1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. Girls College , Tonk, a premier institute of higher education , is situated in south east Rajasthan. Geographically this city lies about 100 Kms of the south of the Rajasthan state capital Jaipur on N.H. 12. Nestling on the foothills of Aravali range and situated on the bank of river Banas, Tonk is one of the backward districts of Rajasthan and is a part of Ajmer Division. This college was established in 1995 as an UG College. At first, there was only Arts and commerce faculty but today it has added science stream also. The college was shifted to the present campus in Gulzar Bagh in July 2001 . Since then there has been a continuous process of academic upgradation. Science faculty in UG and P.G. Course(History) started in 2022-23 by Government of Rajasthan. The College is affiliated to M.D.S. University Ajmer. The college is included in the list of college maintained by the U.G.C. under section 2 (F) and 12 (B) of its act.

Full and timely utilization of grants from the UGC, RUSA and State government has ensured continuous progress in infrastructure and equipment. It is a multi-faculty college for only girls having various under- graduate and post-graduate academic programs on campus. All the programs are run in the college under the category of curricular and co-curricular activities through a planned and well- documented process. We have 10 permanent faculty members in Arts and commerce stream. There is collective participation in decision making and planning and other activities of college development. The college largely endeavors to make girl students responsible and successful citizens of India. Appropriate emphasis is given to personality and character building schemes like the NSS, ISDC, YDC, EBSB, IDEA, Women cell, sports, Red Ribbon, Eco club , Yojana Manch, Literary and cultural events are organized at regular basis. The institution volunteers itself for second cycle of accreditation.

Institutional Strength

- 1. The college is situated at the district headquarter.**
- 2. The college offers U.G. programs in Arts, science and commerce faculty with a wide range of optional subjects and post graduation in History.**
- 3. The faculty of college is well qualified and fully committed for students.**
- 4. The college offers spacious, well ventilated class rooms, big seminar hall , open stage , sufficient furniture, smart class-room and eco-friendly campus. There is NSS,ISDC, Women Cell, Anti-Ragging Cell to ensure overall development of the students.**
- 5. A girls' hostel for weaker section Students is situated near college.**
- 6. A wide range of government scholarships and flagship schemes are provided to the students.**
- 7. The college is district nodal college for Dev Narayan and Kalibai Bheel Girls Scooty scheme and Tahsil Nodal for private colleges.**

Institutional Weakness

- 1. The college doesn't have proper and sufficient sports grounds, laboratories and lab equipment. The college has no director of physical education.**
- 2. There is a wide gap between the syllabus and market requirements. Being an affiliated institution it is difficult to eliminate such gaps. There is more need of skill development courses .**
- 3. The library facilities could not be bettered in terms of acquiring books, journals and equipment. Separate Internet connection for the better functioning of the library is still required. Subscription to e-journals and resubscription to INFLIBNET is still pending. Students need to be more equipped with new technology. Most students who come from rural background and poor economic condition have found online education very**

taxing because of unavailability of personal computer, laptops, tabs or smart phones

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. Post graduate courses can be started in Hindi, Home science and Political Science.**
- 2. Certificate and diploma courses in banking and finance, nutrition, early child care education, home management will increase the employability in private sector.**
- 3. The vast ground of the college can be developed into botanical garden and other sports courts.**

Institutional Challenge

- 1- The college faces many challenges while organizing conferences , seminars due to lack of human resources.**
- 2- More need based curriculums are required to increase skill based employability in girl students.**
- 3- Automation and digitalization of library is a major challenge for the college due to vacant post of librarian.**
- 4- Organizing more seminars and workshops to motivate the students.**
- 5- Students and even a large number of staff find it hard to overcome their hesitation in use of English though it is essential as far as tech expertise and job opportunities in public/ private sectors are concerned.**

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college offers wide range of courses and subjects that are in tune with the emerging national and global trends and are relevant to local needs as well. The college follows the curriculum prescribed by the affiliating university and it works out the details for effectively operationalizing the given curricula. Some of the teachers of the college play a significant role in the formation of the syllabi for several programmes run by the university, as they are members of the Board of Studies. The College follows the Academic Calendar issued by the Commissionerate of College Education for the effective implementation of the curriculum. The Time Table Committee holds informal meetings with different departments and allocates papers and periods to the faculty. The college runs undergraduate programmes of B.Com., B.A., B.Sc. and post graduate programme of M.A (History). Supplementary enrichment programmes are also organized that acquaint students with the crosscutting issues. The college offers academic flexibility to the students of B.A. regarding choice of subjects like Hindi, English, Urdu, Sanskrit, Persian, History, Political Science, Geography, Economics, Public Administration, Home Science, Sociology, Drawing and Painting. The students get an opportunity to study ABST, EAFM and Bus. Adm. in the commerce stream. The students of science stream has the choice to study Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Maths. The college administration has Regular Attendance Monitoring Committee to supervise the effective implementation of the curriculum. The head of the institution takes rounds of the campus to monitor and ensure the smooth functioning of the classes.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Our College encourage student-centric learning through various methods. Regular participative activities viz., **group discussions, special lectures** are organized in the college and the students actively participate in these activities. Students are given **class assignments** for focusing on self study and to encourage independent learning. Different student support systems are available in the college like Library, Reading Room, Smart Classrooms. Students are trained for basic life skills such as self defense, swachh bharat activities, personal hygiene and sanitation. Beyond the classroom, college gives high importance to all-round development of students through extra-curricular, co curricular and field based activities. To increase the concentration in various activities, the college has framed many committees and clubs including the cultural committee, sports committee, career counseling cell. In order to inculcate human values, ethics and social responsibility, students are encouraged to participate in activities.

Institution's efforts to ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes. The students are apprised of the details of the evaluation system of the affiliating university and they are explained to the students by the faculty in the classrooms.

The college administration holds fair exams according to the guide lines issued by the Commissionerate of College Education, Rajasthan, Jaipur and the guide line of the Affiliating University.

There is a good library with reference books and textbooks that initiate the learning process. Field trips, excursions and extension lectures also augment the learning process in students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Research, Innovation and Extension activities are very important for holistic development of the students and college. The faculty is encouraged to do research work. Most of faculty members are Ph.D. Ample support facilities are available in the campus for undertaking seminars, workshop and research publications. IQAC encourages the staff members to utilize their expertise for research and consultancy as well.

The college has created an ecosystem for innovations and transfer of knowledge. The Institute has various cells like YDC (youth development centre), ISDC, NSS cell, Yojana Manch, IDEA, Alumni association, EBSB (Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat), Women cell and red ribbon club. They organize many useful programs for students to update their knowledge. Course on "Spoken English and communication" was conducted under MMYKY Scheme (Mukhyamantri Yuva Koushal Vikas Yojana) with RSLDC. NSS Camp, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, yogabhyas, self-defence, national festivals, motivational awareness programs, plantation, educational tour, language club, culinary competitions, Parents-teacher meetings, skill development, Personality development Carrier counseling. SVEEP- (Systematic Voters education and electoral participation program) etc. activities are organized regularly in the college campus. Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students on social issues. NSS Volunteers organize various activities in the adopted ward and participated in many social works.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The main focus of the college is on expanding its resources in terms of construction, Home Science Labs, office equipment, furniture, library and reading room and other facilities that facilitate teaching learning process. It is well aware of the fact that adequate infrastructure facilities are important for effective and efficient conduct of the educational programmes and academic achievements. Necessary physical facilities are available in the campus for curricular and co-curricular activities. Taking proposals from various committees and implementing them according to the guidelines of funding agencies such as the State Government, UGC, RUSA and minority department. Various issues are discussed in the meetings of IQAC and Vikas Samiti for college development.. Suggestions from Student Union are also invited wherever necessary. The strategy of infrastructure development involves: 1. Creation of new infrastructure 2. Enhancement of existing infrastructure.

Infrastructure and supporting facilities have been improved significantly with the financial aid received from RUSA and other agencies. New computers, printers, and office furniture and lab equipment have been added. College have 12 Bigha 6 Biswa land campus, Own building, 09 class room, 1 home science lab and 6 other labs, office room, library, reading room, seminar hall, smart class room, open stage, girls common room, toilets, R.O. Drinking water, computer, printer, scanner, invertors, Solar Pannel, generator, NSS room, green campus and other common facilities in the college.

Student Support and Progression

Consistent with the mission, Government Girls College, Tonk attract students from the district and the surrounding area. It is the first girls college of the district. The college modules young students for lifelong learning and empowers them to be competent in taking of the challenge offered by the competitive global world. The college prospectus provides information and direction related to syllabus and admission process. The institute provides scholarships, reservation, marks relaxation for admission to the SC ST, OBC, MBC and

EWS students and three percent reservation in admissions to the physically challenged students and corona affected families as per state government rules.

The co- curricular, extra curricular, literary and sports activities of the college helps in personal grooming, social obligation and fitness of the students. Students are trained for self defense and personality development by the police department and NGO.

Capacity building initiatives like life skills, soft skills, language proficiency and ICT skill are promoted through YDC, Women cell NSS etc. NSS and Ranging are important units of the college for social, mental development of the student . Students have benefited from the guidance to competitive exam through program like Pratiyogita Dakshata. On an average more than 30% students are benefited from various scholarships provided by the government. We have a registered Alumni Association. As an expression of concern, the students problems are solved through mentoring and counseling cell. Mentoring is done by the faculty members. Anti-ragging committee and women sexual harassment prevention cell have been formed for the welfare of the students. UDAAN program for the girls students, provides sanitary pads for hygienic health. The college makes enormous efforts to provide necessary assistance to students to facilitate their holistic development and progression.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution aims to provide excellence and higher education to the deprived girls students of the society. The college is being run by the State Government through the Commissionerate College education, Rajasthan. The college undergoes several strategy development programmes including maintenance of infrastructure human resource and management, teaching and learning, student welfare etc.,. There are different faculty improvement strategies for teaching as well as nonteaching staff members. Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly such as Institution manages its financial resources in an effective manner. Guidelines and finance rules of state government are followed accordingly.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell(IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. The college is constantly extending and expanding its resources in terms of infrastructure, equipment, classroom furniture, Library and other campus facilities.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The institutional distinctiveness of the institute is in imparting quality education to the girls of deprived sections of society. Quality education helps in cultivating their skills and capacities and provide educated mothers to the society which in turn become the human capital for the next generation. Gender sensitivity is an inherent value in the cultural ethos of the institute. Safety, security and well being along with gender equity and friendly working atmosphere are the issues of prime concern.

The college provides an environment to the girls to learn tolerance and harmony towards cultural, communal, socio economic, regional and linguistic diversities. This adds new shades of cultural richness in our social life and develop cultural and linguistic tolerance among students. Celebration of cultural and

constitutional festivals is an integral part of college vital activities. This aids in gaining knowledge about the great personalities in our political, social, cultural and scientific history. It decodes the spirit of patriotism, ethics, moral values, humanity, respect of teachers, duties and responsibilities among students.

The campus is maintained as "Plastic Free Zone". The students and members of the staff are educated for not using plastics. Display boards depicting "No Plastic/Plastic free zone" are placed at vantage points. The students and staff spread awareness on avoiding plastic cups , plastic bags and increase usage of cloth bags. Rain water harvesting system is installed in the campus to rejuvenate the depleting ground water resources. This also helps in saving the rain water which used to drain away from many years. LED lights are used in the campus for energy efficiency and cost saving perspective. The college strives to preserve the campus as a green environment since its inception. The eco-friendly campus had practiced various efforts like sapling plantation, watering and taking care of trees. The girl students of the college are provided with all the learning opportunities that help them to become economically productive with expanded vision resulting in independent well being.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The institute offers innovative curriculum that includes credit-based courses for skill enhancement like traditional embroidery, apparel designing and clothing construction, bakery, confectionary and food preservation. This will develop physical, social and employment capacities of the girl students. Value added courses like environmental studies, physical fitness and yoga in the syllabus expands the dissemination of knowledge from classrooms to community. It also develops a holistic approach to achieve a comprehensive and multidisciplinary education
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The University has revised and adapted their curricula to align with the credit-based system as proposed in NEP2020. The credit system allows students to accumulate and transfer credits. This requires defining credit equivalencies and conversion mechanisms. The credits are recognized and it is ensured that credits earned at one institution are accepted by others for seamless credit transfer. Providing counseling and guidance services to help students navigate the credit system and make informed decisions about their educational paths.
3. Skill development:	Many skill development courses like food preservation, apparel designing and clothing construction, traditional embroidery, bakery and confectionery are incorporated in the mainstream curriculum. College provides hands-on training and practical experience. A robust monitoring and evaluation mechanism in the form of assessment is ingrained to ensure the quality and effectiveness of the skill development programs. The college equip the students with the practical skills and knowledge needed to thrive in a dynamic job market. "Anandam" program inculcates positivity, peace, love, happiness and universal human values
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The college has many new courses which includes the integration of traditional Indian knowledge system in the modern education frame work. College runs degree courses in many Indian languages like Urdu, Sanskrit, Hindi, literature, Persian and thus help in preserving and revitalizing these languages. The medium of instructions and teaching in the classroom is in the bilingual mode that is English and Hindi. The official work in the college is done in Hindi language and is the most spoken language in

	the campus. Students also learn the chronological and systematic account of their cultural heritage in the subject of history that promotes a more holistic and culturally rooted education in the institute.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The institute collectively promotes an outcome based education system. The college has implemented, continuous and comprehensive assessment methods to track students progress and assess their skills and knowledge over time. The curriculum is designed to lay a strong emphasis on integrating skill development and value added courses into the mainstream so as to provide vocational education to students. The college lays deep emphasis on the development of the faculty members by motivating them to attend seminars, workshops, refreshers faculty development programmes. This keeps the faculty updated with the latest technologies which in turn benefit the students with high quality education.

Government Girls College, Tonk is affiliated to Maharishi Dayanand Saraswati University Ajmer [Rajasthan]. All the UG programs taught in college are approved by the Board of Studies of Maharishi Dayanand Saraswati University Ajmer. All the programs are run in college under the category of curricular and co-curricular activities through a planned and well-documented process, which is monitored by the department and as well as college-level through specially constituted monitoring committees by the principal such as time—table committee, class monitoring, and discipline committee of senior faculty members. The timetable committee draws up a detailed and comprehensive timetable including all courses i.e. theory, practical thereby ensuring a balance between the different types of engagement/ participation of students. Faculty members take utmost care to complete the syllabus on time and always strive for effective curriculum delivery through a combination of time—tested and innovative methods yet flexible enough to change the choice of the optional subjects. The principal frequently holds meetings with all the departments, and students as well as parent-teacher meetings to assess the progress of the teaching-learning process throughout the session. - Practicals are performed in batches in laboratories where students learn from each other, encouraging participatory learning.

- By participating in NSS and Electoral literacy club programs, students get the practice of work for social service.

ICT helps tremendously in developing quality education and personality of students. The college has a significant concern for providing state-of-the-art infrastructure and learning resources to enhance learning experiences. Not only mastering ICT skills but also utilizing ICT to improve teaching and learning is most importance for teachers in performing their roles. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The college is affiliated to MDS University Ajmer and the examination are conducted annually by the University. The internal evaluation system is being done at college level as per rules and guidelines. The college has its own process of continuous internal evaluation system for all the academic courses to evaluate the learning capacities of the students at various levels.

- In home science and Science subjects where practical exams are part of the curriculum, it is mandatory to submit a practical record that is evaluated and marks are added during the final consolidation of results. The project report is also compulsory in some of the subjects and is considered for assessment.
- All the departments conduct periodical class tests on a regular basis which help the student to prepare for the final examinations.
- The students who do not perform well in the internal evaluation are given special attention by the faculty. Sometime these students are given extra classes to improve their performance

The examination process is transparent and follows the MDS University, Ajmer guidelines as the college is affiliated to it. Annual examination scheme is conducted as per the University calendar. The college is a center of MDS University Examination and approx.400 students appear for their exams during annual examination. Most of the teachers are in the panel of examiners for paper setting and evaluation of answer books. Any representation regarding question paper, examination related issues and evaluation is forwarded to the University. The examination procedure is completely transparent:

- The time table and seating arrangement for examination are displayed on the notice board.
- Admit cards are generated online.
- The examination process is supervised by center superintendent, additional center superintendent

and assistant center superintendents.

- The question paper packets are verified to eliminate errors and kept in safe custody in strong room.
- The answer sheets are distributed room wise along with question papers and attendance sheets to the invigilators.
- After examination, the answer sheets are collected by the invigilators and submitted to the room supervisor for further process. Attendance of students is maintained properly during examination.
- During the exams, unfair cases and grievances related to question papers are forwarded to the university immediately for necessary action.
- The evaluation process of answer book assessment is transparent and complete secrecy is maintained.
- The answer books are evaluated fairly on time and results are declared and displayed on the University website.

Every year, a **Examination grievance redressal Committee** is formed to solve problems related to examinations of students in the college. If the solution to the problem of students is possible at the college level, then the examination *grievance redressal* Committee solves it and if the problem is at the university level, then the problem is solved by correspondence with the university.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The institution has effective welfare measures to amplify the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff members.

The performance of every employee, whether teaching or non-teaching is appraised by the principal and reviewed by the competent authority on annual basis covering various aspects of working / behavior and overall performance. This helps in assessing the overall conduct of the employee. The records are kept in the office of the commissionerate to be reviewed by DPC promotion.

Details on the performance appraisal system of the staff: Annual performance appraisal is the medium whereby the performance of the teaching and non-teaching staff is evaluated. An assessment criterion for faculty is the regularity in the number of classes taken as allotted in the timetable and the results achieved for the classes assigned to them. Weightage is given to the publication of the work by faculty, research supervision done, conferences and seminars attended. The annual confidential reports are written based on self-appraisal to adjudge the performance of the faculty throughout the session in the field of teaching, conduct and potentialities and are forwarded to the Commissionerate of College Education, Rajasthan. If the appraisal authority makes adverse comments then clarification is sought by the higher authority from the principal and the employee both. If adverse comments are not proved then they are expunged from the employee's ACR. If charges are proved then employee may be punished either by freezing of increment or he/ she may even be suspended.

The welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff. There are mechanisms available with the institution for the welfare of the staff as per rules of the government of Rajasthan. The measures taken

by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty. As stated earlier, the institution is a government body. The recruitment of the faculty members of the College is done by a constitutional body of the Rajasthan Government, viz., the Rajasthan Public Service Commission. The faculty members selected by the Commission may be posted in or transferred to any government college within the state of Rajasthan.

Response:

The college was established in 1995 as the one and only girls college in the district. The institute is very sensitive towards the girls problems and issues. All measures are taken for the safety and security of girl students. Some of them are as follows :

- Permanent IV class are posted in the college, round the clock to insure security and safety of girls. Frequent patrolling is done by security guards across the college day and night.
- The discipline committee constituted in the college, vigilantly keeps an eye and anti ragging committee over the safety of girl students and takes prompt action in case of any disturbance.
- The college also has a committee of prevention of sexual harassment for women. The convener of the committee is the senior lady faculty member with member of other faculty specially women representatives and girl students. Regular meetings are held and the minutes are recorded.
- College has grievance redressal cell which covers the receipt and processing of complaints and grievances from the girl students and faculty members.
- College has constituted women cell for the counseling and safety of girl students. Several activities are conducted in the cell to make the students aware and motivated on social issues.
- Awareness programs are organised in the college with the collaboration of district administration on " **Beti Bachao Beti Padhao** " scheme of govt. Various lectures are organised by N.S.S. and YDC (YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CENTRE) periodically to motivate and empower women for the betterment of society. Social issues related to gender equality are addressed by the eminent speakers, invited to the college from time to time.
- A spacious girls common room in the campus, funded by the minority department, is an added facility for the girls.
- CCTV have been installed in the college campus to ensure security and safety of the girls.
- A workshop "AAWAZ DO - SPEAK UP" was organised by Rajasthan Police with the aim to ensure safety, dignity and self-reliance to women of all sections of society. They gave self defence lessons and worked for women empowerment through practical training.
- The most notable initiative taken by Rajasthan state govt. is the distribution of free sanitary napkins under the aegis of UDAAN in the college. It is a milestone in breaking the stigma and raising awareness about menstrual hygiene.

Title Of The Practice 1 :

Environment Consciousness and Sustainability

Objectives of the Practice:

To make the campus lush green.

To sensitize, encourage, engage students, staff, stake holders towards environment sustainability.

To plant medicinal, ornamental and fruit bearing trees in the college campus.

To create environmental awareness about plastic prohibition.

To promote conservation and sustainable use of resources.

The Context:

Rajasthan faces several environmental challenges like low rainfall and extreme climate conditions. . State government has mandate tree plantation and plastic prohibition in colleges to conserve and enhance environmental resources.

Thus tree plantation and green campus drive by the college students ensure stability of eco-system. Trees play a significant role in maintaining equilibrium of the environment. Many ecological process like soil cover, balancing green house gases, oxygen production, monsoon cycle, rainfall pattern are governed by trees. Trees diminishes the severe effects of global warming.

The Practice:

The best practice of our college is to plant medicinal, ornamental, fruit bearing and shady trees in the campus and making it lush green. Students are motivated to plant saplings in the campus, watering and taking care of them. The whole area of college is landscaped with shady trees tagging it to "Green Campus". The college administration offer saplings to the guests instead of flower bouquets to promote tree plantation.

Students are also encouraged to limit energy usage by switching off electricity when not needed. . The administration has also replaced the traditional light bulbs with LEDs of energy. The girls are made aware of reduction of green house gas emissions by reducing our use of energy,

Students are also steered towards "No plastic" usage Display boards are put at various places . By reducing plastic waste and plastic use, there would be a reduction in harmful carbon dioxide emissions . Students are encouraged to use steel bottles and tiffin boxes, paper and cloth bags and discourage use of polythene, plastic bottles and disposables in the campus.

Evidence Of Success:

The college campus is covered with various ornamental, medicinal fruit bearing and shady. trees, herbs and shrubs. Students of NSS participate actively in the tree plantation drive. The campus is enriched with variety of plant species. Many trees are tagged with their botanical as well as common names. Saplings are protected by tree guards to give them a safe environment. As a result of tree plantation drive, the quality of air in the campus is very good.

Harit Vatika is also developed in the campus which has many fruit bearing plants as well as medicinal plants. Fencing has been laid down to safeguard the saplings.

Problems Encountered And Resources Required :

The major problem encountered in making the campus green is the presence of termite in the soil which does not allow the plant to grow. Anti-termite treatment is done in the soil to make the saplings grow adequately. Many large trees have died due to termites in the soil.

The college campus does not have proper boundary wall therefore grazing animals enter the campus and ruin the saplings.

In rainy season, due to poor drainage, the water stagnates, in the campus for many days resulting in swamps
