SCRS Government college, Sawaimadhopur is affiliated with University of Kota, Kota, following education programs designed by the University. The college provide excellent education at the undergraduate level, offering 9 subjects in humanities (Hindi, Sanskrit, English, Political Science, Sociology, History, Economics, Geography, Urdu) under Arts Faculty; 5 subjects in Science stream (Zoology, Botany, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics); 3 subjects under Commerce Faculty (ABST, EAFM and Business Administration). At Post Graduate level college offers 10 Programs (M.A. in Political Science, History, Urdu, Hindi, Sociology, Geography, M.Sc. in Chemistry, and Zoology and M.Com. in ABST & EAFM). Under the auspices of Agriculture University Kota, the college offers a four year undergraduate course in Agriculture Honors, encompassing 12 distinct subjects (Agronomy, Biochemistry, Botany, Economics, Edu. Extension, Engineering, Entomology, Horticulture, Live Stock, P.B.G., Plant Pathology, Soil Science).

At the UG level four significant compulsory subjects are included : General Hindi, General English, Environmental Science and Elementary Computer Education.

Our faculty members excel in both research and teaching. Some faculties secure positions in the academic Council and Board of Studies of the University of Kota, Kota. They actively participate in university work, contributing to the design of curricular and paper settlements for university exams. The college is also actively involved in distance learning programs and serves as center and examination center for both Indira Gandhi Open University, Delhi and Vardhman Mahaveer Open University, Kota. We have the study center and exam center of IGNOU New Delhi and VMOU Kota. Both open universities offer several diplomas, certificates, Graduate level, postgraduate level and doctoral programs. As a result students from the college and nearby area benefit from these programs.

As many of the students belong to deprived categories, the institution primarily aims to provide a requisite induction program and extend academic support for them to face any undue difficulty. The college is divided into two campuses - North Campus and South Campus. The college is spread over a total of 12.11 hectares of land. The building is constructed on both the campuses of the college. The college has sufficient space for various departments and laboratories. The school has 31 traditional class rooms, 6 practical laboratories, a girls hostel, residential quarters and various IT facilities in smart classrooms. There is a separate building of the library building in the college, which has about 40500 books which are divided into different sections. The facility of Wi-Fi network is available in the library as well as the reading room is also built. The college has various playgrounds for indoor and outdoor games, mainly volleyball, kho-kho, badminton, hockey, cricket etc. There is a well equipped computer lab having 20 computers, all computers are connected with an internet facility. Various types of work are done online in the college like- Admission, Absence in examination etc. The college spends money every year on infrastructure, due to which the maintenance and infrastructure of the college keeps on increasing every year.

Student Support and Progression

Our college has a structured support and mentoring mechanism under the supervision of the principal as the executive head. Student welfare is at the heart of the college vision and governance. The institution comprehensively plans and chalks various student welfare programs in areas such as inclusive admission policies, infrastructural facilities curricular, co-curricular and extension activities.

The college helps economically and socially backward students by providing them with fees, concessions and scholarship assistance. Grievances pertaining to students are redressed by the Grievance cell which comprises senior faculty members. "Sampark portal" has also become an important tool to solve the problems of our college students. The anti ragging committee and anti sexual harassment call of the college take ample measures to prevent incidents of ragging and sexual harassment in the campus. The sport committee and the cultural committee organize and encourage student participation in extracurricular activities. The college placement cell takes the responsibility of placing the student in companies. The "Women Cell" addresses day to day challenges paced by the girls both on and off the campus. Apart from formal counseling the girl students are given an approach to seek help from women faculty members.

Our college provides faculty guidance to students preparing for competitive exams. The subject teacher particularly from the department of English, History and many other subjects. Eminent resource persons are invited to give lectures on career guidance. Colleges conduct student union elections every year so that students can get the education of smooth functioning democracy.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The leadership and governance of the college is well reflected in its vision and mission. Being a State government College it does not enjoy autonomy in internal governance as far as structure, system and policy deliberations are concerned. But it has operational freedom in fulfillment of its mission and goals. Governance leadership and management of the college aims towards improvement and progress in the

implementation of both normative and practical agenda depending upon the availability of resources, be it physical or financial. The college is a Government institute and therefore it is mandatory to follow the rules, regulations, policies framed by the State Government (RSR). Feedback generated through Vikas Samiti, Student Council, during student union elections, from stakeholders, parents, alumni, in the form of memorandums, meetings, interactions etc contribute in strategic planning and deployment. The constitution of committees for specific purposes is also reflective of effective governance. More than 50 committees are framed at the beginning of every academic session. The College does not offer professional courses and so there is a greater responsibility of equipping the students for better job prospects. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	An Interdisciplinary approach to education is something our University firmly supports. The university's syllabus / curriculum which incorporates this method; will be put into practice seriously. Faculty members offer full freedom to have interdisciplinary discussions with students of all streams. Courses such as Environmental Studies, Elementary Computer and Education have been made mandatory for all undergraduate students.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	This institution will follow the rules for creating an academic bank of credits as set forth by the University and Commissionerate ,College Education, Rajasthan. The NEP related policies adopted by the affiliating University and will be implemented by the College as per the directions The use of SWAYAM portal and its credit transfer scheme will also be briefed to the students.
3. Skill development:	For all the programs that are consistent with the objectives of NEP, the college is eager to initiate the implementation of Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) as suggested by UGC. Keeping in view the present scenario of the society the program tends to promulgate the necessity of providing opportunities as well as platforms for the girl students. College is also offering "Mukhyamantri Yuva Kaushal Vikas Yojana" where students are provided an opportunity to opt for skill development course out of 16 listed courses. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Determining how well an academic institution is performing in relation to its goals and objectives is crucial. The institution is affiliated with Kota University Kota, and the only time the students are evaluated is at the college's annual examination. Internal evaluation is conducted through tests, seminars, and other ongoing processes throughout the tenure of the coursework.

It is mandatory to submit a practical record for evaluation and the marks are added in all disciplines where practical tests are required as part of the curriculum. Some of the disciplines also require a project report, which is taken into account when evaluating students.

On a regular basis, periodic class examinations are also held to aid students in getting ready for the final exam. In the postgraduate degree programs, students have the option of completing a dissertation under the faculty's guidance on a subject of their choosing. All of these activities serve as formative exercises for the students, indirectly contributing to the evaluation process. Professors serving on the university's examination panel assist with question creation and answer book evaluation. The college plays as a key role in evaluating the university's annual exam answer booklets. The evaluation center is coordinated by the principal. The university assigns a code number to the answer books, and the evaluation procedure is transparent. The OMR page is filled out with the marks, and strict secrecy is maintained. The university announces the results on schedule.

The college adheres to an annual examination schedule in accordance with the academic calendar and is affiliated with the University of Kota and the Agricultural University of Kota. The college is a sizable facility, and daily exams during the annual exams involve 1000 -1500 students.

Any complaints and grievances regarding the exam questions, examination-related concerns, and cases involving unfair means:- are promptly reported to the university for further necessary action. The university's website provides the timetable and online systems generate admit cards.

The center superintendent and associate superintendents oversee the examination procedure. The question papers, answer sheets, and attendance sheets are distributed to the invigilators room by room. After completion of the exam invigilators collect the answer sheets and submit them to the Examining Committee for further action. Online attendance records and invigilation tasks are generated and online payment is accepted for invigilation duties.

The Commissionerate of College Education, Rajasthan, creates an academic calendar at the beginning of each academic session outline the number of working days, start and end dates of the academic session, class exams dates, schedule of the co-curricular and extracurricular activities, scholarships calender as well as the distribution of the working days, holidays, and vacations.

Using the proposed academic calendar, the lesson plan is formulated, considering the number of working days that are available during the academic session. The departments internally prepare a schedule for theory classes, practical lab sessions. The course outlines are also debated and prepared internally. For undergraduate courses, a unified timetable is devised, while for postgraduate courses, the respective departments determine schedule.

Physical Facilities

The institution has adequate facilities for teaching, face-lifting learning VIZ class rooms(31 traditional class rooms, 6 practical laboratories, one smart class with internet facilities running through lease line), laboratories, computing equipment, etc.

Resource-The College has two campuses. One campus is called the North Campus and the second campus is the South Campus. The North campus of the college is spread over 5.14 hectares of land. The South campus of the college is spread over 6.97 hectares of land. Both the campuses are spread over a total of 12.11 hectares. There are buildings in both the campuses of the college. Arts & Science faculty classes are conducted in South Campus whereas Commerce and Agriculture classes in North campus. All the departments & laboratories in the college are well equipped. The college has their own borewell and pipeline of Phed for drinking water. There is a one water tank in the college having 50000 liter capacity. Students from Rural & Urban areas use motorcycles, bicycles and public transport as conveyance. In the college there is a facility for parking vehicles.

LMS (Libsoftware) is using in librarary and 20000 books data are added .

In case of power cut, the college has two power generator supply units (each of 25kv capacity) which are situated in the north and south campus.

Each department individually is equipped with at least one computer and interest facility. The physical facilities in the college are as follows.

The South Campus building harbors the Administrative, Academic, Accounts, Scholarship and Establishment Sections. There is a Principal Chamber in both the campuses of the college, The Departments of Political Science, History, Urdu, Hindi, Sociology, Geography, ABST, EAFM, Bus. ADMN, Chemistry, Zoology. The campus also embodies separate Chemistry, Physics, Botany, Zoology and Geography Laboratories and Library. Staff quarter facilities also available at north Campuses.

Facilities for research :- Most of the social science departments and department of commerce offer

additional academic and research facilities Viz. Many researchers are doing their research work.

ICT Lab :- The college has twenty computers in the ICT laboratory. LAN connection and LCD projector along with white screen.

The college library has about 50,000 books. These books are classified into different sections and indexes. The whole library is facilitated with wi-fi network and sami automated.

The college has adequate facilities for sports, games (Indoor, outdoor) IGNOU, VMOU KOTA. Gandhi- Study center NSS, NCC, Scout guide etc. and Cultural activities. The college has a hostel facility for 24 girls students but it not operational.

The college has adequate facilities for indoor games and outdoor games. Many type of sports are played by the students in the college. In which cricket, hockey, football, tennis, volleyball, kho-kho, kabaddi, archery, cycling, athletics, table tennis, chess, badminton and carrom are prominent.

Facilities for catwell activities there is a hall "North seminar Hall" and open arena "The Rangmanch" where most of the academic activities like Essay, poster, Quire and slogan, Painting, photography competition, poetry recitations and cultural activities like solo & group songs, solo group dance, plays. Skill, fancy dress, mono acting etc. competitions are organized.

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

The library is a collection of books or media that are accessible for use and note just for display purposes. A library provides physical or digital access materials. Books are a student's best friend. They are the most accessible and aliases of counselors and the most patient of teachers.

Students get the opportunity to read many types of books in the library and the atmosphere here is peaceful and full of concentration. Separate reading room and reference book are also available here. The behavior of the librarian is cooperative towards the staff. The librarian treats the staff and students alike and also helps in locating books. Library cards are issued to the students for the library and reading facility is also provided in the reading room.

Books are issued to the students from the library for a certain time and after a certain time are deposited back in the library, in this way the books are issued to the students by rotation. The library is like a lifeline for the students. Many types of books are easily available to the students here, which is not possible to be available in the market. Most of the students here come from rural environments and economically weaker sections like scheduled castes, tribes and backward classes, for them the library plays an important role. Various types of materials are also available in the library for different types of research and surveys, which prove to be very useful for the researchers

The college library has about 40500 books which are divided into different sections. There is a separate building of the library building in the college, in which a reading room, a reference room, a computer room and a big hall are available for books. The library also houses the office of the librarian. Students can read different types of newspapers and magazines in the reading room building.

Library autonomous process is ongoing and 20000 books data has been added in LMS (Libsoftware), barcode and issuiing process is underway.

A smart classroom is established, equipped with E-podium, Dedicated 8MBPS BSNL fiber cable lease line, Wi-Fi, LCD projector, LCD Display 52", audience/ display camera, in built speaker, cordless mic, sound mixer, 50 chairs, digital display curtain etc.

Smart board facility is available in four classrooms of the college. These classrooms are used by science faculty for Seminars and workshops.

The admission process of UG and PG in the college is conducted through a transparent online module under supervision of college education department Govt. of Rajasthan. (https://hte.rajasthan.gov.in/department-college-education) Scholarship applications are filled online, and the awarded scholarships are transferred directly to the students' bank accounts.

Absence of students in university examination is recorded online and practical marks of various subjects are also recorded online on the university portal.

The salary bills of the faculty members and all the employees of the college are generated online. All the financial work of the college is done online.

A BSNL broadband connection line has been laid down extending into both blocks are various deportment the bemowith is 50MBPS

There are 20 CCTV cameras which have been installed in both North And south blocks. The main TV Screen is placed in the Principal's Chamber in both campuses of college for Constant observation.

The number of computers in college is 37. Three biometric machines have been installed for monitoring Attendance of teaching and Non teaching staff but after covid digital attendance are suspended.

Notices and circulars are circulated daily by the college to the students, staff and faculty members.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

The college is providing all welfare schemes benefits to their stakeholders through various measures like compulsory GPF/SI deductions. All the teaching and non teaching staff need compulsory opted group insurance. Under group insurance up to 30 lacs life is covered in very nominal charges.

Under the RGHS (Rajasthan Government Health Scheme) facility of Rajasthan government OPD upto 1.00 lakh and 5.00 lakhs for treatment every financial year available to all state employees and pensioners. This limit of medical expenses can be augmented for critical illness through transparent online systems. RGHS facility is also extended to all retired employees.

The state government has opted for old pension schemes instead of NPS for all their employees and provides fixed guaranteed returns to all their employees. All permanent staff of the college benefitted through old pension schemes.

The retirement age is 60 years for all employees as per state government policy. Under the scheme of State government all needy employees can work till age of 65 years with fixed monthly stipend apart from pension.

Our college is an affiliated institution and for the benefit of teachers The "Teacher Welfare Funds" are created at University level and the amount 6% deduction from remuneration of evaluation process paid to teachers for the same.

Rajasthan Service Rules (RSR) are framed by Rajasthan Government for benefits of their employees. RSR are well designed documents which are evaluated and reframed every year as per welfare measures of state government employees. As a part of the Rajasthan Government our college is benefitted by all the provisions of RSR. Under the leave provision all employees in an academic calendar are entitled for various leave benefits as stated below

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Internal financial audit is done at regular intervals throughout the year by the Internal Audit Committee consisting of faculty members of the college. The committee takes up audit tasks such as checking bills, verifying articles from the bills, , ratifying the cash-book entries with bills and vouchers. Thereafter the bills are countersigned by DDO, Drawing and Disbursing Officer of the institute. Internal audit of commodities and stock of various Departments, Laboratories, Store, Students' Union, Girls Hostels, NSS, NCC, Rangering stores is done by faculty members. External audit (physical and financial) of all the funds including Government grant, College Development Committee, UGC, RUSA, etc. is done by the team from the Office of Director, Directorate of Inspection, Government of Rajasthan and AG Office of Central Government (CAG, GoI). The work audit of the allocated fund under RUSA scheme was done by the SPD-RUSA Team from Jaipur, Rajasthan and by nominated teams from SPD-RUSA. Audit of College Development Committee (CDC) accounts is done by Chartered Accountant.

Audit by Directorate of Inspection, Government of Rajasthan and AG Office of Central Government (CAG, GoI) is conducted between 2-5 financial years. The audit for 01-04-2017 to 31-03-2021 was completed by the Directorate of Inspection, Government of Rajasthan on 03.06.2022. Mechanism for settling audit objections – During the audit, if any discrepancies are observed, memos are issued for clarification. These memos are reverted to satisfactory answers. It is incorporated as an audit objection if more clarifications are required. The audit report is drafted and presented by the auditor on the last day of the audit, from the material available in the rough sheets and audit memos. The draft report is discussed with the Head of the Institution and Accounts personnel. The report comprises significant audit findings and other incidental findings related to regularity and propriety aspects. This report also pronounces the progress of settlement of audit findings outstanding from the previous inspection report and lists out the findings that continue to be outstanding. Departmental action is instigated in instances of infringement. The audit report is shared with the Commissioner, College Education, Jaipur for information and further compliance of the report. A progress register of the settlement of local audit reports is maintained separately. Office of the Commissioner, College Education, Jaipur also maintains the record and help in expunging of audit para.

Response:

Title of the Practice:1. Green Campus Clean Campus

Objective

There is no bigger threat to humankind than the threat to its environment. It has endangered our very existence and there is nobody but us to be blamed for the menace. It's high time that concerted efforts are made for conserving our environment. With this view central to its vision, the institute has made numerous efforts to develop a green campusand aware its students regarding environment conservation.

The Context

The concept of Green campus involves the combination of environmental friendly practices and education to promote sustainable and eco-friendly activities in the campus. In order to implement the green campus initiatives, faculty members, students and other employees are motivated for maximum plantation, minimal use of plastic bottles and bags and conservation of energy.

The Practice

Several steps are undertaken for implementation of eco-friendly practices.

- Many gardens like Saraswativatika, Sadbhavna Vatika, Shaheed Bhagat Singh Vatika, Shaheed Chandra Shekhar Azaad Vatika, Udhyaniki Vatika, Bael(Aegle marmelos) Vatika and botanical garden etc. have been developed in both north and south campuses of the college.
- Botanical Garden which allows identification and develops familiarity with plant names. Several Medicinal plants are growing in this garden.
- For the benefit of the agriculture students seasonal Rabi crops like mustard, Wheat etc. are grown which not only lets them learn the process but also gives them a first-hand introduction to various crop varieties.
- Vermiculture and vermicomposting: The faculty of agriculture has developed a vermicompost unit in the college. Students of B.Sc. (Hons.)Agriculture Part IV Semester II participated in this activity in an experimental learning programme (ELP).
- In the agriculture department almost 9 quintals of vermicompost were produced. More importantly the production is not only used for college crops but is also sold commercially.
- Eco Club: For further creating environmental various activities are organised by the club on days like World Environment Day, Earth Day, World Ozone Day and other relevant days. Quiz competitions and lectures are also organised supporting environmental causes.
- Several tours and visits to National Parks, Natural History Museum and other such field studies were organised for students.

Evidence of success

- This has developed a better understanding in students of their role in environmental conservation and were benefited by the awareness programs. Around 9 quintals of vermicompost and crops were produced annually.
- International workshop on A step towards sustainable future: Green hydrogen, entrepreneurship and SDGs was organized.
- National e-workshop was organized on 5th June2023 on environment conservation. Prof. T. I. Khan delivered his talk.
- National webinar on "Environment conservation- Issues and Challenges" poster and model competition and also student's seminar on environmental challenges and issues were organized.

Problems

• In every institution, the Green Campus Program should be considered essential and special funding should be set aside for it. A series of training programs are required for the awareness and implementation of green practices in order to educate more people.

The Practices

- Our college has made all possible efforts to forward our students belonging to SC, ST and OBC and Minorities to become a part of the main social stream of the nation. Many such students receive financial support in different forms.
- Inspire scholarship is also available for promotion of students.
- Institute itself takes several initiatives to penetrate the weaker sections by organising various events in the villages and dwellings of the downtrodden. Development Measures. Several training camps are organised for job oriented purpose.

Department of Information and technology (DOIT), Rajasthan initiated a programme for the establishment of an Incubation cell in the college in the session 2021-2022.

Students were motivated to register through their own SSO ID for Start-up programme and were trained for employment creativity on the current topics like Health ,Education, Agriculture, Road Safety , Water conservation, Waste management etc. 24 students were selected at college level by mentors who presented their projects at incubation cell in Bharatpur zone.
