1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Baba Ganga Das Govt. Girls College, Shahpura (Jaipur) was set up in the year 1997 by the Great saint 1008 Sri Sri Narayan Dasji Maharaj of Triveni Dham in the fond memory of his master's master Sri Ganga Das ji Maharaj to give impetus to women education and women development. The foundation of the college was perceived in view of absence of any girl's college in Shahpura (Jaipur) and the nearby rural areas. This college is sixty four kilometers away from Jaipur (Rajasthan) on Delhi Jaipur National Highway No.8. The girls from nearby villages and Shahpura itself take admission in this college because of its regular and uninterrupted classroom teaching associated with curricular and extracurricular activities. Though the staff of college is small but there are all three Faculties at UG level. Arts Faculty at B.A. level gives a choice of eight optional subjects. English Literature as an optional subject was introduced from the session 2003-2004 under the self financing scheme and psychology was introduced from the session 2011-12. This College was declared the best girls institutions in the Jaipur District in the year 2012-13. The keenness for the assessment and accreditation of the college is due to the fact that the purpose of the institution could be served in better spirit. Besides getting good grades, the college will steadily develop with the financial aid from U.G.C.

The college is set in rural area where people are quite conservative and orthodox and prefer to send their daughters to a Girls College. The girl students would not be allowed to continue their education in absence of a girl's college. Therefore, with the availability of more resources in the college, the women education and women development will receive greater impetus.

The college was set out with four subjects in Arts faculty. Later subjects were added at UG level. In 2010 science and commerce faculty were introduced. Now college running with three PG departments namely Hindi, Political science, Chemistry.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic bank of credits (ABC) is a proposal of NEP2020 which is a very progressive initiative of the government. It has been introduced in session 2023-24 in the government colleges of Rajasthan. Before its implementation we followed the traditional system of annual University exams held for three-year degree courses in the faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce and for the two-year PG courses (Hindi,Political Science and Chemistry) run in the college.

3. Skill development:

The institution is open to conducting a good number of skill development courses. In the session 2019-20 we conducted Beautician Course in collaboration with RSLDC (Rajasthan Skill and Livelihood Development Corporation. It was an implementation of a new scheme initiated by the Chief Minister. The students who enrolled in this course (MMYKY: Mukya Mantri Yuva Kaushal Vikas Yojna) underwent a remarkable transformation in their personality. At the professional front, they are

	performing exceptionally, handling accounts of people and organisations. Many other short term courses such as basic knowledge of computers ,food preservation,bakery,bangles making,pot making ,detergent making, handicraft etcare also conducted regularly in the college .More such courses will indeed shape the future of many students.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The institution belongs to Hindi speaking region. A good knowledge of Sanskrit Language is provided to the students who opt for Sanskrit in UG. Culture is a part of many courses like languages, Sociology, Political Science, Geography. Teaching of culture is incorporated well. The you tube lectures are ample evidence of blended language teaching.

Orientation programs are also conducted basically to apprise the students of the coursed they opt for. They are also made available on the institution website:

Although in its infancy, online teaching methods were adapted by the teachers. The staff is willing to take online teaching to higher levels. The college plans and organizes the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules according to the guidelines provided by the Commissionerate, College Education, Rajasthan. Support structures and systems are available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning. The college makes efforts to ensure students' growth and development in a congenial classroom atmosphere. Students are provided opportunities for academic interactions such as workshops and group discussions which help in interactive and collaborative learning. Digital Library facility is provided to all students as per norms decided by the library committee of the college.

The college takes various steps that complement teaching and learning experiences:

Inter faculty interaction between the students and faculties from various departments are organized. Debate, essay writing, poetry recitation, and poster making competitions are organized to develop creativity skills among students.

Inter disciplinary educational association (IDEA) which imparts value education to students is also organized by the Institution.

Educational tours, excursions and field trips are conducted by the college in order to enhance the knowledge of students.

Technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching:

Computer Lab and internet facility is available in the college. Automated Library facility is available so as to enable students and staff to get access the books they need on a rapid and regular basis.

Faculty members use audio-visual aids to enhance the teaching-learning process. Teachers upload their lecture videos on college YouTube channel. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

The college is affiliated to the University of Rajasthan and students are assessed during the annual examination conducted by the university. The institution thus does not have any direct process of continuous internal evaluation but the college has its own evaluation procedures during academic session to evaluate the learning capacities of its students. In all the subjects where practical exams are part of the curriculum, it is mandatory to submit a practical record that is evaluated and marks are added during the final consolidation of results. Periodical class tests are also conducted on regular basis which help the students in their preparation for the final exam. Teachers, who are in the examination panel of the University render their services in setting the question paper and evaluating answer books. The evaluation process is transparent. The marks are filled in the OMR sheet and complete secrecy is maintained. The assessment work is carried out by the concerned subject faculty in the institution. The evaluation reports are prepared within the stipulated time and communicated to the students in the classroom.

Procedure for Written Exam:

- The time table is displayed on the university website and college notice board accordingly.
- Admit cards are generated online.
- The examination process is looked after by center superintendent and examination cell.
- Invigilation duties are allotted to staff members.
- The answer sheets are distributed room wise along with question papers and attendance sheets by the invigilators.
- After examination, the answer sheets are collected by the invigilators and submitted to the Examination Committee for further process.
- After being packed and sealed the answer books are sent to the university.
- The answer books are evaluated fairly in time and results are declared and displayed on the University website and result & mark sheets are sent to the college.

Procedure for Practical Exams is as follows:

- Preparation of time table and student list by the respective departments.
- Inviting external examiners from university Panel.
- Examination, viva-voce is conducted and marks submitted to university online.
- If there is any discrepancy in the relevant subject paper the students can lodge a complaint which is forwarded by the principal. Necessary action is taken by the university and accordingly there is provision for bonus marks.

At the University level, there is provision for re-evaluation of answer sheets. The students can apply for reevaluation and the college forwards the students' complaint to the university. Students have to apply before the last date. The last date for re-evaluation is announced by the University. If there is any change

in the marks, it is documented on the new mark-sheet issued to the student.

Attainment of program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the Institution in a formal as well as informal manner.

The university curriculum is appropriately framed to attain the programme specific outcomes and incorporate the desired course outcomes. The attainment of various program specific and course outcomes is chiefly evaluated by means of various internal assessments and the Annual University Examinations. The paper pattern of the University Examination incorporates very short answer, short answer as well as the descriptive long answer type questions. While setting the question paper, the questions framed by the paper setters take into account the various expected outcomes. It is worth mentioning that the faculty of the institute plays a pivotal role not only in the setting of question papers but also in the evaluation work of the University examinations.

T.R. is assessed for the results of each programme/course. University-rankings and college merit-lists are standard assessment criteria to assess the outcomes achieved. Students qualifying in competitive examinations NET/REET also reflect the attainment of POs and COs. At the institutional level a variety of evaluating tools are made use of to assess the extent of achievement of the candidate regarding the expected outcomes. The regular assignments, labwork, field trips, educational tours, seminars presented by the student etc. are of immense utility to have a personal understanding of the knowledge, comprehension, applicative, analytical and synthetic abilities of the individual students. The various co-curricular activities, like quiz, group-discussions, debates, extempore, essay writing etc., organized under the aegis of various cells and committees of each individual department and the institution, provide an informal evaluating platform for the skills attained by the scholars.

The basic goal of education is to groom the personality in a holistic manner which becomes evident when the student moves out in the community, serving the society and communicating as a responsible citizen of the nation. Education aims at bringing out the best in an individual, with an inclusion of values and ethics and also enhancing their interpersonal and communication skills. Performance of our students during outreach activities and extension programs, viz. This leads to their holistic development. The main activities conducted in the college under various platforms are listed as under:

- One day/seven days' workshops on various relevant issues in present context.

- Blood donation camp is organised in association with hospital, blood bank.
- NSS adopts villages (Sed Ka Bas, Kumahro ki Basti) and creates awareness about sanitation, literacy and eradication of social evils in the community and winter clothes distribution, Nukkad Natak for women empowerment. Student of our college receive this award for plantation and environment protection. Various Plantations programs has been done by NSS.

- Interactive programs are organised to celebrate birth centenaries of iconic national figures (Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, Swami Vivekananda and Sardar Patel, Pandit Deen Dayal Upadhyaya, Dr. Radha Krishnan etc.) and international days (environment. Women, human rights, constitution etc.)

- During Covid Pandemic: Various measures were taken by the institution including Corona Awareness rallies, Spreading the message of social distancing, Distribution of sanitizers, Masks & Giloy Vati, Vegetable distribution at adopted colonies and neighborhood, organizing Webinars on mental and physical wellbeing.

Field Visit:

The College organizes educational tours and excursions to various places.

- 1.On 2 Feb 2020 all faculty of BGD Govt. Girls College, Shahpura jaipur, organized an educational tour for students to Amity University, Jaipur. A motivational lecturer on "How to Overcome Stress" was organized by the University. Students visited various laboratories such as Bio Technology, Account Section, Geography, Home Science etc. and learned about latest technology.
- 2.On 27 February 2023, the Department of Zoology, BGD Govt. Girls College, Shahpura-Jaipur, organized an educational tour for students to Nahargarh Biological Park, Kukas Jaipur and enriched their knowledge. The students were able to visualize different fauna and their behavioral interactions. The park is an abode for royal Bengal tigers, lions, leopards, fox, black bear, spotted deer, black buck, sambhar deer, Indian gazelle, emu, alligators, crocodiles, wild cat, langurs and a cascade of butterflies which included plain tiger, common rose, peacock pansy, white orange tip, pioneer, oriental glass jewel, Indian palm bob and rounded parrot. The park also contained various species of birds which included peacock, kingfisher, tailor bird, parakeet, pigeon, laughing dove, robin, bulbul, crow and humming bird etc. The trip was an effort to make students aware about wildlife rehabilitation and its protection.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the

faculty and students

Response:

The library caters to the needs of teachers and students by providing access to books and journals. The college has a general library that caters to the needs of the teachers and students alike. There is a separate section for Reference Books. Text books are kept in separate book shelves/almirahs. The books from the General library are issued to the students. The General library functions on all days except Sundays and Government Holidays. There is Book Bank facility to cater exclusively to the needs of the underprivileged students and are issued for one year as the case may be. The departments actively participate in procurement of the latest edition of the books in the library as per the requirement of the teachers. On Departmental recommendations academic journals are also subscribed in the library on individual as well as centralized subscription basis. These journals are made available to faculty members, research scholars and students in the library. At present **Three Journals** are Subscribed in the Library **–Rajasthan Geographical Association, Journal of Commerce and Accounting Research and Sahitya Amrit**. Book exhibitions on campus are organized from time to time to facilitate faculty members to select the books needed for teaching.

The college library has about **13261** books classified and indexed of all the three faculties i.e arts, science and commerce. We have PG in Political Science and Hindi. We issue 2 Books to UG Students and 4 to PG Students. On an average about 25 girls visit the library daily. The library is situated in a separate independent building which includes two reading halls, one reference room and one room with computer facility. The Library is fully Automated since year 2017. The name of Software is "**LIBSOFT**" Software and the version is 9.

Reference service is provided to the student and staff by the librarian. Right information at the right time is provide whenever required by the staff and students.

About 125 books are added every year in the library. On an average 30000.00 amount is spent on the books yearly. Govt. Girls College, Shahpura (Jaipur) is a registered beneficiary of the project National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (N-LIST), which is jointly executed by the e-Shodh Sindhu Consortium, INFLIBNET Centre and the INDEST-AICTE Consortium since the year 2020.

The scheme provides access to e-resources to faculty from colleges and institutions through servers installed at the INFLIBNET Centre. The authorized users from colleges can access e-resources and download articles required by them from the publisher's website through servers at the INFLIBNET Centre. The scheme provides access to more than 6000 +e journals along with back files for 10 years and 97000E-Books.

The institute aims to provide safe and secure environment to girls and arrangements for which are as follows:

A guard has been appointed at the entrance of the college. Every outsider or visitor has to sign the register mentioning his purpose of visit. If the purpose is found reasonable only then he or she is permitted to enter in the campus.

The whole campus is under surveillance. 38 CCTV cameras have been installed at various places like in corridors, stairs and entrance which are controlled from Principal office.

Every year, we organize self-defense programs to train the college girls. A team is called whose members train girls on how to defend themselves in adverse situations by showing demos. In order to spread awareness for the safety and security of girls; we celebrate women's day and daughter's day every year.

The institute organizes workshops/lectures on sexual harassment and safety of girls. The speakers deliver

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lectures to girls on safety and security.
