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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Mama Baleshwar Dayal Government College Kushalgarh, the holy land of Vagad, is located 60 km from Banswara division on the Gujarat and Madhya Pradesh border. The college was established in 1990 with Arts and Commerce Faculty. The college was approved to be named Mama Baleshwar Dayal Government College Kushalgarh on 27 March 2001 by the order of the state government. Messiah of the poor, freedom fighter, socialist thinker Mama Baleshwar Dayal was born on 10 March 1905 in Etawah (U.P.). In this tribal dominated area, his contribution towards education, social evils and public awakening was unparalleled. Hindi, English, Sanskrit, Geography, Sociology, History, Political Science, Economics subjects are being conducted in the Arts Faculty in the college from the beginning. Due to negligible number of students in this field, the Commerce Faculty was closed after ten years of its establishment. The college was upgraded to postgraduate (Hindi and Geography) in April 2017 and Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics subjects were opened in the Science Faculty on 6 July 2018. The college has 600 seats in the undergraduate Arts Faculty and 88-88 seats in Biology and Mathematics streams in the Science Faculty and 60-60 seats in Hindi Literature and Geography subjects in postgraduate. In 2016, RUSA allocated Rs 2 crore to the college for college development. As per the policy of the college, the college was recognized by UGC under section 1956 in 2F and 12B on 29 March 2005. Two units of National Service Scheme and one unit of Rover Ranger are operating in the college. 2262 regular students are studying in the college. The college is currently affiliated to Govind Guru Tribal University, Banswara. The college is moving ahead on the path of continuous development on the theme of enthusiasm among students and trust among parents. The monogram of the college depicts the Veena-playing Goddess Saraswati and the motto 'Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya', which is a symbol of positive energy and the purest form of knowledge.

Vision

Government agencies have noticed that students require enhanced education, so our goal is to develop the college into a premier learning and teaching institution in accordance with the vision in a holistic way, which includes empowering women through gender-based budgeting, providing career counseling and self-defense, and instilling high values through liberal and expertise-based education. The goal is to instill in learners a feeling of societal accountability, service to the community, and trusteeship in order to foster peaceful interactions across all facets of the community, which will ultimately be to their economic and cultural advantage.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

Strengthening tribal students

As the college is situated in the Tribal Sub-Plan (TSP) region, Government MBD College, Kushalgarh is committed to the empowerment and upliftment of tribal students. This Objective is attained through concerted efforts aimed at the holistic development of all students including girls from marginalized and weaker sections of the society so as to enable them to become competent with the mainstream society.

We are committed to provide quality education, social awareness, and personality development to the students mainly from the rural and tribal regions. The institution focuses to impart better education to students ensuring their participation in community service, nurturing critical thinking, developing soft skills, proficiency in communication and analytical skills as well as developing a sense of moral and social responsibility.

Following measures have been implemented to strengthen students:

FINANCIAL SUPPORT is provided through scholarships from Samaj Kalyan Vibhaag Rajasthan govt.

Post matric scholarship Scheme is available for reserved category student. Post Matric scholarship was disbursed for more than 1000 students during last five years.

Education Incentive Scheme for ST students— Janjati Aarthik Sahayata evam Grah Kiraya by Tribal Area Development Department, Government of Rajasthan is availed by all ST regular students.

Career Counselling Cell works to guide and encourage students to nurture their college aspirations. Many of the departments are engaged in counselling and mentoring of the students of their departments and random students seeking their guidance.

College has YouTube channel named mbdcollegekushalgarh and an instagram account named mbdcollegeKushalgarh to spread information and to provide better connectivity to the students in the anywhere in the region.

College is eco-friendly, tobacco free plastic free clean and green campus

Considerable number of publications in Peer Reviewed Journals by the Faculty Members.

Welcoming and harmonious atmosphere of college- The college promotes harmony and an all-inclusive spirit among its students and staff members. The attitude of staff members for students and their guardians is also approachable

Safe and secure campus - The whole campus of institution including all the rooms, is under the surveillance of CCTV thereby providing a very secure and safe environment for its girl students.

Institutional Weakness

Lack of autonomy-As the college is a government set up and all the policies and regulations are as per government directions. The college administration is unable to resolve many crucial matters like filling of vacant posts, opening new subjects to offer a wider choice to freshers and even PG classes in more streams.

Lack of funds for development- The College has limited financial resources. It is dependent on state budget and grants .The CDC and boys fund too has limited funds as it being a college with maximum number from scheduled tribes so the fees collection too is minimal. Hence there is acute shortage of any fund for infrastructure augmentation or other areas like classroom furniture, computers, books and journals of international repute.

Placement options are Limited- Being an undergraduate college campus placement drive gets affected. Maximum number opts for higher studies progression. Most of the passed out students either opt for B.Ed. or PG courses. Moreover the lack of vocational courses also is a cause of the low employability. Limited number of Industries in Banswara district is also a hindrance.

Vacant Posts and lack of human resources-The College is working with almost fifty percent of the Sanctioned strength in staff. For last quite a few years no full time principal has chaired the institution. Out of the Sanctioned post almost fifty percent seats have been filled and frequent transfers also affect the governance.

Ineffective Mechanism for Collection or Maintenance of Records of Passed Out Students- The college faces a big challenge in collecting or maintaining a record of the passed out students about their employment status.

Institutional Opportunity

Education for tribal students at low cost- The College is in the Tribal sub-plan region and college is focussing on holistic development of the shy, introvert Scheduled Tribal students and bringing them at par with the mainstream of the society. The low fees according to government norms and availability of various scholarships attracts students for admissions. Good Examination results along with personal career guidance given by the faculty members helps in building a good will of the institution, thereby increasing number of student enrolment every year.

Quality Education -The College is striving to provide quality education from highly qualified faculty and enhance the opportunity of students belonging to marginalized sections of society to empower themselves. The college provides an opportunity to students of rural and tribal background to mould themselves into enlightened citizens of the nation.

Opportunity to strengthen base knowledge-The institution provides an opportunity to strengthen their base knowledge of each subject so that they can excel it in their progression to higher studies.

Opportunity for Community Development with Locals-The institution is making efforts to deepen its involvement with local communities and foster social responsibility as well as community development.

Student Support Services- The college enhances success opportunities by providing student support services that cater to their academic and personality development needs.

Online and Offline Education method- A blend of Online and Offline Education method has been cultivated since pandemic and opportunity to gain knowledge from different sources and platforms for students is being provided by the college. Efforts to enhance teaching and learning process with ICT skills is being practiced in the institution

Institutional Challenge

Challenge to in still Competitive skills- the main challenge of colleges in bringing the tribal and rural background students at par with the mainstream to face the competitive challenges of present day education.

Creating Employability amongst students due to its Under Graduate and Non Vocational courses.

Improper Teacher Student Ratio-The teaching and non-teaching staff is not in proportion to the workload and student strength. Moreover Teacher Student Ratio is improper as the appointment of staff is dependent on Government the college is unable to improve this ratio.

Financial Limitations hamper development of college as dependent on Government for funds. The student computer ratio is also improper as the scarcity of funds affect purchase of such items.

Short tenure and frequent change of staff members affect the implementation of policies.

Lack of research centre affects the research work.

Language restrictions to compete with other students from English medium background in job opportunities.

Maintenance of equipment without technical staff and scarcity of funds is a big challenge.

Limited number of Industries in the town hamper Industry-Academia linkages.

Non-availability of professional courses-Placement of students is a challenge due to non-availability of professional courses.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Since the college is wholly a government institution, the syllabi of curricular (prepared by Govind Guru Tribal University, Banswara) is strictly followed .The degree level courses impart theoretical as well as applied

knowledge to the students which help the students to take admissions in P.G. courses (of various subjects) in other colleges and Universities. The courses are regularly discussed and revised by a committee of experts, formed by the University, but changes as per local needs and suggestions of senior faculty members are executed so as to make the syllabi more suitable for the learners. Courses offered in the college integrate issues related to gender, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics. The college offers Arts and Science streams subject at UG level along with Geography and Hindi at PG level. For the academic growth of the institution we adhere to the Annual Academic Calendar issued by the Commissionerate. Curriculum is delivered by subject teachers to the students in accordance with the prepared time table. The workload of the faculty members is in accordance with the norms prescribed by the UGC. Faculty wise time table is prepared by the college Administration. The teachers recommend relevant books and other study materials to the students as per the prescribed syllabus.

Along with subject knowledge proficiency in language and expression ability is also inculcated among students through its examination scheme of descriptive and analytical questions. College has adopted its own internal system for the implementation of evaluation procedure during the course of the academic session to evaluate the learning abilities and capacities of the students at various levels. Practical are also held regularly. Practical records of students are checked after every exercise and a viva-voce is conducted during the process After assessing, the students are also given suggestions by the teachers. Through the annual examination students are assessed externally. Students are encouraged to visit library for reference books. E-content and Pdf Study material is also provided to students.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching-learning And Evaluation

The college's faculty members have been duly selected through a rigorous selection procedure implemented by RPSC, comprising of a written screening test and an interview. At present, the college has 14 faculty members consisting of 2 Professors and 12 Assistant Professors & 1 Samvida lecturer who are fully devoted to impart the latest and best possible knowledge to the students by the government. The teachers use both conventional methods like lectures, interactive sessions, group discussions as well as student centric methods like experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methods. Students are given class assignments for focusing on self-study and to encourage independent learning. These activities are undertaken with an aim to move beyond the realm of formal learning and develop creative and critical thinking. It gives them the opportunity and confidence to display their latent creativity and energies. The practical in laboratories are performed in batches where students learn from each other thereby encouraging participatory learning. At the end of the session, students are evaluated by the University, and the students are categorized on the basis of these examinations and special care is given to the weaker students by the faculties. Since the college is affiliated to GOVIND GURU TRIBAL UNIVERSITY (G.G.T.U.) Banswara and doesn't have an autonomous evaluation process. Annual examinations are conducted by G.G.T.U. Banswara. The pass percentage in the final year has been 96.67 % during the last 5 years, which is way above the university average.

Field work and surveys carried out in M.A .Geography provides adequate exposure to the students to work in outside world, collect and analyse data and form conclusions.

I.C.T. enabled teaching methods have been made available in the college. Faculties also upload video lectures on YouTube channel. The online teaching-learning process is supported by regular practical Sessions.

Course Outcomes, Programme Outcomes, and Programme Specific Outcomes are displayed on the college website and the program and course outcomes are evaluated, and corrective measures are taken. It involves analysing feedback on the curriculum.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Knowledge transfer by teaching and research activities: Teachers at MBD College assist in the transfer of knowledge to learners in a meaningful and comprehensible manner, to aid this role, teachers use their proficiency to use teaching materials such as text, reference books, and lecture notes. One Smart Classroom are also established in the college for real-time blended teaching and learning. During the pandemic times, all the teachers prepared the video lectures, uploaded on the YouTube Channel of college, prepared notes for Rajiv Gandhi e-content bank under Gyan-Ganga scheme and share with the students. Experiential learning is promoted through practical sessions, visits to places of academic interest etc. One of our faculties Dr Kalyanmal Singhada appointed as PhD supervisor in GGTU, Banswara.

Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Skill Development Cell: To promote entrepreneurship, innovation and skills in students and Entrepreneurship, innovation and Skill Cell has formed which organizes activities aiming at motivating students and faculty for research and innovation and also at preparing them for entrepreneurship. Various activities such as spoken English, yoga trainer, travel consultant, account and tax assistant, web developer skill, CCTV installer are arranged under Mukhya Mantra Yuva Kaushal Yojna (MMYKY) in the college campus.

Social Issues and Holistic Development: The College is situated in the tribal area and its institutional distinctiveness always inspires teachers and students to do something for the betterment of the society. Thus our Institution is committed to nurture the spirit of social commitment among the students in order to make them responsible citizens of the country. Our Institution is always aware of the fact of fulfilling its social responsibility and strives to accomplish community development tasks. Students encouraged opt one activity from NSS/Scout. Students learn a lot while participating in these activities, besides this, Women Cell, ELC Club, are platforms which help them to associate themselves with the social activities. Thus students develop empathy, responsiveness etc. towards society.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

MBD Government College was established in 1990 and since then it giving higher education to students of tribal belt of Southern Rajasthan. The college campus is spread over 59489 square meters of land; the total constructed area of the college is approximately 2409 square meters and is located 60 km away from Banswara district headquarter.

Institute comprises Academic Block, Administrative Block, Library and a Sports ground.

The college has 11 classrooms for teaching and a multipurpose hall for various activities and combined classes. All classrooms are well ventilated with natural light. For holding conferences, meetings and guest lectures, a well-equipped seminar hall with ICT facilities is also available. The canteen is located adjacent to the main

entrance gate of the college and provides snacks and beverages at affordable rates to students and faculty.

Two parking lots are constructed to facilitate vehicles of students and faculty members. There are two RO systems with the chiller are installed to fulfil the need for clean and safe drinking water.

The college has a decent library enriched with plenty of books of various subjects with reading area to provide peaceful environment to the students and faculty members. There is a regular supply of four daily newspapers and several monthly magazines.

The college has a spacious library with dimensions 46x33 sq. ft. and 61x24 sq.ft. One section is equipped with arrangements of books while the other section is kept as reading room.

Presently the college has 16 computers, installed for educational and administrative work. The college had internet facility with 50 MBPS bandwidth earlier which was presently updated to 100 mbps in 2024. The campus is equipped with Wi-Fi facility which is available for students and faculty members for use.

Our college campus keeps CCTV monitoring in every corner of premises including classrooms, corridors and campus. We have two projectors with rolling screen for various activities such as presentations, lectures etc.

Student Support and Progression

The institution is continuously making efforts to provide support to its students through different schemes and committees. The Students seek guidance from Advisory Board, Counselling Cell, as well as the personal rapport between student and teacher is also quite helpful for them. The Anti-Ragging Cell, Internal Complaints Committee and Grievance Cell can be approached for any type of complaints, thereby giving the girls a free and fearless environment. The college website, notice boards and staff members inform them about various procedures related to their admission, scholarship, and examination. Besides well - furnished class rooms, equipped laboratories, library and internet connection, the college provides best facilities and opportunities of curricular and extracurricular activities. Through schemes like Pratiyogita Dakshta and Skill Development efforts are being made to improve the employability status of the students. Rules of the State Government regarding the scholarship and financial aids are strictly followed. Different scholarships, scooty Yojna for meritorious students, Book Bank Scheme of Library are some examples of financial support to them.. Awards and prizes are conferred on the deserving students to encourage them for better performance always.

The percentage of student progressing to higher studies is comparatively low as there are limited seats in PG classes in the entire Banswara district. However maximum number of passed out students opt for B.ed Degree and sooner or later join as teachers in this belt.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The College has a well-defined organizational structure for effective decision making and execution of responsibilities. The Principal, the CDC, IQAC and the teaching staff play important roles in the planning and execution of its policies for the academic and administrative activities. The vision of the college is to impart quality education to the rural students incorporating quality parameters of national education program and to enhance professionalism, humanism and social responsibility amongst the students.

Effective and optimum utilization of human and other resources is being done to enhance the quality of education to realize the mission of the college i.e.to focus on the holistic development of its students, to explore their innate talents and bring forth their potentialities to the utmost capacity. The college is providing a healthy and positive learning environment to our students

For decentralization- the Principal carries out routine administrative works of the college. To Support the principal, the teaching staff is entrusted with academic and managerial responsibility of conducting curricular and extracurricular activities. Faculties also maintain the discipline among students. Different committees are formed for academic and qualitative development. Student union president along with her executive body takes active participation in conducting different activities.

Participative Management-Interaction between principal, staff members and students is seen at all levels. Students can easily approach all staff for personal guidance and help. Faculty members, office staff and students join hands with the Principal.

The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structure and methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals. Some of activates of IQAC in this regard are:

- **1.Students feedback -:** Students feedback ascertains the quality of teaching and learning process, syllabus, results and infrastructure. After evaluating the feedback from students, the IQAC notes down the strengths and weakness and report is prepared for the necessary changes.
- **2.** Academic monitoring: The Academic Deans monitor the progress and quality of classes.
- **3. Syllabus Monitoring**: The worthy principal (chairman IQAC) keeps vigil on the completion of syllabus and ascertains information regarding the quantum syllabus completed, so that the prescribed syllabus is completed within stipulated time.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	In order to develop the all round capacities of the students - intellectual, aesthetic ,social, physical, emotional and moral in a comprehensive way the colleges need to prepare for multi disciplinary Courses as per NEP Policy 2020. The institution strongly believes in multidisciplinary approach in education. The syllabus inclusive of this approach framed by the university will be implemented in earnest. According to the curriculum offered by the Govind Guru Tribal University, Banswara, the college uses an interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approach in its core disciplines. All undergraduate students are required to take courses like Environmental Studies. In addition, periodic extension talks on a range of subjects are held to spread knowledge and encourage an integrative and multidisciplinary culture inside the college. The college's research cell fosters creative inquiry and facilitates connections between departments as well as faculty and student interaction.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The institution will abide by the University and Commissionrate College Education, Rajasthan guidelines regarding the method of preparing Academic bank of credit.
3. Skill development:	The institution favors organizing skill development courses for the employability status of students which is the demand of today's education .In the session 2018-19 College conducted a 28 days Summer Camp from 03.06.2019- 30.06.2019. Along with this, in the session 2019-20, under the Mukhyamantri Yuva Kaushal Yojna, 61 students of college were registered under the special scheme for providing employment to many skill students under Rajasthan Skill and Livelihood Development Institute and College Education Rajasthan.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Regarding the adoption of Indian languages the college offers Hindi ,English, and Sanskrit subjects at degree level. All Teachers use bilingual methods for the students to grasp both languages. The Large number of students in Sanskrit and Hindi celebrate different occasions and Quiz competitions are held. Response:

The curriculum is received from the Govind Guru Tribal University, Banswara, to which the college is affiliated. The college follows the rules laid down by the State Government in administrative and financial matters and the University rules for the curriculum and examinations.

Time Table :- The workload of the faculty members is in accordance with the norms prescribed by the UGC. Faculty wise and teacher wise time table is prepared by the college Administration.

Curriculum :- Curriculum is delivered by subject teachers to the students in accordance with the prepared time table. The Curriculum helps the students in understanding fundamental concepts of all subjects in theory as well as practical, as the subject requires .The college also organizes workshops for teachers and students that keep them updated with the new teaching methods and techniques. Class Room Teaching with ICT Skills:- Our institution takes effective measures for effective delivery of the curriculum which include as, Class-room Teaching: For effective classroom teaching faculty members use PowerPoint presentations, e-resources and contents. Students are encouraged to visit library for reference books. E-content and Pdf Study material is also provided to students.

Annual Academic Calendar:- For the academic growth of the institution we adhere to the Annual Academic Calendar issued by the CCE ,Jaipur..The academic calendar is displayed on the department's HTE website, college notice board for reference of the students and staff. It carries a tentative schedule regarding admission process, teaching-learning schedule, evaluation blueprint, curricular and co curricular activities, extracurricular activities, major departmental and institutional events to be organised and dates of holidays. The college follows its academic calendar for conducting all examinations.

The issues addressed in the curriculum include:

- **1. Topics such as successful operation of committees, Organizational culture, Positivism, Division of labour, Justice, Idealism and Individualism, Classification of Governments, are covered in courses of Sanskrit, Political Science, Sociology, Hindi and English literature in the field of Arts and Social Sciences.
- **2. Gender:** Topics like Inequalities of Caste and Gender, Dowry, Violence, Gender in society, Social Stratification, Gender issues in literary writing with a full paper in English literature, novels by Manu Bhandari and others are covered as part of the curriculum. These topics are covered in various courses in Social Sciences and Humanities like Sociology, Political Science, History, Sanskrit and Hindi Literature.
- **3. Human Values:** Human Values like loyalty, compassion, empathy, truth and well-being are essential components of complete education and construction of ideal personhood. Topics like Inequality, Poverty, Unemployment, Cultural diversity, liberty, equality, power, legitimacy, authority, Development induced Displacement, social institutions like caste, family, marriage, works of Kabir and other reformers, Character Sketches in fictions taught in the Humanities stream, and values enshrined in the constitution are covered in the curriculum of courses in the social sciences and Humanities.
- **4. Environment and Sustainability:** Environmental concerns Environmental pollution, resource conservation, Famine, Wild life conservation and Management, Green-house effect, Ozone layer

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conservation, global warming and disease outbreak are covered in the curriculum of various programmes and courses in the science and social sciences. Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

Experiential Learning

Experiential Learning is a dynamic approach that emphasizes hands-on, real-world experiences to enhance the understanding power of the students. Unlike traditional lecture-based instruction, experiential learning actively engages students in the learning process through activities such as field survey in Geography and laboratory experiments in Physics and Geography. The Aanandam project introduced by the CCE as mandatory project instilled a sense social responsibility among students in which they underwent a first hand experience of serving the society and putting their ideas, proposals and learning experience in the form of a group project file. Several social service acts like distribution of masks and sanitizers, cleaning their surroundings and maintenance of public parks, educating young kids assisting elderly people at vaccination camps, plantation, feeding birds and animals etc were covered in this project.

Participative Learning

- Through Curricular Activities: Regular participative activities viz., group discussions, seminars, special lectures are organized in the college and the students actively participate in these activities within and outside the college. Students are given class assignments for focusing on self study and to encourage independent learning. These activities are undertaken with an aim to move beyond the zone of formal learning and develop creative and critical thinking. It gives them the opportunity and confidence to display their latent creativity and energies. The curriculum of each programme ensures that students receive a sound theoretical foundation as well as excellent hands-on learning with the development of analytical and problem solving and design thinking skills. Active involvement of students is ensured in whole teaching-learning process.
- Through Extra-curricular activities: Beyond the classroom, college gives high importance to all-round development of students through extra curricular, co-curricular and field based activities. The objective of student centric activities outside the classroom is to engage students as much as possible in learning procedures that require more than reading or viewing the material. It is mandatory for students seeking admission at the first-year level to opt for any of the extracurricular activities offered by the college. Extracurricular activities are organized under the auspices of NSS, cultural committee and women cell. These activities include drama, singing competitions, mehandi competitions, rangoli competitions, drawing and painting competitions, dance competitions, poetry recitation etc. These activities help to develop the creativity in the students.

Problem Solving Methodologies:

- Classroom tests and assignments.
- Encouraging students to participate, interact and ask questions in the classrooms.
- Students participating Quizzes and Logical Games.

Enhancement of learning experiences through ICT Tools: Teachers have been regularly using ICT skills and tools that are available. Faculty use the LCD projector, digital podium, video camera along with Tripod for E content. Special college You Tube channel was created, which telecasts lectures of all teachers on all subjects. Online platforms like Zoom, Google meet etc. are also used to communicate

during seminars. Whatsapp group is used as the most common platforms to teach, communicate, provide material and syllabus, make announcements, conduct tests, upload assignments, make presentations, address queries, and share information. During the covid-19 situation it was the most beneficial tool for communication with students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Internal assessment: Internal assessment of students is done through the terminal test conducted periodically. The teachers help students in grasping the correct essence of the questions asked, wherever such an inquiry is raised also necessary suggestions are given to them. Time table and notifications of Internal term test is circulated in classrooms, displayed on notice boards. The copies are checked and given to students with necessary remarks and suggestions in specific given time. At the same time the also teacher discusses the question paper in his respective class and guides them on how to answer the questions asked. If any grievances are received they are redressed immediately by the teachers and communicated to students concerned. Internal practical tests for all practical subjects are conducted at appropriate time with respect to calendar of examinations fixed by the GGTU University, Banswara. As per the instructions from University the Final Practical Exams is conducted by the internal Examiner for the First and Second year classes whereas for the Final Year External Examiner are appointed.

External examination assessment:

As the external examination assessment is conducted by the University, there is proper mechanism to deal with examination process. If the students are not satisfied with the results, university notifies related grievances where students can put their grievances in terms of reevaluation and this process is transparent. At the institution level, any representation regarding question paper, examination issues or evaluation is forwarded to the concerned university. Any unfair means case if found, is strictly addressed

by the examination code of conduct and due course of action is taken as per rules and regulations. The examination procedure is completely transparent and time table is displayed on the university website. For external exams conducted by University ,any grievances received are forwarded by Centre Superintendent to the university. For re-evaluation fees is levied on the students and as per norms the student has to submit re-evaluation form within 15 days of result declaration. Later on the student is issued another mark sheet post re-evaluation. As for the students whose results are withheld or whose marksheet shows any error like marking them Absent or blank columns due to any oversight by the University, the college immediately forwards the student complaints to the University to rectify the error.

The literature subjects of hindi, english and sanskrit generates creativity and enhances power of expression among students.

The college follows an outcome based education system to ensure the attainment of POs and COs. The Course Outcomes are defined at the initial stage and later on the programme and course outcome is calculated and evaluated systematically. The faculty members of all streams guide the students seeking admission in the first year and discuss the COs and POs. This helps the newcomers in selecting electives and extension activities offered by the institute. It helps the students in updating their knowledge about different fields and its options for further studies and employability. The faculty members share syllabus, course objectives and marking scheme with the students in their introductory class of each subject. The students performance is assessed by both direct and indirect mechanism of evaluation. In the internal assessment their performance is assessed through oral questions in classrooms, group discussions and also internal tests that are conducted periodically. Their performance in the internal and external examinations, in internal practicals and assignments, responses and interaction in class activities, role in curricular activities are some of the means by which program specific outcomes are measured. Teachers provide critical inputs to the students on the basis of this performance. And in the external process the annual exam results declared by the University helps teachers to monitor student's progress in the next class. This evaluation also helps the teachers identify the learning capacities of the students and take corrective measures accordingly. The teachers motivate the slow learners to attain better outcomes and assist the advanced learners to aim for bigger goals. The outcomes for all courses, programmes and elective papers help the teachers evaluate the objectives of the subject content. MBD Government College was established in 1990 and since then it giving higher education to students of tribal belt of Southern Rajasthan. The college campus is spread over 59489 square meters of land; the total constructed area of the college is approximately 2409 square meters and is located 60 km away from Banswara district headquarter.

Institute comprises Academic Block, Administrative Block, Library, 2 Hostels (one for boys and other for girls) and a Sports ground.

The college has 11 classrooms for teaching and a multipurpose hall for various activities and combined classes. All classrooms are well wentilated with natural light. For holding conferences, meetings and guest lectures, a well-equipped seminar hall with ICT facilities is also available. The canteen is located adjacent to the main entrance gate of the college and provides snacks and beverages at affordable rates to students and faculty.

Two parking lots are constructed to facilitate vehicles of students and faculty members. There are two RO systems with the chiller are installed to fulfill the need for clean and safe drinking water.

The academic block comprises five decently equipped laboratories for physics, zoology, botany, and geography to manage regular practical classes. Our physics lab is equipped with modern instruments such as logic gate, FET, BJT, RC circuit etc., whereas the

geography lab has well-equipped laboratory composed of four sections: one is dedicated to surveying and leveling instruments; Second one with world atlas, maps, charts, globe, models etc. The third one is well-furnished with technologically advanced field survey instruments such as total station, electronic theodolite, GPS distance meter, digital weather station, compass and other equipments and fourth section is with cartography equipment's topographical sheets plan-meter and opisometer.

The college has a decent library enriched with plenty of books of various subjects with reading area to provide peaceful environment to the students and faculty members. There is a regular supply of four daily newspapers and several monthly magazines.

BEST PRACTICE-1

1. Title of the practice: Vermicomposting: an ecofriendly approach toward organic waste management.

2. Objective of the Practice:

Vermicomposting is a low cost and environment friendly mechanism for biodegradable waste management as well as biofertilizer production. Vermicomposting offers various benefits compared to traditional thermophilic composting. In vermicomposting system earthworm and microorganism play critical role in the decomposition of organic waste materials. Earthworm gut and soil microbes have an immense effect in completing the vermicomposting process. Vermicomposting is the best way to produce compost from organic

waste materials as well as help to minimize pollution which arises from urbanization, intensive agriculture practice, industrialization etc.

The best benefit of vermicomposting is that it can also be done for biodegradable waste generated from household activities.

The practice has following objectives:

- Students will be able to learn composting process.
- Students will be able to maintain the environment pollution free.
- Students will also be inclined toward organic farming.
- Interested students will also be able to learn skill related to vermicomposting.

3 The context:

Vermicomposting is an eco-biotechnological process, and joint action of earthworms and microbes for the conversion of biodegradable organic waste. This process helps to convert biowaste into important nutrients of plants such as nitrogen, phosphorous, potassium etc.

This practice has two important benefits as on the one hand it minimizes the litter waste of college campus and on the other hand vermicomposting can be used for maintaining the better growth of plants of college campus.

4 The Practice:

Following steps explain the vermicomposting practice:

- Collection of waste.
- Shredding and separation of non biodegradable waste.
- Prepare a well proportionate composting bed, including specific species of earthworm.
- Watering at regular interval to maintain optimum moisture in the vermicomposting bed.
- Separation of earthworm from the vermicomposting bed when compost becomes ready to use.
- Remaining partially composted material can also be used for the next cycle of the vermicomposting bed.
- Store prepared vermicompost in a proper place to maintain appropriate moisture in the

vermicompost.

Somewhere students will also able to improve their socio-economic behavior as they will take care of tiny pets (earthworms) in their college campus.

Growing their empathy towards animal and taking care of worms in composting unit can lead to having a greater empathy toward environment.

5. Evidence of success:

Vermicomposting is unit successfully established in the college campus. The compost generated from the above is reducing the need of chemical fertilizers for green campus of the college as well as decreasing the amount of leaf litter, weeds waste and other biodegradable organic waste received from college activities.

6. Problems encountered and resources required:

- Technical constraints vermicomposting appears a simple process but working with tiny earthworms requires extensive knowledge and expertise.
- Resources required cow-dung, soil, muslin cloth, earthworms etc. some constraints were faced during establishment of a new vermicomposting unit.
- Psychological constraints since its handling is simple and suitable for all irrespective of expertise's age, educational qualification, and employment status etc. people generally take it lightly and do not consider it on a serious note. Many youth feel shy/hatred to work with worms since they often think that waste handling is untouchable work.

BEST PRACTICE-2

1. Title of the Practice: Village Adoption

2. Objectives of the Practice

The institute has adopted a village; Mor comes under Gram Panchayat Chudada, Tehsil Kushalgarh. The purpose of this adoption of village by our institute is to bring constructive changes in the life of the villagers about educational, social issues, environmental awareness and health issues. It also instils a feeling of service to society among the students studying in the institute. The programme is executed under the aegis of MBD govt. college NSS & Scouts and Guide Unit.

3. The Context

The institute has a noble vision of Gramotthan that signifies bringing a positive change in the lives of

villagers who cannot afford the facilities easily available to the urban people. This is more crucial to the children who harness dreams to be at par with their urban counterparts. The programme connects the students of the institute to the children and elders of the village.

4. The Practice

The following activities are undertaken by the college for Gram MOR:

Though the College's resources are restricted, and for all policy matters and appointments it is dependent on the Government, nevertheless the institute is making sincere efforts for the overall development and upliftment of its Tribal base students.
