Department of English (Undergraduate Level)
Profile of the Department (2017-2022)

1. Scope and importance of the Department: Teaching/Learning English as Language and Literature equips the students to, in the words of Bell Hooks, to 'transgress' in a positive sense because 'Education as the Practice of Freedom' encourages them to question, debate, discuss and analyse within the four walls of classroom. As students of English Literature/Language they learn how to relate the 'classroom' to 'the world out there' through the curriculum/syllabus/subject that reflects, expounds, comments on 'the world out there' and even deviates/distorts (language of literature does that at multiple levels) for artistic purposes. As the learners read literary texts written across cultures around the globe the contemporaneity of these texts is revealed to them. One example would suffice to see how reading literature creates possibility for depoliticization of young minds: through a critical comparison of the characters of Shylock, the Jew and the Christian characters as depicted in Shakespeare's play The Merchant of Venice, literature classroom can place in perspective Shylock's seemingly universal plea for the rights of all people suffering discrimination in the present global/national context. The play, like several other literary texts which ring truer to our times, (Katherine Mansfield's story The Doll's House can be cited as an example here), is also about the 'othering' of anyone who is 'different' and 'not like us' seeking acceptance and benevolence denying demonisation of the 'other'. The most libertarian thing a language/literature teacher can do is to permit her students to 'challenge' the unequal world order at the intersections of caste, class, race and religion and express their own views.

By placing language teaching/learning at the centre, the Department of English attempts/aims to evolve a teaching/learning system that will encourage students to enhance competence in multiple languages along their mother tongue. Recognizing the 21st century workforce that exhibits new linguistic landscapes and emphasis on the inclusion of communicative competence as one of the essential skills of learners, the Department addresses the issue through a multi-modal approach to the teaching-learning process. Since growth of mindsets are language dependent, there is a focus on developing cognitive skills such as creative and critical thinking, problem-solving, storytelling, comprehension, analysis, synthesis, context-based correct language usage and weaning away the learners from informal language with slang, incorrect spellings, ungrammatical constructions, erratic punctuation marks, transliterations (instead of translation) and so on for betterment of their linguistic competence.

Swinging seamlessly between offline and online teaching/learning, the Department integrates materials from a variety of sources including websites offering print, audio, video, infographics, podcasts and so on to maximize learners' access to these learning resources.

- **2. Introduction to the Department:** (i) English Literature is offered as one of the optional subjects at undergraduate level for B.A. pass course (a three-year degree course).
 - (ii) General English (an essentially language-based course that aims at enhancing language-skills through Grammar, comprehension and vocabulary) is offered as a compulsory subject at undergraduate level for B.A./B.Sc./B. Com. Part I students.

21. Preparedness of the Department for NEP:

- a. **Multidisciplinary/ Interdisciplinary Learning:** With an understanding of philosophy and aims of education, literature teaching insects with history, sociology, psychology, polity, economy and addresses issues of gender, marginalization and disability effectively. All these will eventually be mediated through language by way of interaction between the teacher and the taught.
- b. Skill development: Language finds place in our teaching-learning programme at Three-year degree course in all streams, that is, Arts, Science and Commerce. There will be an increased emphasis for the teachers and the taught on arriving at the classroom with an understanding of the nature, structure and acquisition of language. To make learning engaging the learners should be taught how to integrate the highly rule-governed systems of learning with socially appropriate language usage.
- c. Integration of Indian knowledge System: The 'Shruti Parampara' and structural tradition extending from Panini is to be adopted for language learning; this idea comes from the fact that all Indian languages, Hindi and Sanskrit in particular, are very scientific and expressive, that the script used for Hindi is also scientific, that languages are learnt largely from their

- 'environment' through imitation and practice, and that second and foreign languages are best learnt through a combination of grammatical rules and vocabulary.
- d. Focus on outcome-based education: For the conceptual clarity and cognitive growth of learners, it must be recognized that they arrive at higher education institutions with a 'language' simultaneously located in several different languages. The performative nature of language is multilingual because multilingualism forms the essence of being human. Since NEP draft talks a lot about multilingualism, the teacher has to recognize the importance of interlanguage fluidity and not miss any opportunity to liberate the classroom from a monolingual situation. A focus on vernaculars in education will go a long way in helping future language learners to use the complex verbal repertoire through literatures in multiple languages/literatures in translation as a resource which reflect variations of style, idiom and folk songs and stories that are often socio-culturally rooted in learners' lingual background. We need to recognize that multilingualism constitutes the backbone of pedagogy and to make the education enterprise successful, the classroom will walk out of the frozen paradigms of 'teacher-taught-textbook-language relationship', invite students to engage in scientific inquiries and allow the voice of every learner to find space in the learning process.
- e. **Distance/Online education:** With increasing use of technology in the system of education, the educators understand how the learners will perceive any technological teaching tool and how the perceptions like visual, auditory and tactile will possibly have an impact on learners. For making performance-focussed learning plans, the teacher will map the time the learners can spend in the classroom, and design teaching methods, assessment criteria and classroom activities for better engagement of learners. Technology-enabled online classroom blended with traditional classroom will pave the way for student engagement in education programs and increase opportunities for collaborations in distance education. Blended learning, as against traditional classroom, more student-oriented and customized and lead on to the actualization of the three cardinal principles of education: access, equity and quality.

22. Contribution to Institutional Best Practices:

- (i) Vanita Saamarthya: The course contents of B.A. Part I/II/III have several poems, essays, short-stories which are being constantly used in the classroom discussions for creating awareness on gender-oriented societal and cultural issues. Special mention can be made of the texts such as Robert Browning's poem "My Last Duchess", O. Henry's story "The Gift of the Magi", William Wordsworth's poem "The Solitary Reaper", William Blake's poem "London", Shakespeare's plays Macbeth and Merchant of Venice and other literary works.
- (ii) Harit Utthan: As far as generating awareness on environmental issues is concerned there are several texts prescribed in syllabus which are being exploited for the purpose of making students sensitive towards environmental hazards and telling them to be responsible towards the sustenance of green earth. These writings include poems by pre-Romantic and Romantic poets such as James Thomson, Thomas Gray, William Wordsworth, P.B. Shelley, John Keats, the poem "Birches" by Robert Frost, short-stories such as "The Axe" by R.K. Narayan, "The Three Dancing Goats" and other literary texts.

23. SWOC analysis of the Department:

- i. Strengths: E-contents on YouTube channel on a range of topics covering the syllabus of the MDS University, Ajmer and various competitive examinations make learning accessible to students across the globe in addition to the students of this institution.
- ii. Weaknesses: (i) No postgraduation course offered in the Department of English. (ii) No language-based and skill-oriented program run by the Department to facilitate the learners with job-oriented communication skills in English language.
- iii. **Opportunities**: English language and literature offers job opportunities as teachers, translators, interpreters and creative writers.
- iv. **Challenges:** Procuring financial assistance to establish Language Lab and start skill-based language programs for the students of the College.
