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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

In the Southern region of Rajasthan, Shri Govind Guru Government College is regarded as the first and largest postgraduate institution. Our goal is for the students to be internally enlightened, emotionally stable, and practically effective. The college aims to shape young minds who will champion the cause of justice, truth, and peace and who are open to further development. These students should be intellectually capable, morally upright, psychologically integrated, physically healthy, and acceptable to society. Our goal is to provide students with a high-quality education and exposure while preparing them to meet today's demands through the use of cutting-edge methods and procedures. With the mission of "*May the Benevolent God inspire us with purity of Soul and Mind,*" "???? ???? ??????????" the college seeks to provide education for students' all-around development as they prepare to face challenges in the future. The institution is dedicated to helping underprivileged groups in society and bright students who are struggling financially so they can catch up to the rest of the population. Since its founding in 1950, the college has grown; it now offers post-graduate courses in all three streams. The college was formerly affiliated with Mohan Lal Sukhadia University Udaipur, provides UG courses in 22 subjects and PG courses in 13 subjects to meet the educational needs of students in Rajasthan's tribal heartland. Sports and other co-curricular and extracurricular activities are regularly organized for the purpose of developing students' overall personalities. Under NSS, NCC YDC, and Roving & Rangering, various programs and activities are effectively organized to explore students' untapped potential and provide a platform for expression. The college is well-equipped with the essential infrastructure, including a separate library building, an administrative block, a computer lab, internet wi-fi, and, above all, capable and qualified teaching staff. The college is a recipient of RUSA since November 2019.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

As an affiliated college, the College does not have complete sovereignty over its curricula; nonetheless, by serving as conveners and members of the Academic Council and Board of Supervisors, College faculty members enrich the curriculum. Stakeholders, staff, students, and subject-matter experts from other universities all have proposals for enhancing the curriculum. The modifications are made while taking into account regional and local necessities, as well as current trends and advancements. Both postgraduate and undergraduate curriculum include topics like human values, gender sensitization, environment and sustainability, culture, and language that are pertinent and of the utmost importance. The curriculum consists of core topics to transmit the fundamentals of common knowledge and Electives to explore academic interests. Hindi and Environmental Studies are the required studies for graduation in the first year. General English and General Studies are available in the second year. The 212+3+1 subject combinations in the arts, sciences, and commerce are available to students pursuing graduation in groups and in a variety of ways. Furthermore, elective courses with current relevance are offered in the master's degrees. The college currently provides UG in 22 subjects, Post-Graduate in 13 subjects, and Ph. D in 9 subjects. Botany and Chemistry are two P.G.-level programs that adhere to the CBCS/Elective curriculum. The College has established study centers of Indira Gandhi Open University (IGNOU) New Delhi in response to the region's growing demand for mainstream regular courses that are otherwise unavailable. To teach life and employability skills, major faculties provide more than 31 value-added programs.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Our teaching and learning methodologies include brainstorming, presentations, quizzes, inquiry learning, hands-on activities, case studies, etc. to support this comprehensive approach to students' growth and development.

1. We offer sufficient teaching and learning infrastructure.
2. We have 14 Research Supervisors and 24 Ph.D.-holding faculty members that are highly skilled and

experienced.

3. We have the idea of mentoring to provide kids who are thought to be slow learner's particular attention. Each professor mentors a group of 15 to 20 students, whose overall development is regularly tracked by the professors, and whose issues are discussed and remedied.
4. Because we think that education is an ongoing conversation, we encourage our staff to participate in orientation programs, refresher courses, workshops, and FDPs.
5. We encourage our faculty members to continue their higher education.
6. We urge our faculty members to adopt cutting-edge teaching techniques since we strive to stay on top of the latest technology advancements.
7. Our campus has Wi-Fi, which enables students to use the internet as a resource for their studies.
8. Our library is well-stocked with more than 76,000 books, journals, magazines, and other materials that students can utilize. This session also involves the automation of the library.
9. We provide remedial sessions for individuals with specific needs and allow them to record lectures in the classroom.
10. Academic calendars serve as the foundation for lesson preparations. ICT and multimedia teaching tools support the teaching and learning process. There are organized special lectures with professors and other specialists from other institutions.
11. The college also supports women-centered initiatives through the Women Cell to provide female students an advantage.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Promotion of scientific culture is very important for every university, and our institute strives for this through its teaching-learning and various science-oriented activities. Studies in the humanities and social sciences emphasize environments and focus mainly on local and cultural needs; In science, it combines knowledge, experience and verification. The university has the advantage of having the most extreme number of research directors among university-affiliated colleges in Rajasthan region.

Since the college is a government organization, it has to depend on various external funding agencies who financially support the conduct of research activities. Various agencies which have recently funded the institute are UGC and DST-FIST etc. The scientific knowledge of the faculty is manifested in the implementation of small research projects, the participation of researchers and teachers in national and international conferences, and in scientific publications in various nationally and internationally recognized journals. The laboratories of the Faculty of Science are well equipped with the latest instruments. ICT Lab, Nutiklass speaks volumes about the college's research opportunities. Seminars, national and international level conferences and workshops are organized independently and collaboratively. Other activities that complement the scientific environment and increase students' research skills are field projects, surveys, field trips, visits to research laboratories and institutes.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The land area of the college is 2.02 lakh square feet, out of which about 7777.84251 square feet is built up area where various building blocks are constructed. In addition to the main building, which contains the administrative, academic and establishment, the principal's office, the social sciences and humanities department, the department of physics, the department of botany, the department of zoology, the department of home sciences, the campus also has a separate block for the chemistry department, the drawing and painting department, the agricultural department and the business administration department. The main college facilities consist of 02 water cooler, bar, 22 boys' toilets, 11 girls' toilets, 11 male toilets and 3 toilets for female staff, hostel for teachers and 4 ramps for physically challenged students. 02 Seminar Halls, 02 Intelligence Class, 07 UG and PG Class Lab, 02 Computer Lab, 02 Lecture Theatre, 01 Common Staff, 01 Girls Common Room, 01 Student Union Office, 01 Tribal Studies Centre. The university library has approximately 76,520 classified and indexed books. Automation of the library has already started and will be completed soon. Computer and Internet access are available in the Online Resource Center and related departments and are also available to students and faculty. The green and clean university campus is maintained in good condition with regular planting and beautification activities. Alumni also support and contribute in their own way, sharing support according to their position and skills in various tasks. The college is continuously expanding and expanding its resources in terms of building, infrastructure such as IT equipment, classroom furniture, library and other campus facilities. New classrooms and toilets are under construction.

Student Support and Progression

This institution, which supports first-generation students and the weaker segments of society, is located in a region of Rajasthan that is heavily populated by tribal people. About 80% of the students come from rural backgrounds, and the college strives to maximize students' learning opportunities with the aid of its resources while showing the utmost care, support, and involvement. Through mentoring, individual counseling, and learning resources, students are supported. There are various levels of support provided, including information, infrastructure, finances, counseling, and exposure:

Informational assistance in the form of college prospectuses, updated college websites, classroom instruction, field trips, mentoring, and sessions to address curriculum and subject-specific knowledge issues.

Supportive infrastructure includes well-appointed classrooms, outfitted labs, a medical center, a library, a computer lab, and both outdoor and indoor playgrounds.

Scholarships from the state government's social welfare department are promptly given to students who identify as SC, ST, OBC, and other groups.

Internal Complaints Committee, Women Cell, Anti-Ragging Cell, NCC, NSS, YDC, Career Counseling Cell, Extension Activities, and Lectures on Personality Development and Communication Skills are all **counseling resources**.

Exposure can be gained through extracurricular and co-curricular activities, sports, academic events like seminars, workshops, and symposiums, as well as literary activities and the college magazine "*Satrangini*". Students Council serves as a forum for advocacy and the development of leadership skills.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Because the college is a government institution, adherence to the laws, ordinances, and policies established by the State Government is required through Rajasthan State Service Rules (RSR). <p>1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:</p>	<p>The college uses a multi- and interdisciplinary approach. Our faculty is constantly working to promote multidisciplinary research, making it easier for people to collaborate across disciplines to respond to today's global challenges and address some of the most pressing problems the world is currently facing. We give students a platform to develop the human skills necessary to be able to adapt to and continuously learn new technology and programs in order to achieve learning outcomes associated with integrated education, such as critical thinking, communication, teamwork, and abilities for lifelong learning. Through IDEA lectures (Inter-Disciplinary Educational Association), Webinars, Free coaching UDAAN, ANANDAM (projects in the areas of community engagement and services, Environmental Education (compulsory paper for all students), Community Connect Program (NSS) etc., we try to enable our students to acquire desired competency levels and acquire additional skills to further upgrade their competencies.</p>
<p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>The procedure will start under the direction of the Rajasthan Commissionerate for College Education and in coordination with the affiliated university. The policies adopted by the University relating to NEP are to be implemented by the College as and when directed by the affiliating University.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>The college is eager to start implementing the UGC-recommended Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) for all programs, which is in line with the goals of NEP. Students' bench skills are being improved through the implementation of project work, summer training programs, etc. The skills of students are developed through career-oriented programs and skill courses like Computer basics knowledge, Digital empowerment, Nursery Gardening Training, Organic Farming, English language and soft skill Course and Herbarium Techniques etc. The curriculum for the postgraduate science programs offered through the CBCS scheme includes skill courses in ICT, Communication and IT, vermicomposting and solid waste management, green chemistry, collection, processing, and preservation, as well as nursery, gardening, and green house practices. Additionally, the college offers the "Mukhyamantri Yuva Kaushal Vikas Yojana," which</p>

	<p>gives students the option of selecting a skill-development course from a list of 16 courses. A joint venture between the Rajasthan Skills and Livelihood Development Corporation and the Commissionerate College Education, MMYKY 2.0. The institution has also signed up for IITs' online program Spoken Tutorial, which allows students to self-learn a variety of free and Open-Source software.</p>

Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>Hindi and English are both used by our faculty when presenting lectures in the classroom. We take pride in promoting Sanskrit, an ancient Indian language, to our students. In addition to doctoral supervision, we offer graduate and postgraduate courses in Sanskrit. Papers and modules on Indian culture are part of the curriculum, as are courses like "Indian Writing in English" for postgraduate students. To preserve Indian traditions, various competitions are held in Mehendi, Thali and Deep decoration, Rangoli, Indian music and dance, and other art forms. Teachers and students enthusiastically and fervently celebrate the national and religious holidays of India.</p>

Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>The institution is already committed to outcome-based education and will keep doing so through free coaching classes for competitive examination preparation. College and non-collegiate students in the area can receive free UDAAN coaching for competitive examination preparation.</p>
<p>6. Distance education/online education:</p>	<p>The teachers have been using a hybrid (online-offline) mode of instruction, disseminating information and curriculum through resources on social media, including YouTube videos, PDF notes, e-books, and other digital content. Faculty members' personal as well as the college's YouTube channel, ccerajshriggcbw, have been updated with videos they've created covering the curriculum. The links to the videos are distributed to the students via WhatsApp groups and are kept on the college's Rajiv Gandhi E-Content Bank Google Drive. Students receive PDF notes and assignments via emails and Google forms. A college website has also been created to make all information available to faculty, current students, and potential students, as well as to offer suitable links for online instruction. Zoom meetings and Google services are used for online instruction. The coordination of special programs like Gyan Ganga, Gyan Sudha, and Gyan doot has been</p>

done to support both teacher training and student learning.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

Response:

The issues addressed in the curriculum include:

1. Professional ethics: Adherence to work ethics, which emphasize values like honesty, respect for others, transparency, accountability, discipline, hard work, confidentiality, as well as constitutional rights and obligations for ideal citizenship, improves performance in the workplace. Courses in Sanskrit, Business Administration, Political Science, Sociology, Hindi, and English literature in the field of Humanities and Social Sciences cover topics such as effective operation of committees, conflict management, organizational culture, positivism, division of labor, justice, hierarchy, idealism and individualism, and classification of governments. Courses in the science stream cover subjects like intellectual property rights (IPR), plagiarism detection tools, and the illegal drug trade.

2. Gender: The curriculum includes lessons on topics like caste and gender inequalities, violence, the role of women in society, social stratification, and gender issues in literary writing, including novels by Mannu Bhandari. These subjects are covered in a variety of social science and humanities courses, including sociology, political science, history, and the literature of Sanskrit and Hindi. The MA in English Literature includes a whole course on feminist literature.

3. Human Values: Integral to a complete education and the development of an ideal person, human values include loyalty, compassion, empathy, truth, and well-being. The curriculum for social science and humanities courses covers issues like inequality, poverty, unemployment, cultural diversity, liberty,

equality, power, legitimacy, and authority. It also covers topics like development-induced displacement, social institutions like caste, family, and marriage, the writings of Kabir and other reformers, character sketches in fiction taught in the humanities stream, and values enshrined in the constitution. In order to instill values like the "Joy of Giving" in students, the mandatory course "Anandam" was introduced in the entry year of UG and PG programs during the academic year 2020–21.

4. Sustainability and the Environment: The curriculum of various science and social science programs and courses includes topics such as environmental pollution, resource conservation, famine, wild life conservation and management, greenhouse effect, ozone layer conservation, global warming, and disease outbreak. Courses called "Bio-Diversity and Conservation Biology" and "Plant Ecology, Conservation and Evolution" specifically in the science stream cover a variety of environmental topics, such as environmental impact assessment, in-situ and ex-situ biodiversity conservation, Climate Change, a basic survey of environmental toxicants, and Restoration Ecology. For UG students in all three academic streams-arts, science, and commerce-"Environment Studies" is a required paper. In the MA Economics program, a whole course titled "Economics of Social Sector and Environment" is devoted to environmental issues.

The institution's motto is "All Round development of students," which is made possible through a supportive environment and interaction between teacher and student. The active participation of students in the entire teaching and learning process is adequately pursued. The college's emphasis on student-centered education sets it apart from other institutions. In addition to traditional classroom instruction, the college's teaching-learning method places a heavy emphasis on developing students' skills, experience, and knowledge. Inside and outside of the classroom, experiential learning, participatory learning, and problem-solving techniques include....

- The **practical classes** are conducted in batches in well-equipped laboratories. Collective and Participative learning becomes possible in the lab interactions. Research laboratories are also available in Botany and Chemistry Departments.
- In humanities subjects like Geography, Home-Science, Drawing and Painting and Music also fall in the same category and here students also seize the opportunity of experiential learning.
- **Group discussions**, audio-visual presentations, brain-storming activities (seminars, tests, quizzes, assignments) are extensively practiced to encourage participative learning.
- **Our best teaching pedagogy** adopted by Botany and Chemistry departments is **Action Research Method** which involves active participation of students in data collection, surveys and activity based learning. It encourages participative learning of students.
- **Extracurricular programmes-** Different cells and committees like NSS, NCC, Rangering, YDC, Navachaar Prakosth, and club activities like Human Rights, Nature-Eco Club, Women's Cell offer a supportive environment for participatory learning. They regularly organise events including rangoli, mehndi, poster creation, song and dance competitions, and more. College magazine *Satrangini* etc. session wise and according to schedule provided by the Commissionerate college education Rajasthan. It is mandatory for students seeking admission at the first-year level to opt for any of the extra-curricular activities offered by the college.
- **Research work** by Ph. D Scholars is carried out under the supervision of the faculty members registered as guides of the affiliating university.
- **Innovation and Skill Development Cell** conducted student centric activities like summer courses on Basic Computer Course, English Spoken Course and Organic farming etc.
- **Expert guest or extension lectures:** Periodically, subject specialists are invited, and this aids in supplying new and updated information of the subject and improves the educational experience.
- The college **ICT enabled classrooms and Smart classrooms** and LCD Projectors, desktops and other ICT tools are extensively used by teachers and students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

- At post graduate levels, the University has regulations for **internal assessment in CBCS programmes** and courses with practical components, such as Geography, Home-Science, Psychology, Drawing and Painting, and Music, where marks are assigned based on attendance, file work, and practical efficiency. 20% of the evaluation for theoretical papers, practicals, and skill courses in CBCS is dependent on internal evaluation. The question sets are created in accordance with the university's regulations. In first year, second year of undergraduate programmes and P.G previous practical evaluation is internal only except for CBCS programmes. The dates for practical assessment are displayed on the College Notice Board well in time.
- The college's PG departments place a strong emphasis on the **seminar presentations of students** in order to develop their public speaking abilities and give them a venue for expressing their ideas. The organisation, format, and ethical considerations associated with creating a project report are laid out for the students in the guidelines. The sharing of ideas at these seminars also helps to spark students' enthusiasm in the subject, which inspires them to continue their studies in the programme or discipline at a higher level. The dates and criteria for evaluating the seminar/project submissions are communicated to the students in plenty of time. The notice board also displays the seminar calendar and the deadlines for project submissions. The pupils select the topics after consulting with their teachers.
- The college administration directs the department in-charges' about the monthly and term tests, as well as the internal exams, seminars, and assignments. The students are assessed and updated on their progress by the concerned faculty in order to ensure an effective delivery pattern, i.e. subject content, style, and presentation.
- As per the instructions provided by Commissionerate College Education, Jaipur, tests were administered monthly during the 2019–2020 year. The faculty members shared the monthly test questions they had created with the other government colleges in the district. After the papers were checked, the students were informed of their individual weaknesses and how they could enhance their performance. In addition, tests were administered as instructed in the letter without the presence of invigilators with the aim of instilling moral values in the students. Due to COVID 19, teaching continued online in 2020–2021, and after each topic was finished, assignments were shared on WhatsApp groups.

Shri Govind Guru Government College was established in 1950 and since then it is catering higher education in the South Rajasthan predominantly inhabited by the tribal people. The college campus is spread over 202879.58 square meter of campus area; the total constructed area of the college is approximately 2000 square meters and is located centrally in the city. Institute comprises separate Academic section, Establishment section, Accounts section. The college has 56 classrooms, including 03 smart classrooms, which are well ventilated and illuminated with natural light. For holding conferences, meetings and guest lectures, a well-equipped seminar hall is also available. There is an auditorium (RK Hall) equipped with a video projection and public address system for college functions. The canteen which provides snacks and beverages at subsidized rates to students and faculty. Parking for the students, faculty member and others is there near the entrance of college, comprising three blocks. Each science department has a sufficient number of laboratories to manage practical classes. The labs are equipped with modern facilities, Microscope with Photography facility, Spectrophotometer, Laminar Air Flow, Electrophoresis, Balance, Centrifuge, pH meter, Autoclave etc. The Departments of Geography and Home Science are also enriched with well-equipped laboratories. There is a staff room which is wi-fi enabled with toilet facility for gents and ladies; separate Faculty rooms/departments, shared by faculty members, enable effective faculty interaction and with students on an individual basis. All the faculty rooms have adequate furniture and storage facilities. The college has a central library with more than 76000 books. Recently solar panels have been installed in the college for green and sustainable energy solution and the entire campus is cctv enabled. The college has a high demand for expansion and enhancement of infrastructure facilities in future to nurture the needs of such high number of enrolled students. The college has all outdoor and sports facilities for Cricket, Volleyball, handball, Table Tennis, Badminton. There is a separate Indoor Sports Facility Hall located in the east of campus.

Response:

The college's library is big and roomy, measuring 715.33 square meters. The library is open every working day of the week from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Two books may be checked out by students using their readers ticket cards. The library currently has 76520 books on hand, including 52,569 in the general section, 4,780 in the book bank, 15128 in the UGC section, and subscriptions to 9 journals, 62 magazines, and 8 English- and Hindi-language newspapers. For students in need, a book bank facility is also available. A community book bank, which is a collection of donated books, it was established in 2019.

The academic and infrastructure requirements of the library are discussed and decided by the **library committee**. The committee includes Dr. B.K. Sharma Convener, Sh. Suresh Kumar, Sh. Rajesh Meena, Dr. Neeraj Shrimali, Shri Raysingh Ranawat, Shri Izhar Mohammed and Shri Manilal. In order for the stakeholders in the institute to make full use of the facility, the library committee strategically sketches

out or drafts how the library will run smoothly in the absence of a librarian. When it comes time to buy books, the department heads are asked for a list of the titles they would like to have. After consulting with the faculty, the department heads then give the library committee their recommended reading list.

INFLIBNET

INFLIBNET membership is held by the library. Accessing e-books and e-journals on N-LIST by INFLIBNET is beneficial for educators and students. Every educator and researcher registered under faculty members of the college receives a username and password. They can use the internet to access this facility at any time and from any location. The facility is extended through March 23rd, 2023.

Surveillance : More than 15 CCTV cameras installed in every corner in the college including 3 very high power HD 360 degree camera at the entry of college, commerce block and at the back of college. Other camera are installed at the parking area, corridors, class rooms etc. The main TV screen is placed in the Principal's Chamber for constant observation .

Online mode of Admission : The Commissionerate College Education, Rajasthan, has implemented an online admissions process for UG and PG students. The college website's admission module also offers a crucial link and details for completing this process. Online forms are filled, online forms are checked, and online forms are used to generate and upload merit on the website. Entire process is conducted at room no. 8.

Internet : The college has 10 nodes, connected to the internet bandwidth of 30-40 Mbps using Fiber technology. All the administrative, accounts and establishment work is conducted through these connections. Botany, Chemistry, Geography, Zoology, Drawing and Painting departments are connected through these fiber cables. R.K. Hall, Staff Room and Agriculture block is also connected through fiber cables.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

Response:

Administrative set up: We are a government institution so The College works under the Commissionerate of College Education, Rajasthan headed by the Commissioner. The college staff consists of teaching faculty, office assistants, librarians, laboratory assistants, etc. The teaching staff is given a variety of duties as committee conveners and members. There are separate establishment section, accounts section, and academic section in the college which are supervised by the senior faculty

members. Additionally, staff members like security guards, gardeners, Safai Karamcharis, office typists, etc. are hired on a contract basis.

Policies and Procedures: Internal Quality Assurance Cell ensures quality culture by conscious and catalytic action to improve academic and administrative performance of the college. It promotes quality enhancement through internalization of quality culture and best practices.

Appointment and Recruitment: The teaching staff is recruited by the Rajasthan Public Service Commission, while Class IV employees are recruited by the State government, contractual workers are appointed through the Employment Agency. There is a provision for compensatory appointment in the event of the passing of a close relative.

Service Rules: Our college is a government institution so it is adherent to the rules, regulations, and policies established by the State Government is required (RSR). But the college always makes an effort to carry out whatever is best at its level to accomplish the determined goals.

Promotional policies: The regular promotions of teaching faculty are done after the calculation and validation of the API score and recommendation of the Commissionerate based on the UGC guidelines to the RPSC.

Grievance resolution: The college has established an **Anti-Ragging cell**, a **Girls Mentoring, Grievance Redressal Committee**, and an **Internal Complaints Committee** to investigate complaints and resolve any arising issues, judiciously and without prejudice. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The college encourages and supports all of the State Government's welfare programs by putting in place a variety of efficient welfare measures. The deductions for future economic and social security to the employees are **GPF/NPS** and **SI** and they are made mandatory. Annual "**Group Insurance**" deductions are also made mandatory. The State Government reimburses **medical expenses** as a part of the employee's health-related costs. College's superannuated employees receives benefits of **Gratuity and Pension** from the Govt. of Rajasthan. In addition, they are also benefitted by **Rajasthan Pensioner's Medical Fund** for health-related costs. Loans are sanctioned from SI and GPF department as per Rajasthan Government rules.

The institute has an **Indoor Sports Facility Centre**, amenities for sports like Badminton, Table-tennis, Cricket, Hand-ball, Basketball, etc. There is a Gymnasium with basic workout equipment including Double bar, Chin-up bar, Elliptical cycle, Single Station exercise machine, multipurpose bench, etc. Health checkups are organized for faculty members by Health Centre of the College.

Workshops and lectures have been organised for teaching and/or non-teaching staff on “Physical Fitness Yoga and Wellness”, “Self Defence for Women”.

Canteen facility is available providing refreshment and beverages at subsidized rates. Separate room is available in canteen for staff of the college.

Parking Facility-Separate Parking for cars and two wheelers, students, teaching and non-teaching staff is available in the campus.

Medical bill reimbursement facility and Advance for critical illness for all Government servants.

Leave benefits available to employees include –

- 15 Casual leave in one session.
- Privilege leave (15 privilege leave earned after completion of calendar year)
- Half Pay Leave (20 half pay leave after completion of the year can be commuted on medical grounds.)
- Medical leave, Duty Leave, Academic leave, Commuted Leave, TRF, PDF, Maternity Leave for six months and Paternity Leave for 15 days.

Right to Information Act, 2005 (RTI) empowers all employees to seek any information, take notes, extracts or certified copies of documents or records.

RGHS (Rajasthan Government Health Scheme) has been launched for state employees from July 1st, 2021 providing indoor and outdoor cashless medical facility in all government hospitals, approved private hospitals and private test centres.

A **Staff Club** has been established, and a secretary chosen from among the faculty members is in charge of planning events and managing the staff's graduation and retirement ceremonies. The staff makes financial contributions for both these ceremonies and the gifts given to faculty members' children getting married.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The **Government of Rajasthan** is responsible for supporting all college activities, and the money is used in line with the GF and AR Rules for the State of Rajasthan. Including wages, TA, DA, medical bill reimbursements, infrastructure and laboratory upkeep, staff augmentation, and administrative expenditures, the Government of Rajasthan fully supports college operations. All financial matters are under the control of the principal, who also acts as the DDO. The CCE and College Development Committee are also given proposals for requirements pertaining to maintenance. The person in charge of keeping the accounts maintains a good ledger that contains details on the funds it has received and used from various sources under various headings.

Financial assistance is also provided by the **Tribal Area Development Department (TAD)** of Rajasthan for the development of infrastructure in government institutions. The college has received fund totaling Rs 20.00 lakhs (Date of sanction 3/2/2020) for the construction of new laboratory in the college.

Financial assistance is also provided by the **Central Ministry of Minority Affairs (Pradhanmantri Jan Vikas Karykram)** and **Rajasthan State Minority Affairs Department**. The college has received fund totaling Rs 340.84 Lakhs (Date of sanction 30/09/2019) for the construction of new commerce block in the campus.

Up until 2017, **UGC** continued to offer support during the **XII Plan Period**. The planning board of the college distributed these funds for a number of initiatives including instrumentation maintenance, competence building in the classroom, innovative teaching methods, career and counseling services, small-scale research projects. The UC was delivered on time to the UGC office.

RUSA: The college received funding totaling Rs 2 crore under three main headings: new construction, renovation, and equipment (Date of sanction 11/1/2019). The UC has been submitted, and the fund was wisely used. The Board of Governors (BOG) and the Project Monitoring Unit (PMU) are the governing and monitoring bodies that keep an eye on the status of the projects that RUSA has started.

The **College Development Committee (CDC)** is in charge of raising money locally for the college's infrastructure expansion, upkeep, and academic maintenance. A fee of Rs.300/- + Rs.150/- Practical per student per annum is charged under CDC head with annual fee. Courses run in SFS also contribute to the CDC fund. Payments to guest faculty, contractual computer operators, gardeners, security guards, etc. are made by CDC.

MP and MLA Fund: The money raised by MP and MLA schemes is also put to use in accordance with the demands put forth by stakeholders.

Alumni: The Alumni also contribute in cash and kind as and when required.

PFMS handles the payment of fellowships and scholarships offered by the UGC, CSIR etc. The SSO module is used to process online payments for various scholarships for the benefit of students.

Paymanager serves as a platform for the preparation of employee pay bills, TA/DA arrears, leave encashment bills, etc. According to the needs of the college, state government scholarships are distributed. The Institute is the Nodal Agency for a number of Government Scholarships.

The contribution of IQAC in implementing and driving resourcefulness to the growth and development of the college is conspicuous. Out of the numerous initiatives, the following activities make up the bulk of IQAC's contributions to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies:

3. Effective and optimum use of ICT:

Despite the limited resources, ICT tools are used for teaching in the best possible way.

4. Attempting to teach with virtual techniques and support:

The teaching-learning process continued without interruption and without any problems during the widespread covid pandemic in 2019–2020. The college set up a YouTube channel **ccerajshriggcbw class** to help spread information to its students as widely as possible. Each teacher also set up a separate YouTube channel to continue teaching through video lectures in an effort to reach out to a larger audience and the majority of students. To speed up the process, faculty prepared more than 690 video lectures and more than 300 PDF files, distributed among WhatsApp groups and other social media websites.

5. **Research Activities:** The IQAC promoted studies on topics with both immediate and broader implications. The following initiatives were suggested and carried out by IQAC:

We have 14 Research Supervisors and 24 Ph.D. scholars in the college. The faculty members are highly skilled and experienced.

The moral commitment to equal opportunity at Shri Govind Guru Government College Banswara is strong. Providing equal opportunities to all people, regardless of gender, race, caste, color, creed, language, religion, or other opinions, is a core value at our institution.

Promotion through Curriculum: Gender equity and sensitization topics are covered in undergraduate and postgraduate syllabi of subjects like Sociology, Home Science, Hindi, English, Psychology, Political Science, Philosophy and History.

Promotion through Co-curricular Activities : Many initiatives have been taken for gender equity and women empowerment as part of extracurricular activities in the Institution. Skill development and employability programs were organised for imparting vocational skills to the students like computer skills, English language proficiency, Event Management etc. Programs were conducted for Personality development, Women health, adolescence problems, food and nutrition training, yoga & meditation sessions etc. Training and awareness programs on Self-defence, Sexual Harassment, Child Marriage Prevention, etc. were organised. Activities related with Government Flagship Program on gender sensitization namely “Beti Bachao Beti Padhao” were organised.

Girl Cadets in NCC have made the institution proud by taking part in CATC, Pre-RD and Republic Day parade and winning several prizes in camps and competitions, Rallies on female rights, hosting blood donation camps, attending camps at several places not only in Rajasthan but also in other states like Delhi. They are given rigorous training and equal opportunities at par with the boys.

As part of NSS activities, free multi-specialty medical camps are organized in neighboring villages as awareness initiatives on health, hygiene, the importance of child and gender education and provide a launching pad to induct them into vocational skilling.

Best Practice I

1. Title-*INCULCATING SOCIAL VALUES AND CREATING SOCIAL AWARENESS THROUGH NUMEROUS ACTIVITIES, WITH A SPECIAL FOCUS ON TRIBAL STUDENTS.*

2. Goal

1. Basic aim of every institution is obviously to make itself socially useful and relevant.
2. To arouse the spirit of common interest to participate collectively for social cause among tribal youth.
3. To create a community of selfless, caring and committed students of the tribal belt.
4. To create a sense of accountability and responsibility among students.
5. To sensitise students on everyday social issues/problems related with their own community.
6. To help students understand basic social problems and contribute in social development.

3. The Context

Our college being situated in a remote tribal belt of Rajasthan where more than 80 percent of students come from tribal community has an added responsibility of creating social awareness and inculcating social values in the students. To acquaint students with social problems and to connect them to the ground level realities has been constantly and consistently performed as one of the best practices of the college.

4. The Practice

a). **Clean and Green India**-The students of the college enthusiastically participated in SWACH BHARAT ABHIYAAN and gave their valuable contribution. The cleanliness drive created a sense of

responsibility and awareness in the tribal students both on personal and social level. Regular plantation programmes are organized to make students environment friendly and eco-conscious.

b). Health Awareness-The college staff and students visit the remote belts and organize one day camp to interact with villagers and create awareness about health, hygiene and basic education.

c). Blood Donation Camps-The college staff and students actively participate and donate blood in camps organized by the institute in the month of October.

d). Free distribution and awareness programmes about Mask and Vaccination against Corona-During the corona pandemic situations in the session 2020-21, various awareness programme by the volunteers of NCC, NSS units were organized. Under the No-Mask No-Entry programme on 12-12-2020 NCC free Mask were distributed to the citizens at various circles of district Banswara.

e). Wall Painting about Corona Pandemic guideline- Wall paintings at various circles of district Banswara about corona awareness by the faculty member and students belonging to Drawing department of college.

5. Evidence of Success

The college has succeeded in creating Corona Awareness, health awareness in the district Banswara. Slowly but steadily our efforts are leaving an impression and change in the attitudes is certainly evident. District Administration also honoured us on these programmes.

6. Problems encountered

First of all, the literacy level of this region is so poor and therefore the awareness level is very low. Any social welfare activity is looked upon with suspicion and as invasion into their routine life style. Also, the institution has to face budgetary scarcity to run such programmes.

Best Practice II

1. Title- *ECOFRIENDLY CAMPUS*

2. Goal

One of the basic aims of this institute is to make eco-friendly which claims reduced, minimum or no harm upon ecosystems or the environment. Our Campus beautification committee work in this direction by various activities like regular tree plantation in the campus, development of a separate block of cultivated plants (A *Harshit Bhadoriya* Block), development of block of medicinal plants in Botanical Garden.

3. The Context

More than 75 percent of our college belongs to tribal community. They are known as nature lovers. They even go for medication through traditional practices of plant products used in treatment of various

ailments. To acquaint the students with this kind of activity is the main objective of the institution.

4. The Practice

A. Plantation programme throughout the year:- We regularly undertake plantation programme through Campus Beautification and Preservation Committee, NSS and NCC units every in the month of July and August and on Independence Day 15th august. We have planted approximately 500 plants in the campus in last four years.

B. No Smoking, No Tobacco in campus area :- Tobacco and tobacco products are strictly prohibited in the college premises and consuming Tobacco and tobacco products is a punishable offence. The boards are displayed at various places in the college.

C. Periodic Rallies and Road shows for Awareness: - Our college has NSS and NCC units, which regularly takes part in organizing the street shows, rallies every year. The students also took part in AIDS awareness rally, prevention of self-medication and environment protection rallies.

D. Campus Cleaning Programme :- We organizes campus cleaning programme every session. NSS, NCC and Rovering & Ranging students and staff members take part in this event in each session.

E. Plastic free Campus :- The college is having plastic free campus and also creating awareness amongst the students and staff members regarding the same by display boards and other programmes.

F. Use of LED bulbs in college :- The entire campus is replaced by LED bulbs and Tube lights to save and conserve energy.

G. Dustbins in the premises:- In our college campus all the laboratories, cabin and corridor is having dustbins. Laboratories are having separate dustbins for dry and wet wastage which makes the campus garbage free.

H. Installation of Roof Top Solar Panel for Electricity :- As a renewable energy source, a Solar Panel of 15KWp SPV Grid Connected Power Plant was installed at the roof of the campus successfully in 2020-21 session by the Rajasthan Electronics and Instruments Limited, Jaipur Rajasthan.

I. Rain Water Harvesting System

The college has rain water harvesting developed in the new commerce block, it will rise the water table level in forthcoming years.

J. Green Audit

In the year 2021-22 green audit was conducted.

K. Energy Audit

Separate energy audit is also conducted in 2021-22 by the approved energy auditor for the college.

5. Evidence of Success

The college has succeeded in creating environment awareness among the students of the institution. The students care about the plants. The solar panel has reduced the electricity bill by a huge margin.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The major problem of this practice is to maintain plants survived up to a certain level of height. During the months of holidays, it becomes very difficult in watering the plants, to keep tree guards from stealing. Due to shortage of staff at college it becomes very hard.

WOMEN'S CELL conducts activities related to women's health, entrepreneurship and grooming, self-defence training programs, and the free distribution of sanitary napkins to female college students as part of its gender sensitization mission.
