The Institution has clearly defined goals and objectives that concern the welfare of its students and society as a whole. Although the curriculum is planned and disseminated by the affiliating University, Maharaja Ganga Singh University, Bikaner, Rajasthan, the curriculum delivery in the institution is well planned, regular and disciplined. The time table is prepared well in time with the completion of the admission process in the institution. Teaching takes place according to the timetable and in the allotted classrooms. Class tests and terminal tests are conducted periodically. Teaching is undertaken with diverse methods as per the demand of the subject or class. ICT tools are used in some classes, while teaching aids like blackboard, notes, reference books, handouts etc are used in all classes. The departments plan their curriculum delivery with mutual consent and workload is distributed in each department in a uniform manner according to the UGC norms. The timetable is strictly adhered to and the curriculum designed by the University is covered during the session following which there are revision classes. The students are free to consult teachers at any point of time through direct contact or through email or telephone.

8.Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

- The organization of National / international seminar is also proposed this year to enhance the active participation of the faculty in research activity.
- Under the RUSA scheme amount of Two crore has been sanctioned for our college under which 70 lakh has to be spent on new construction, 70 lakh on renovation and 60 lakh on books and equipment.
