1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Dr. Bhimrao Ambedkar Government P G College, Nimbahera (Dist. Chittorgarh), Rajasthan, was established in 1977 as a government college. Initially it carry on Arts stream courses but gradually other courses also took place here such as commerce stream in 1982 and later science stream in 2003. Despite the college started PG course with Hindi Literature subject in 2013 and currently there are five PG Programs available for the students such as in Hindi literature, History, Political Science, Sociology & in ABST. Moreover, the college is recognized by the University Grants Commission (UGC) under sections 2(f) and 12(B) and is affiliated with Mohan Lal Sukhadia University, Udaipur. The college is conducting examination every year respectively and these exams includes approximately 1900-2000 regular students and more than 2000 private students annually. The college is the second-largest college in the Chittorgarh district. The majority of its students (almost 60%) are female, and it has 30 acres of land with more than 4 thousand square mtr constructed area. It is located in the southern region of the state of Rajasthan and almost one hundred of kilometer from the airports at Dabok.

The college has a central library with enough current literature, lecture halls, and a large playground. Every year, hundreds of students graduate from the college and go on to pursue higher education, training programs in different parts of the country. Nevertheless, various extracurricular and co-curricular activities are planned out and carried out efficiently at college level. Throughout the year, two NSS units, YDC, Women Cell, Students Union, Planning Forum, and other committees actively strive to plan various programs for the student's holistic development as well as fulfilling their social obligations and all such programs for improving the College are recommended and carried out by CDC and IQAC.

- Highly qualified, sincere and experienced Faculty members.
- Innovative learner centric teaching Learning Pedagogical approach.
- Academic Counselling cell to take care of advanced as well as slow Learners.
- Constantly good performance in university exams.
- Student diversity regarding to gender as well as region (more girls and rural students are studied in the college).
- Direct transfer of various scholarships for SC, ST, OBC-SBC, Medhavi and Minorities students under Central and State Government Schemes in very transparent manner for financial support.
- College has begged National and state level NSS awards.
- Youth Development Centre (YDC) has been running from last six years in college and it also conducted counseling program, organize lectures, speeches, mock interviews and various types of activities for overall development of the students.
- The college consist of Active Women Cell, Cultural & Literary Committee, Planning Forum etc. for organizing/participating different activities and programs.
- Student Union Election held every year as per State Government, Commissionerate and College Education schedule under the guideline of *Lingdoh Committee*.

Institutional Weakness

- Lack of autonomy in academic and administrative procedures is the significant obstacle. We are unable to develop and design market-oriented curricula.
- Absence of airport at Chittorgarh makes it difficult for the scientists across Nation to visit Institute physically for Workshops and Seminars.
- Lack of utilization of resources due to shorting of teaching as well as not-teaching staff.

Institutional Opportunity

- Presence of Institutes of National Importance in the close vicinity like IIM, Udaipur.
- The College can utilize its large land for various purposes for example it can use to construct academic and administrative block, classrooms/laboratories, indoor stadium, hostels for boys & girls, staff quarters, principal house.
- Development of proper sports facilities as well as equipped auditorium/seminar hall.

Institutional Challenge

- Poor Teacher: Student Ratio
- Practicals are the back bone of scientific learning and teaching, accommodation of large number of

students in lab is a big challenge .

- Lack of trained staff for Introducing/adopting/implementing of new policies/technologies in official/administrative/examination area.
- Environment of the Nimbahera is very dusty & polluted. Termite/white ant (dimak) is also creating trouble and always attacks to plants, documents/papers, books, doors etc.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Being affiliated with a government college, the emphasis is on the efficient delivery of the curriculum using approaches that are centered on the learners. The college has adopted a framework for a learning outcome-based curriculum, and faculty members put in a lot of effort to meet course and program objectives. Innovative teaching and learning pedagogies that heavily rely on ICT are used to enhance the delivery of curriculum. Through teaching planners, students are aware well in advance of the lecture plans and teaching approach for the specific class. Teaching schedules are shared via WhatsApp and posted on departmental notice boards. Remote access of the library is made possible for Faculties and students through NLIST. The curriculum for UG and PG Classes includes topics like gender sensitization, professional ethics and environmental education. College provides a strong feedback system where feedback is received, examined, shared with the professors, and made available to all stakeholders on the institutional website. Needy stakeholders receive training using feedback to increase their quality.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The purpose of the induction program is to familiarize students with campus life and all of the running programs there. The college's academic counselling cell identify students in slow and advanced learners and provide special instruction to make them familiar with the learning ecosystem of the institution. Mentorship is also provided to the students through Teacher Guardian scheme, where each student is assisted by a teacher-guardian who mentors them throughout the span of course. Participative learning is also promoted through problem solving exercises on Whatsapp and by online study groups and self-structured assignments. Attainments of program outcome and course outcome are evaluated by the institution through Merit positions, employment generation and progression to higher studies.

Research, Innovations and Extension

A robust innovation ecosystem has been established at the college. The college authority provides academic leave to the respective faculties to attend conference, workshops and seminars at different levels. NSS Units consistently collaborate in different initiatives, conducted by social groups or organization, like Swacchta Abhiyan, blood donation, traffic awareness campaigns, AIDS awareness campaigns, COVID awareness campaigns, water health campaigns, food packet distribution campaigns, etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

As far as infrastructure is concerned the college campus has an enormous 5.9 hectare rich green space that

combines laboratories, well-equipped lecture theaters and smart classrooms with ICT capabilities, virtual classrooms, sports complexes and athletic fields. College also provides various learning resources to the students such as access of network of ICT infrastructure in the departments, student resource center in the library, and computer center. Besides there is WIFI facility in the campus. With the use of NLIST support, remote access is offered. The library offers subscriptions to the online journals like Shodh Sindhu and Shodh Ganga. Links to the several materials have been published by the library on the institutional website.

Student Support and Progression

The college comprise of students from a variety of socioeconomic and academic backgrounds, and offers them scholarships, awards, and beneficiary programs in accordance with government regulations. Scholarships are given out based on category and academic potential. Scholarships for further education from the CM, scholarships from the Central Sector, the Inspire Award, the Kalibai Bheel Scooty Scholarship, the Devnarayan Scooty Scholarship, and others. Students' moving to further education and the number of students choosing occupations and placements are used to analyze graduation outcomes.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Governance of college is participative with focus on inclusivity accordance with the vision and mission statement. There are committees in the college which work towards holistic development of the college through various plans and activities. College has a organogram with hierarchy and displayed on college website. College has emphasized a lot on society connect programs and experiential learning flagship programs are framed with a clear vision providing scientific temperament to the diverse number of activities.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college implemented state's policies that were either mandated by the UGC, made public by the federal or state governments or deemed appropriate for the college's advancement. A specific code of conduct is posted on the institution's website for both employees and students. The campus has a single-use plastic ban and is a plastic-free zone. The campus is barrier-free and entirely accessible to students with disabilities. Girls are well-represented in the college's NSS and Women Cell. Students have accessibility to separate bathrooms, common areas and bike stands. The college runs a number of programs to educate people about self-defense, women's rights and children's rights. The College has a Borewell for major water supply.

There are some initiatives are taken by the college authority to keep the campus green such as plantation drive, ban of cars and bikes for a day in campus to the environment clean and others as well. The college vehemently encourage students to become environmentally conscious and for this various initiatives are applied at the college level. In order to make students decent and responsible citizens, college instill in them the essential rights, duties, and values embodied in the constitution through various ways. Meanwhile prizes are awarded to the winners and runners-up in the events that are arranged throughout the year in the college.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	As affiliated to Mohan Lal Sukhadia University, Udaipur our college follows the university's curriculum by using an interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary approach in the core, minor, elective/open elective courses. However, our college has started an Interdisciplinary Education Association (IDEA) to facilitate sharing of ideas between the teaching faculty and students. In addition, the institution offers students skill development courses and training programs that are beneficial for determining potential and carrying out plans. All undergraduate students are now required to take courses like Anandam, elementary computer education, and environmental studies so facilities for this will also arrange in proper ration.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Under the current Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) any student may transfer from one college to another that is affiliated with Mohan Lal Sukhadia University, Udaipur, however credit transfers to other universities from MLSU is entirely the responsibility of the university. Only under certain special circumstances, as outlined in the admission policy of the state government, is there a possibility of credit transfer between colleges located in the state. According to the instructions from MLSU, the College implements the NEP-related rules.
3. Skill development:	The college is about to begin Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) as advised by UGC for all programs that are consistent with the goals of NEP. The curriculum aims to promote the significance of giving opportunities and platforms for female students while keeping in mind the current state of society. In addition, steps will be taken to improve the students' bench abilities including the introduction of project work, summer training programs, skill development programs, communication and IT skills, etc. These course's structure helps students to improve their aptitudes. Additionally, the college offers the "Mukhyamantri Yuva Kaushal Vikas Yojana" which gives students the option of selecting a skill-development course from a list of 39 courses. It is a cooperative endeavor between the Rajasthan Skills and Livelihood Development Corporation and the Commissionerate College Education, MMYKY.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Being an affiliated college of the Mohanlal Sukhadia University, Udaipur and Rajasthan college education department, Jaipur we follow the curriculum provided by them. The Mohan Lal Sukhadia University Udaipur has a board of studies that develops the curriculum for both undergraduate and graduate courses.

The academic calendar, defined by the college carefully included academic calendar provided by the department of college education and posted on the college website, and the calendar is strictly followed by the college. A timetable committee lead by the principal develops a comprehensive schedule. Theory lessons, practical classes, tutorials, Chamber consulting hours, ICT, the library, value-added courses, and co-curricular activities are all effectively included into the timetable. The departmental heads coordinate the internal allocation of the schedule. Depending on their areas of expertise, different professors receive different syllabus. While keeping in mind the stated vision and mission of the college, each faculty member works to accomplish the Program Objectives (PO), Program Specific Objectives (PSO), and Course Objectives (CO) of their particular discipline. In the first lessons, each teacher evaluates each student's ability by means of a quiz and interactions. Also, the teachers make lesson plans and educational materials to present to the students. Students are informed about the lesson plan via WhatsApp groups and notice boards of the corresponding departments. The academic counselling cell at IQAC keeps track of how well the curriculum is being taught and makes sure that the syllabus is finished on time.

Different teaching methodologies are adopted by teachers for effective curricular delivery in blended mode, which includes

1. Lecture method.
2. Use of ICT: The college is well equipped with state-of-the-art smart class rooms, virtual class rooms, audio-visual and other ICT facilities.
3. Video lectures.
4. Study Groups: offline on campus and online study groups through WhatsApp and email are created.

Besides there are number of books available in the college library for the students and the facility of remote access to Students and teachers provided by library through NLIST.

The continuous internal evaluation of students' performance in term/unit tests, projects, assignments, seminars etc. is a part of the college curriculum. To inculcate critical thinking among students various group discussions, and debates are organized in which students explore new ideas and enhance their performance level. information and skills. Course results are determined by how well students perform in both academic and extracurricular activities, as well as in-class activities, laboratory work, and assignments for various exams. The college has developed over the years into one of the most proactive institutions for higher education and played role of instrument in shaping the students' futures both professionally and personally.

The institution makes optional use of buildings, demonstrates enough room for all departments, and uses shared facilities under IQAC's constant supervision. There are modern laboratories and departments that are fully furnished.

The college's physical facilities are as follows:

- The main building has the Administrative, Academic and Establishment sections, Chamber of Principal, Departments of Science, Social Science and Commerce and a Central Library.
- Classrooms, in a total 22 of different capacities, meet the requirements of UG and PG students.
- Each classroom is available for 80-100 UG students.
- Each Classroom is equipped with appropriate comfortable furniture, good ventilation, adequate LED light, good quality large black/green boards and other necessary material to impart knowledge to students.
- To enhance the Teaching-learning process, the faculty and the students are regularly motivated to use online platforms such as WhatsApp, Google, YouTube video, different online live class apps like zoom, Google meet.
- A common staff room is available for valuable discussion common meetings and relaxation for the college faculties.
- ICT lab is equipped with 34 computers, 5MBPS ILL internet connection and LCD projectors along with an interactive board.
- A smart classroom (Room No. 33) has been developed in the college and a ICTs enable seminar hall with e-class facility.
- A conference hall cum smart classroom (Room No. 17) has been developed in the college with ICTs enabled facility.
- The library is housed in a separate. It has a large reading room.
- Student and Faculty Support Facilities include the students' meeting spaces, girls common room, college lawns, and seminar hall, where students meet for various activities and programs.
- Our college has a Garden, developed by **Nagar Palika Nimbahera**.
- To promote sports personalities at the state and national levels, the College supports and motivates

students. Apart from academic facilities, IQAC of the College has also executed its commitment to provide facilities and training for sports and cultural activities.

- Various sports are played by the students of the College including, Volleyball, Basketball, Badminton, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Tennis, Athletics etc.

- Learning experiences for stakeholders during guest lecturers, seminars, and student forum activities, etc.
- The augmentation and updating of IT facilities in the college are reflected in the following:

The establishment of the computer laboratory:

- This laboratory is furnished with an LCD Projector, 34 computers with an internet facility, a digital podium besides relevant required furniture.
- **There are 03 rooms with a smart board facility.** These classrooms are used by UG & PG departments for teaching seminars and small workshops.
- The e-classroom in the college is used for administrative purposes like virtual meetings with Commissionerate and district administration and live teaching for the students.

LMS:

- The E-content repository has been established as Rajeev Gandhi e-content Bank and RAJLMS.
- Various Online live YouTube video links of Skill Development courses are available on our college webpage. It is a partial LMS which are freely available for the students.
- Audio Video Tools, LCD projectors, smart, computers with LAN connection, e-podium for recording e-lectures, personal laptops, and Wi-Fi enabled in college.
- Digital visualizers etc. are some of the learning management systems used by the college.
- There are 26 CCTV cameras which have been installed in the main building, different corridors, the principal chamber, library, and cycle stand, and the main TV screen is placed in the principal room for constant observation.

MIS:

- The online Admission Process for UG and PG students is implemented by CCE Rajasthan.
- The accounts and Finance Section prepare monthly salary bills for all the employees through Pay Manager Portal.
- Valuable information for students is uploaded on the website giving information related to subject combination, academic calendar, admission policy, and code of ethics.
- LAN for access to a database of student's academic performance and other queries.
- Various Government and citizen apps and modules on the Rajasthan SSO portal give access to the facility of Property Return, Provident fund, a profile of employees, etc.

1. College practices decentralization and participatory management in its organizational structure. The institution's main functions are classified into Administration, Academics, Examination, and Human Resources. Every effort is made to include a mechanism for evaluating and monitoring all quality parameters through its organizational structure i.e., Principal, IQAC Head, Criteria in charge, Department Heads, faculties, and stakeholders.
2. In the Hierarchy first comes the principal secretary of Higher Education, subsequently comes Directors/Commissioner, Joint Directors, and the Principal of the college who acts as the administrative head of the Institution. Being a government college, all the major decisions are taken by the Directorate/Commissionerate of higher education. The financial matter of the college is looked after by the Drawing and Disbursing Officer -DDO generally whose Principal of the College..
3. For the smooth functioning of the college, there are various committees like Examination Committee, Discipline Committee, Purchase Committee, Development Committee, Anti-Ragging Committee, etc.

The work of the College Administration is decentralized, and the various subcommittees perform as follows:

1. The Examination Committee conducts the main Annual Exams, various Competitive Exams as per the timetable.
2. In the College, the Admission Committee pursues the students' admission for different classes and streams as per norms and merit.
3. The Timetable Committee maintains the curriculum for theory and practical classes of the students in the college.
4. The Discipline Committee looks after the overall discipline of the college so that students try to maintain the rules and regulations of the college.
5. The Anti-Ragging Committee sees that the students are fully secured inside the college campus.
6. The Development Committee looks after the infrastructural development of the college.
7. The Purchase Committee looks after the purchase of various equipment, instruments, and chemicals.
8. The IQAC of the college is developing a quality system consciously programmed to improve the academic and administrative performance of the college.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 *The institutional perspective plan is effectively deployed and functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules, and procedures, etc*

Response:

The Principal, being the head of the institution, is responsible for maintaining a congenial and good academic environment. Major policy decisions are taken by the Commissionerate /Directorate of higher education which is communicated to the college. In the college, the principal is the apex authority and forms various committees. The key aspects of the organizational structure of the college are as follows:

Administrative setup and function of various bodies:

College functions under the supervision of governing body and the principal heads it for functioning and growth including administrative, academic, co-curricular, extracurricular and extension programs. Faculty are directly responsible for the academic and curricular development of the students. Staff members have been assigned duties to various committees.

The function of various bodies:

For the smooth functioning of college activities more than 25 committees are identified. Every committee consists of a head and many members. They collectively plan the activities. The function of every committee is well defined. All committee heads reports to the principal who monitors the effective functioning of these bodies. Besides this people are recruited on a contractual basis via College Development Committee like security guards, Gardeners, Sweepers, Typists, Computer operators, and Peons.

Service Rules:

The College is a government institute and therefore it is mandatory to follow the rules, regulations and policies framed by the State Government Rajasthan Service Rules-RSR. It includes rules, responsibilities, conditions of services discharge of duty, increments, kinds of leave, code of conduct incentives for attending FDP etc. Nevertheless, whatever best can be implemented at its level is always carried out by the college.

Recruitment:

The permanent teaching staff is recruited by RPSC, Ajmer. The qualification and eligibility for other recruitments are prescribed by the Government/UGC. The Class IV employees are recruited through employment exchange as per need. In addition, there is a provision for compensatory appointment in the place of the demise of a close relative based on the Government Policy.

Promotional Policies:

The regular promotions are decided based on the recommendation made by the departmental promotion committee based on specific guidelines that are framed for the purpose by the UGC/State Government.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism:

Government College Nimbahera adheres to the genuine issues and difficulties of the stakeholders at individual as well as college levels. Students are encouraged to use feedback methods to express their constructive suggestions and grievances. The College has framed Internal Complain Committee, Anti Ragging Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, and Women Harassment Committee to solve such issues with full commitment judicially and without any biases. Besides grievance redressal related to Government College Nimbahera, the employee ID of the Principal of the college is mapped by the Rajasthan Sampark department. Anyone having a grievance against the college can file a complaint from anywhere in India. The complaint is forwarded to the college through the central office. SC, ST, and Minorities also have the right to put grievances regarding their issues. The matter is discussed with the related committee and action is taken accordingly.

Audit of College Development Committee (CDC) accounts is done by Chartered Accountant.

The AAO and accountant maintain the details concerning accounts. The main functions are as follows:

The admission process starts from the first week of June and is completed up-to first week of July for fresh admissions in first year of graduation. The online admission process is adopted from the session 2014-15 and before that the manual process was running.
- Student Union Election holds generally in the last week of August month every year and the College completed it as per the guideline prescribed by the DCE on the basis of suggestions given by the Lingdoh Committee and done fare as well as unbiased.
- Inauguration of the elected students' union function is decided on the basis of written and passed proposals of the members of the students union and recommended by the student union advisory committee. The guests are invited by the College suggested by the student union and generally it is organized like a public function.
- Cultural week organizes in December- January every year, and literary, cultural & all other co-curricular activities are managed under various forums like literary and cultural committees, student unions, women cell, planning forum etc. Inauguration and closing ceremony honored by the guest invited by the forums/college. Students participate and join with full of joy and zest.
- The Annual Function organizes in the last week of January every year. This program was also arranged by the College on the basis of a proposal from the student union and a recommendation from the student union advisory committee. The guests are invited by the College as per suggested by the student union and generally it is organized like a public function. prizes are distributed to encourage and motivate students.

5. **Evidence of Success:**

- Student union election completed fare and unbiased.
- A lot of activities arrange and organize in the cultural week and students participate and join with full of joy and passion.
- The Inauguration of the student union function is organized well managed and invited reputed guests. The Honourable Higher Education Minister and other Ministers of the Rajasthan Government have graced the event many times. In the function of 2012, Hon. Higehr Education Minister Graced the Function as Chief Guest and declared for prompting college UG to PG, as result the College was promoted from UG to PG with PG course M A in Hindi that was started from the session 2013-14. Sh. Udaylal Anjana is the Chief Guest of the function of 2020 as Hon.Minister-Indira Gandhi Nahar and in 2022-23 as Hon.Minister-Co-operative. In the year 2018-19, Sh. Shrichand Kripalani honourable Urban Development Minister of Rajasthan graced the college function. and Science Stream (UG-B Sc Course) takeover by the state government as well as three P G courses sanctioned for this college. MLA, MP and local leaders are generally the chief guests of these functions/events.

6. **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

Innovations and new practices can cause problems for the College, staff and students, such as online admission and Student Union Elections. However, next year all stakeholders will be familiar with the new practice and used to it. EVM can help solve these problems, but short of staff is a serious issue.

BEST PRACTICE 2

1. **Title of the Practice:** Entrepreneurship/Skill based capacity building- Summer Camp (2018 &

2019).

2. Goal:

The objectives of adopting above selected courses for regular students of Government College Nimbahera in summer camp are as follows:

- To develop and enhance employment oriented skills.

1. The Context:

Dr. Bhimrao Ambedkar P.G. Government College Nimbahera organized two summer camp programs for skill upgradation for students in 2017-18 and 2018-19. These camps were organized to direct the energy of youth towards life and positivity because most of the students are from rural backgrounds.

1. The Practice:

The above Summer Camps were organized in June in both years and were totally free of cost to the interested students so that they can make good use of the Summer Holidays. The program of session 2017-18 on Basic Knowledge of Computer was organized in association with Rajasthan Skill and Livelihood Development Corporation-RSLDC and in the session of 2018-19 the program initiated koushal unniyan- Computer Basic Knowledge. The efforts are made by entire college staff and classes were taught by computer tutor Mr. Puneet Rao Maratha.

1. Evidence of Success:

33 students in 2017-18 and 23 in 2018-19 were benefited by summer camp programs. During the pandemic, classroom teaching was suspended and e-classes/e-contents were used to continue the teaching. Those who completed the courses are comfortable with these online teaching methodologies, helping them in higher education studies and employment.

1. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Many challenges encountered during summer camps which are as follows:

- To develop related skills in the students by successfully completing it in the summer vacation.
- To maintain the consistency of students in the prescribed training programs as per the application received.

Response:

The personality development of the rural class students.

Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Govt. PG college is mainly attributed for its distinctive and notable steps in relation to student's community elation and empowerment. It has been observed that the college has always tried, from the outset, to devise different approaches in the college to encourage the students in different sphere of life. Among its distinct performative factors, the college insightful attempts to uplift or empower the rural background students in different sphere is commendable. Moreover nearly ninety percent students of the college are from interior rural areas and round about seventy percent among them are girls. Prior these rural belonging students were being deprived in many educational forms due to their financial and other reasons which lead them to confront different academic challenges throughout years and many of them even failed to make a successful career. Hence to keep in mind all these student's oriented issues the college is taking significant steps and also executing different distinctive activities in relation to rural background students. They are following discuss here in brief:

Book Bank (Donated Books): The college existing book bank aim is to help the students by providing them course related and other essential books which are unaffordable particularly for the poor rural family class students. Moreover, the bank stores the magazines and journals on current issues and also one can access autobiographical, nonfictional, literary texts as well. Furthermore in present scenario the role of local charitable trust in college book bank can't be overlooked. Every year the trustees donate plentiful books in the college book bank. However among these books many are quite expensive and easily not find in the market. Thus such remarkable contribution by the respective charitable trust is helping many poor students in the college. For instance, the trust named Omvati charitable trust has donated approximately three thousand book in college book which have been distributed particularly among the rural background students. Despite there are many individual Bhamashah who are also making contribution by donating books in college book bank. The book stocks and distribution of the books are being kept under the vigilance of college authority. Through its distinctive initiative the college has played a quintessential role to wipe out the problems of the books for the students mainly for those belonging to rural poor class family.

Communication Skills:

The communication skill has become the necessary part of every students life in today's advanced world. This skill plays a substantial role to reflects someone personality. The government is also trying to encourage the students by starting different skills training courses and literary programs at college level to enhance communication skill. Even the college also organizes literary program, poetry recitation, and

training course every years to empower the speaking ability of the students. Besides the college is trying to improve conversational skill of the students especially of rural areas by implementing some effective majors such as beginning of language classes and online apps as well. The beginning of language classes is a nice initiative for the students where they are trained through the practice of LSRW by the erudite language experts

Competitive exams preparation:

Nevertheless the college is making efforts to prepare the students for the competitive exams by using various approaches with the help of senior faculty, subject experts and through online educational apps. However, the senior faculty arranges weekly extra classes for the needy rural class students. Meanwhile the students are using online educational apps like Dishari Yojna which consist of materials on different competitive exams. Moreover, the college has arranged the authentic and qualitative question papers which are prepared mainly for the preparation of the competitive exams. These question papers include both subjective and objective study material. They are prepared at college level with the help of erudite scholars and senior faculty of the respective department.

Additionally, there are other activities ongoing in the college for the sake of student’s holistic development specifically belong to village areas. Among other co-curricular activities, that exist in present period, the prominent is the ICT TRAINING. During Covid-19 period the college consistently keep on teaching through different online social media apps such as You tube, Google drive and WhatsApp etcetera. Thus all these above discussion signifies the fact that college has made noteworthy attempts to brigthen and exhilarate the student’s morale in terms of competitive exams and career. Despite all these remarkable steps taken by the college in recent period are helping presently the college students particularly from rural middle class background.
