship Manager in these placement drives conducted in collaboration with Recruitment agency NIIT and ICICI.
- The College Research and Development Cell is constituted to encourage the faculty members and students to participate in research-oriented activities. Workshops on Research methodologies and IPR are organized. Seven teachers are registered as Research Guides with the affiliating university and 12 research scholars are pursuing research for the degree of Ph.D. In 2022, one research scholar was awarded with the degree of Ph.D. in Hindi Literature.
- The faculty members have been engaged in writing research papers in reputed journals, writing and editing research books. Ten faculty members are pursuing research projects for doctoral research.
- The students were given free coaching for competitive exams under Dishari in and 2018-2019 and 'Pratiyogita Dakshata' Project in 2018-2019, 2019-2020.
- Facilitating English language learning for the students, the department of English prepared a bilingual handbook for Basic English grammar which was distributed freely to the students in 2019-2020
- Department of Sanskrit organizes workshops and stage plays for motivating the students to learn Sanskrit. There is a separate section with the classical ambience of Gurukul in the library where one can access Vedic and other ancient Indian texts.
- Moving beyond the traditional teaching, the faculty members have prepared video lectures which are uploaded on their You-tube Channels. The links to these lectures can be accessed at Rajiv Gandhi E-content Bank. In 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, 08 teachers contributed as subject experts for Gyandoot and Gyandoot 2.0 respectively, an initiative by CCE for providing students quality e-contents in the form of You-tube videos.

The college has adequate infrastructure to accommodate all essential amenities for a hassle-free teaching -learning experience:-

- There are 35 traditional classrooms which are located in Arts & commerce block, Science block, PG. Block, Administrative and Home Science blocks.
- The double-storey Arts & Commerce Block in the heart of the campus houses one spacious auditorium and one lecture-theatre.
- There are well-equipped laboratories for Physics, Botany and Zoology located in the Science-block; for chemistry, Computer-application in Arts & Commerce Block, Labs for Geography and Language with five laboratories cum classrooms for home science in the home science block.
- The computerized administrative block houses Principal's Chamber, separate rooms for Establishment, Academic and Accounts sections, Mahavidyalya Vikas Samiti (MVS) , IQAC and Student Union.
- There is spacious staff room for faculty, girls' common room and canteen in the campus.
- With its three lush green lawns and one botanical garden, the college has adequate arrangements for fresh water supply in the campus with its 3 underground water tanks and 15 overhead water tanks. For uninterrupted power-supply, there is one generator-set with the capacity of 15 KW power. There is a Grid-tied SPP-35 KW Solar Roof-top Panel.
- There is a well-furnished Girls Hostel with the capacity to accommodate 150 students.

To keep pace with the technological advancements, the college is augmenting its ICT-Enabled Facilities. The existing facilities in the WIFI enabled campus include :-

- There are two fully equipped smart-rooms, one language lab, One computer lab and one Conference room. The staff-room and departments of Physics, Commerce, Zoology, Botany and music are equipped with computers.
- There are 50 computers, 02 laptops, 02 photo-state machine, 02 scanners and 09 printers for administrative as well as academic purposes.
- The college has automated central library with a spacious reading room.
- CCTV Surveillance system and Public Address system is in place in the college campus.

Committed for the all-round growth of the students, the college has adequate facilities for co-

curricular activities:

- There is a Multi-functional Open-stage and an Auditorium for cultural events.
- There are separate rooms for NCC, NSS, Range ring ,Scholarship cell, Career-counselling and women Cell.
- There are playgrounds for Kabaddi, Cricket, Handball, Volleyball, Hockey, Kho-Kho and Athletics.
- The college auditorium is used for indoor games like Table Tennis and Badminton.
- There is a well-equipped gymnasium with special facilities for Weight-lifting and Powerlifting.
- The PTI with the help of the College Sports Committee takes care of the regular sports practice, selection of players, organization of various tournaments and arrangements for hosting Inter-college sports events as per University sports calendar.
- There is a Sports room to keep the sports articles and records pertaining to sports articles as well as the sports activities.
- The players are provided sport-kits along with refreshments during practice sessions as well as tournaments. There are provisions for TA/DA for participation in state and national events. The players with outstanding performance at inter College, state-level or national level competitions are honoured with mementos and medals at annual prize distribution function each year.

6.1.1

The institutional governance and leadership are in accordance with the vision and mission of the Institution and it is visible in various institutional practices such as NEP implementation, sustained institutional growth, decentralization, participation in the institutional governance and in their short term and long term Institutional Perspective Plan.

Response:

Vision: With its motto “Women Higher Education for Integrated Development and Empowerment”, the college envisions a future where women empowerment is no more a goal but a reality.

Mission: - The college strives to enlighten and encourage the young learners from semi-urban and rural vicinities of the district to enable themselves to hone their creative potential to assume positive and fulfilling roles in nation-building as it is enshrined in its logo “Tamsa Ma Jyotirgamaya”.

Following the action-road map given by CCE Rajasthan, Jaipur, the college works through a well-organized structure to provide its students ample opportunities to unfurl the immense potential lying locked in these young minds:-

- The college addresses the needs of the students in terms of academic and physical facilities through the principal as head of the college who frames several committees for a smooth functioning of curricular as well as co-curricular activities in tune with the vision and mission of the college.
- The active participation of teachers in decision -making and involvement in preparing action plan at college-level for the efficient implementation of the CCE policies is ensured through their active contribution in the college-committees for specific purposes and in the meetings of Staff-council and Mahavidyala Vikas Samiti.
- The college promotes a culture of decentralization and participative management involving all the stakeholders in planning for a successful implementation of the government policies for the optimal benefit of the students.
- The principal works through IQAC, College Advisory Committee and Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti(MVS) to prepare for an action plan for quality enhancement and sustenance.

Some of these committees are so composed that students and non-teaching staff are also included. Every committee is headed by a convenor.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc

Response:

- The College works under the Commissionerate of College Education, Rajasthan headed by the Commissioner who communicates the policies framed by the government regarding academic, finance and other developmental activities in the college through the principal.
- The principal arranges for the implementation of the regulations laid by the CCE through the college staff. The college staff comprises of teaching staff and non-teaching staff which includes Physical Training Instructor, Librarian, Accounts officer, Administrative Officer, Office support staff, Laboratory Assistants, lab boys and Class-IV employees.
- The Principal nominates the experienced faculty members as in-charges of the Establishment, Accounts and Academic sections and constitutes various committees to engage every member of the college staff in various curricular and co-curricular activities.
- The staff is recruited by Rajasthan Public Service Commission/ Rajasthan Staff Selection Board.
- Mahavidyalya Vikas Samiti appoints faculty for the courses run under Self-finance Scheme and also the security guards, gardeners, sweepers and computer operators as per requirements.
- Being a Government institution, the college is to abide by the rules, regulations, policies framed by the State Government. The college administration provides operational autonomy to the different committees to execute the CCE orders to work towards academic excellence.
- In tune with the instruction from CCE, the college has an internal mechanism for grievance redressal in the form of committees for Girls Mentoring, Hostel along with Internal Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti-Ragging committees to look into complaints judiciously.. Besides, for grievance redressal related to CBRG Govt. Girls College ,Srigangangar , the Employee ID of the

Principal of the college is mapped by the Rajasthan Sampark Department. Anyone having a grievance against the college can file a complaint from anywhere in India. The complaint is forwarded to the college through the central office. Besides, a committee for Sampark Portal and Legal matters is also constituted to look into court cases. The students can directly approach the Principal with their doubts and grievances. The matter is discussed with the related Committee and action is taken accordingly.

- Following the action-road map given by the Commissionerate of College Education, Rajasthan, Jaipur, the college works through a well- structured plan to channelize its development in a systematic and phased manner in terms of the qualitative growth in teaching-learning process with special focus on the attainment of course and program outcomes, augmentation and maintenance of infrastructure , research and innovation.
- Although the college has attempted to realize most of its perspective plans for excellence in academic and infrastructural development, but opening new courses for UG and Programmes under Self-financing Scheme, Skill Enhancement Short-term Workshops for the students, the construction of conference room along with the renovation of the aged infrastructure and augmentation of support facilities is noteworthy.
- The grant received under RUSA scheme (Rs 2 crore) was spent on construction, renovation and equipments. Apart from this, maintenance work and lab upgradation is done on a regular basis with financial aid from Mahavidalya Vikas Samiti and state government funds.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

Being a govt. college, the college implements all the State govt. welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching employees which are as follows:

Financial Benefits: -

- General Provident Fund /New Pension Scheme, State Insurance and Group Insurance are compulsory deductions for future security.
- Medical claims are reimbursed by the State Government as part of the health expenses incurred by the employee.
- The superannuated employees of the College are benefitted from the Rajasthan Pensioner's Medical Fund, besides being given Gratuity and Pension.
- As an affiliated College, the University deducts 6% of the amount in the form of 'Teacher's Welfare Fund' from the remuneration for examination –evaluation.

Leave-Benefits for Teaching and Non-teaching Staff:

- Privilege leave for 15 days in every calendar year for Teaching staff and 30 days for Non-teaching Staff
- Half pay leave for 20 days in every calendar year
- Casual Leave for 15 days in one academic session
- Special leave for 15 in a session for academic purpose
- Maternity leave 180 days per child for maximum two children along with Child Care Leave for 730 days in whole service period
- Paternity leave for 15 days per child; for maximum two children.

Avenues for Career Development :

- Academic leave for 15 days for faculty for participation in academic events viz. research paper presentation in seminars etc.
- Faculty Development Programmes as per instructions of CCE.
- Career Advancement Scheme for promotions after completion of desired API score for the promotion.

Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

- The performance of every employee, whether teaching or non-teaching, is appraised by the Principal and reviewed by the competent authority annually.
- This annual appraisal of the performance of the teaching and non-teaching is initiated through a specific Performa framed by State Govt. The online submission of Performance appraisal reports has been introduced in 2022.
- **The process takes place in four phases:**
 1. The Reportee officer submits to the Principal the Performa furnished with the details about the key result area, targets, actual achievements.
 2. The Principal as Reporting Officer judges and rates the work carried out by the Reportee under six criteria (i) Output of work (ii) Leadership qualities (iii) Analytical ability (iv) Management ability (v) Decision making ability (vi) Ability to take initiative and forwards the reports to the Commissioner.
 3. The Commissioner as Reviewing authority gives the overall rating, which then is conveyed back to the reportee who is now the Accepting officer of the report.
 4. Finally, the report is sent to the office of the Commissionerate of College Education to be reviewed by DPC at the time of promotion of the concerned employee.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

- The State Government, CCE and RUSA sanctions funds on the basis of the number of enrolled students, the nature of the academic programs offered and the requirements by the institution.
- The funds for the programs run under Self-finance scheme are managed by the Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti.
- The funds are utilized as per GF & AR of the State Govt.
- The committees for building, campus-beautification, sports and library along with the in-charges of the departments (which need laboratory facilities) prepare their individual proposals for new projects as well as extension and maintenance of existing facilities and submit it to the Principal. The college administration approves and allocates the funds.
- For maintaining the transparency in the procurement process, a purchase committee is formed at the college level with two/three senior faculty members, store in charge and accounts personnel. Every purchase strictly follows GF & AR rules.
- The funds generated through MP and MLA schemes are also utilized as per requirements suggested by stakeholders.
- The college takes utmost care in the proper utilization of funds allocated by the state government for expense under different heads.
- The AAO of the college maintains the account details regarding these funds meticulously.
- An Audit from the Directorate/State checks and verifies the accounts for irregularities if any. Any shortcomings/objections, raised by the Audit are settled.
- The External Audit is carried out by the auditors from the Office of Accountant General (AG) Rajasthan, Jaipur.
- The Internal Audit is done by the team from Commissionerate College Education Rajasthan Jaipur.
- The accounts related to Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti (MVS) are audited by CA hired for the purpose by the College.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures &

methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

With the objective of realizing the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance , IQAC has contributed for institutionalizing the quality assurance practices:

- To facilitate the students from weaker section to access to higher studies as well as to increase intake for PG, Mahavidyalaya Vikas Samiti (MVS) decided to extend fee waiver to the students who take admission in Courses and Programmes which are run under Self-financing Courses in 2022-2023.
- PG Programmes viz. Botany, Mathematics, ABST, Economics, Music (Vocal), History, Geography , Sanskrit, Chemistry and Home Science and courses in Punjabi and ,Jeevan Vigyan & Jain Vidya for UG Programmes have been introduced under Self-Financing Scheme to provide the students more options for elective courses.
- During the sudden onset of COVID, the faculty members were encouraged to make the students connected to college through WhatsApp groups and create individual YouTube channels to facilitate learning through video-lectures as per course- contents prescribed by the parent university. Subsequently, the college has a rich-repository of E-contents in the form of Rajiv Gandhi E-content Bank. Eight faculty members from the departments of Hindi, English and sociology of the college contributed in Gyandoot 2.0, an initiative of the Commissionerate of College Education for On-line teaching.
- The college building was white-washed along with repair and maintenance of College Auditorium and other support facilities viz. furniture and laboratories. Washrooms for Divyangjan and railing along the ramps in the camps was constructed.
- In 2020-2021, the college organized four Webinars under the aegis of IQAC .In collaboration with Commissionerate of College Education, the college organized 5 Short-Term Online Faculty Development Programs under “Gyanganga” Programme.
- The sensitization programmes about NEP-2020 for students and faculty members were organized.15 faculty members attended the special FDP on NEP 2020 conducted by IGNOU .

Post-Accreditation (Cycle-II) Initiatives :-

- Introducing and strengthening the ICT Related facilities , two Smart-Classrooms, one Conference Room was constructed. The computers have been purchased for language lab and library.
- The faculty members participated actively in FDPs for training to use ICT tools in their teaching and now they are making use of ICT in their teaching, using PPTs, preparing video lectures and PDF study material.
- The college Library has subscribed for INFLIBNET.
- The aged structure of the hostel was refurbished.
- For Supporting teaching programmes, part time teaching staff and technical staff is appointed by Mahavidyala Vikas Samiti in every academic session .
- Equipments for the laboratories have been purchased with the RUSA grant.
- A health committee is constituted for organizing health check up camps and Health awareness programmes.
- Under ‘SAKSHAM’-short-term skill enhancement activities . In 2022-2023, an MoU with a

local agency was signed for Entrepreneurship training programme on Vermicomposting. In the past two years, two campus placement drives have been conducted successfully in collaboration with Recruitment agency NIIT and ICICI and 14 students have been selected for the post of Relationship Manager in ICICI Bank.

- Research & Development Cell is constituted to encourage research. The cell in collaboration with IQAC organized a workshop on Prospects of Research.

Response:

Committed to the cause of women empowerment through education for a healthy society, the college aims at promoting gender equity through various curricular as well as co-curricular activities.

- The college extends tuition fees waiver to the students in compliance of the scheme of the government of Rajasthan to promote women education.
- The college campus has one well-furnished girls hostel to accommodate 150 girls from diverse backgrounds from different parts of the state and region.
- The Girls Mentoring Committee, Sexual Harassment Prevention Cell, Committee for Health & Safety, Anti-ragging and internal Grievances Redressal cell along with Hostel Committee for mentoring the hostelers are in place.
- As part of the curriculum, the paper on Women's Writing offered for PG in English and 'Sahityak Nibandh' with a special module on 'Stri Vimarsh' for PG in Hindi enable the students to understand social construction of gender roles under patriarchy. The course-contents of UG and PG programmes in Sociology along with a paper on Human Rights for PG in Political Science are designed by the parent university to sensitize students towards gender equity.
- In addition to these academic efforts towards gender sensitization, the college also organizes co-curricular activities like extension lectures, workshops, and self-defence training programmes to make the students more aware about their health, their rights in society through Women Cell and Sexual Harassment Prevention Cell in collaboration with NSS and Ranging Units. During the past five years all these units worked in synchronization to conduct several activities.
- Many short-term skill-enhancement activities viz. workshops and extension lectures for entrepreneurship personality development, career for women in various fields etc. Following the activity chart as provided by CCE for the implementation of "Rajasthan Rajya Mahila Niti-2021", the Women Cell organized monthly awareness programmes which include awareness regarding health and economic independence of girls, workshops for entrepreneurship skills, extension lectures on formation of Self-help groups, legal and accident related awareness etc.
- During pandemic the students worked under 'Aanandam' Group Projects to sensitize the school-students in the nearby schools through virtual as well as one-to-one interactions on the theme "Save Daughters, Educate Daughters".
- Under 'I am Shakti-Uddan' Scheme for female health and hygiene Free Sanitary pads are distributed to all enrolled students
- The college ensures safety and security through well-trained vigilant guards and CCTV-campus surveillance.
- The college also provides a spacious Girls Common-room.

- The college Magazine Aalokita provides opportunities to the students to contribute their contents in three languages Hindi, English and Sanskrit. It is proposed to include Rajasthani and Punjabi Section in the coming session.
- Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat (EBSB) club which was constituted on 26 Dec.2019 undertakes the activities to promote the spirit of national integration among students. These activities include, "Aaj ka Vakya" (Sentence of the day), an initiative which aims to eradicate language barrier; lectures and virtual seminars to familiarize the students with life and culture of Assam.

- The college celebrates Independence Day , Republic Day , Constitution Day and Human Rights Day enthusiastically to instill human values, nationalism, patriotism and adherence to the Constitution of India.
- The college staff and students took part in the formation of human chain on 14 August 2018 on the eve of Independence day under the Programme ‘Shahadat Ko Salam’.
- NSS Volunteer Kanta Mahar represented Rajasthan State as a delegate in National Youth Parliament Festival, 2019 organized by Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India on 26 February 2019.

Response:

BEST PRACTICE-I: ‘Shaksham’: Short-Term Skill Enhancement Activities

Objectives of the Practice

‘Shaksham’ is a bunch of Short-Term Skill Enhancement Activities intended

- To apprise the students with career opportunities in diverse fields and govt.Schemes for Startups and entrepreneurs.
- To sensitize and motivate the students to explore the career options based on rich cultural tradition of handicrafts .

The Context

The growing complexity of life on earth demands extra efforts, extra planning, and preparation to make the life beautiful. Working with the mission to empower women, the college has planned ‘Saksham’ activities to provide the students space for skill-development and vocational training amidst purely academic programmes to encourage them to work energetically and patiently to create a better future for themselves in the era of growing competition in the job market.

The Practice

“Saksham” Activities are coordinated by Innovation and Entrepreneurship Skill Development Cell in collaboration with Career-counselling Cell, Women Cell., Department of Home Science and other committees. The short-term activities which have been organized during the last five academic sessions are divided into three categories: -

- 1.**Short-Term Skill Enhancement workshops and training programmes** which include Entrepreneurship Training Programme for Vermi- Composting, Food Preservation ,Workshops on Painting and Clay Art ,Puppet Making & Pot-Decoration, Food preservation Pooja-Thali , Diya & Kalash Decoration, Making Eco-friendly Toys and Bags, Production of Short Films- Documentaries and Language Proficiency in Hindi, English and Sanskrit
- 2.**Extension Lectures** which include student-centric presentations on Entrepreneurship Skill Enhancement, on Creating Self-help groups, Agriculture as a Mode of Career .Career Opportunities in Fisheries, Home Science.
- 3.**Competitions Based on Handicrafts** are the annual contests to encourage the students to adopt these practices as career options like Pooja Thali’ & Flower-Vase Decoration, Candle-making and Diya Dacoration, Sari-Packing , ‘Rangoli’ and ‘Mandana’

Evidence of Success:-

- The active participation and enthusiastic response of the students towards these activities as recorded in the attendance sheets for various activities, photographs and new-clips narrates the success of these activities.
- The college collaborated with certified agencies for some workshops and the students were given the certificates of participation in the following training programmes:-
 1. One Year Training programme on Vermicomposting by Social Welfare &Integrated Development Society (SWIDS) , Sriganaganagar under an MOU for Entrepreneurship Skill Training Programme
 - 2.Short-Term Course on Food and Preservation by Indian Food Production & Training Institute, Aligarh
 - 3.Workshop on Painting and Clay Art by Pidilite Industries Ltd, New Delhi.
- The Career Counselling and Placement Cell conducted two Campus Placement Drives in

collaboration with Recruitment agency NIIT and ICICI in 2021-2022 and 2022-2023. 14 students were selected for the post of Relationship Manager in these campus placement drives.

- The winners of the contests organized by Women Cell based on Handicrafts participated actively in decorating the campus for various events and celebrations. Some of the students are using their skills in Sari-Packing, Pot-Decoration, Mehndi designs and 'Pooja Thali'-decoration to meet their daily expenses too.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Time management is the biggest challenge to meet the desired targets in organizing these activities at a regular basis. Most of the students come from nearby villages, they find it inconvenient to stay for long in the campus due to commuting issues like time-schedule of the public transportation to their native places etc.
- Financial Hindrances also need to be addressed to orient these activities for the optimum benefit of the students.

Conclusion:

With its limited human resources and all hurdles regarding time-constraints, the college intends to extend the range of 'Saksham', a small initiative for skill-based learning to create a skill-driven society.

BEST PRACTICE-II-'Umang' - Cultural, Literary and Sports Event

Objectives of the Practice:-

'Umang' is an annual event which is a well-curated bunch of Literary, Cultural and sports competitions

- To provide an exposure to the students, to infuse confidence and enthusiasm to make the best use of their energy in every field of life.
- To provide an open platform to the students to extract and display their talent and skills in front of the society.

The context:-

The students from rural areas are second to none in the capacity and capability to make their mark with their multi-dimension talent as singers, dancers, poets, actors and debaters. They need a platform to showcase their hidden talent which can facilitate their access to wider platforms like TV and Media.

The Practice:-

- In this week-long 'UMANG' programme, cultural, literary and sports competitions are organized to provide the students to display their potential and get rewarded by the college.
- The Student Union takes an active part in planning the whole event, the student representatives assist college administration making other necessary arrangements.
- In some of the events like singing, poetry-recitation and athletic events, the faculty members too participate to motivate the students. This practice helps in strengthening the teacher-student bond and creating a harmonious environment in the campus.
- The event has not been conducted in its regular mode during the session 2020-2021 and

2019-2020 due to Corona Pandemic.

Evidence of Success:

‘Umang’ provides a platform to the student to showcase and plan to chisel their latent skills. The winners of these events participated in the district level and state-level competitions and won prizes to keep themselves moving to excel in their respective field.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Due to financial constraints, the organizing committees find it difficult to arrange for the costumes, required props, prizes for the winners.

Conclusion:-

Umang -Cultural events helps in promoting folk culture, classical as well as contemporary art forms in dance and music. Umang -Literary events helps in encouraging students to enhance their linguistic competence to showcase their talent as poets or creative writers. Umang-sports events build the confidence of the budding players and motivate them to excel in the event of their interest. The participation of student representatives in the arrangement strengthens the team-spirit, time-management and leadership skills

- Students are encouraged to participate in a wide range of activities under the umbrella of departmental and committees for co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to hone organizational skills and learn beyond the classroom. During the academic session 2020-2021, the college worked on '**Aanandam**' (Joy of Giving) project as a platform to instill the joy of giving and sharing in youth through active participation in community service to revive life back to normal from the pain and panic of the Pandemic.
- Placements have never been the mainstay of those government colleges of the state which are not offering any Vocational Programmes.. However, the career counseling and placement cell of Ch. Balluram Godara Government Girls College initiated organizing placement drives in 2021-2022 supporting the students to take up internships along with studies. 14 students have got placement through the Campus Placement Drives conducted in 2021-2022 and 2022-2023.

- The college feels pride in having two players on its roll of honour who represented India at international sports arena and won acclaim for the nation. In 2022-2023, Miss Alka was selected for Adventure Camp and Proficiency Programme organized by Atal Bihari Vajpeyi Institute of Mountaineering and Allied Sports ,Manali.
- In the academic session 2021-2022, the college has initiated a healthy practice of strengthening the emotional bonding between the college and its stakeholders by introducing the 'Kulgeet' of the college.
