1. Executive Summary

Government Shakambhar P.G college was established in 1969-1970, by the combined efforts of locals, educationists, public representatives and the state government. The *Nagrik Vikas Samiti* developed complete building with the help of donation collected by them through local people, business men, industrialists etc. 18.9 hectares (118 bigha 5 biswa) was surrendered by local stake holders (Kishan) which was given as gift deed through sub registrar Sambhar (The ,Phulera). This land was than provided by government through local administration (SDO) to Nagrik Vikas Samiti. This college is situated on Phulera Sambhar Road, 80 kms Southwest of the city of Jaipur. This college has long been catering to the need for higher education as one of the most credible institutes in the rural area of the Sambhar Lake.

The college, at present, offers undergraduate courses in 15 subjects and post graduate courses in 08 subjects of arts, commerce and science streams. In short, the Government Shakambhar P.G College, is a co-educational, multi-faculty, affiliated, educational institute of Government of Rajasthan and is operated in a regular shift for students to gain undergraduate and postgraduate degrees.

The college volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council in 2006 for the first cycle and secured B+ grade and, in due course of time, an assessment for the second cycle also secured 'B+' grade in 2016 with a CGPA of 2.53.

The two cycles of accreditation by NAAC prompted the college to identify its quality indices that helped it in growing in all spheres. The institution continually strives to reach the qualitative parameter at par with national standard and to provide an excellent learning ambience to the students. The college attempts to cater to the education-based needs of all sections of the society. The co-curricular and extra curricular achievements of our students always bring laurels to the institution.

CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to University of Rajasthan, Jaipur and the course structure, syllabus and examination schedules etc.are followed as per the decisions of the University academic council. The classes are taken according to the prescribed time-table prepared as per UGC norms. The syllabus is strictly followed. The institute runs according to the academic calendar issued by the Commisioner of college education, Government of Rajasthan. Owing to the presence of elected faculty members in committee of courses, board of studies and academic council, the college, sometimes, gets an opportunity to have a say in the revision of syllabus and other academic modules. The inputs or suggestions received from the stakeholders like student bodies, parents and public representatives are duly forwarded to the appropriate authorities particularly, in case of opening a new subject or up-gradation of undergraduate programme to post graduate level.

The core foundation courses are intended to impart basic language and computer skills. A good range of 15 subjects are offered in three streams of arts, commerce, and science at UG level and 8 subjects at PG level. Around 13 different kinds of elective combinations are offered to the students. Five recognized Ph.D. supervisors in different subjects in arts and commerce streams are available to facilitate the doctoral degree.

Class tests are conducted quarterly to test student's learning level on dealt topics of the concerned unit in the subject-

paper. Seminars on various topics are regularly conducted in PG classes under the supervision of concerned teacher to assess oratory skills other than writing skills. The progress of syllabus covered, and attendance of students are regularly monitored by college/departmental administration in meetings.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The process of admission and promotion to the next class is done by online process in accordance with the policies of the Commissioner of College Education, Government of Rajasthan .The admission processes is completely transparent and as per merit.

Though the method of teaching is largely conventional,now a few U.G and P.G classes are conducted in smart classrooms. Still the process of participative learning and problem-solving approach is duly adopted. The medium of instruction is bi-lingual as per the local needs. Many faculty members use IT tools in their classes and every effort is made to develop the interests of the students in the subject. Practical works and assignments are duly evaluated to identify the weakness of a student. **Follow up sessions** for students with concerned teacher and **Parent Teacher Meetings** are also the platforms available to the college to address student's problem. P.G students make projects and present seminars as a part of training. Feedback from the students help in the evaluation of quality of education . During covid times youtube channel, whatsapp groups and online webinars were extensively used to teach students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college aims to inculcate a flair for innovation and research among our students. University research guides in the college are available in commerce and humanities. The research carried out at the college primarily focuses on the issues related to local relevance. The research efforts of the faculty members are evident from the publications, number of research students/scholars enrolled under them, and academic achievements like authoring books/chapters in book, accomplishment of research projects and participation in international and national conferences. Workshops and webinars are organized to create the research environment for innovative ideas. Field tours, visits of industrial units and research laboratories, excursions etc. are organized for students to imbibe the aptitude for research based on "lab to field".

This is the first govt college to set up Institutions Innovation Council as per norms of Ministery of Education, Government of India, which is continuously working for building entrepreneurship abilities among students. This college has set up a virtual lab in collaboration with IIT Delhi and is the Nodal college.

Every year the college organizes numerous extension and outreach programmes under the aegis of NSS, NCC, Rover /Ranger etc. On many occasions, celebration of days and events are carried out, in tandem, with district administration, health and other government & private agencies. Students work with local communities to create awareness about environment protection, health and hygiene, blood donation etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has its own land holding of ~118 Bigha 05 Biswa (73.78 acre) out of which approximately 48711.48sq. Feet + 6600 sq feet is the constructed area. The main campus has administrative building and blocks of classrooms, library, laboratories, gymnasium, sports room, girls common room, auditorium, reading room.

Right now this Infrastructure is catering the needs of the students though with the inception of NEP more classrooms and Infrastructure would be needed.

Altogether 7 laboratories with required instruments and latest gadgets to conduct the practical classes and research work are available. The college has a rich automated library with Delnet library connection and around 28000 books and about 6 journals and magazines, a bookbank and donated books.

Among the learning resources apart from traditional classrooms and well-equipped laboratories the college has smart classrooms, LCD projectors and computer labs in the category of IT based infrastructure. The college library is also a subscriber of N-list (DELNET) membership. It is specifically beneficial for faculty members in their academic upgradation.

Student Support and Progression

At the time of online admission help desks are created to provide all kinds of support and information related to admission process. The admission fee is nominal for all the classes as per government guidelines. Tuition fee is exempted for girl students and scholarship is given to the students belonging to reserved categories. Various other scholarships and other support is provided to students under various schemes like Inspire ,C.M scholarship, Dev Narayan and Medhavi girls scooty yojna , post matric scholarship . For counselling of students, a designated committee /cell is formed in the college that provides all kinds of counselling to the students, but focus is on academic and career counseling. In addition ,other committees like Student Grievance Redressal Committee, Redressal of Grievances related with Women Harassment, Anti-ragging Committee and Women Cell are, also, at work to address any kind of issues or other problems. There is also Mentor-Mentee system to provide personal counselling to the students. Insurance of the students is also done at the time of admission.

College website, whatsapp groups, online admission and examination portals help students in getting all the required information.

To broaden the general outlook and provide exposure towards career aspects and personality development, various kinds of activities are organized for students. Lectures by resource persons and workshops on various socially relevant topics are organized. Field visits, educational and industrial tours are conducted to broaden their mental horizons. Entrepreneurship workshops and other trainings were organized by YDC, IIC and by other committees . Camps organized by NCC, NSS, Rover/Ranger also intended towards overall development of the students. Literary and cultural activities organized by respective committees provides the platform for pursuing and polishing creative skills and potential talents of students.

Elected members of the student union always extended a helping hand to all.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has a defined organisational structure and IQAC acts as a template between college and stakeholders .

The major policy decisions of the college are taken at the level of higher education department of the Government of Rajasthan. The principal is the head of the institution and responsible for the activities of college. The decentralization of responsibilities is done by making need-based different committees at college level to accomplish the routine work, institutional quality assurance and vision-based goals of college. All committees take their decisions through participation of all members which are further executed with the approval of the principal. It is also worth mentioning that the module of e-governance has been implemented effectively in all areas like administration, finance, student support, planning and execution.

Many of the decisions of the infrastructural development and novel practices are also taken by College Development Committee. The College Development Committee (Mahavidyalay Vikas Samiti; that also works as planning board of college) is registered under Society Act and is comprised of senior faculty members, local government body (Nagar Palika) student leader (President) representatives of district administration and Commissionerate college education Jaipur, elected public representatives like MLA, MP and persons from alumni association or persons of social standing etc. Feedbackof all the stakeholders like members of Mahavidyalay Vikas Samiti, Student Council, parents or alumni that is received in the form of memorandums, meetings, interactions etc. are periodically taken into consideration and the strategic plan of action for development of college is framed and executed accordingly.

E – governance is fully operational in the areas of administration , finance and account , students admission examinations.

As an effective measure of employees, GPF and SI are compulsory deducations. In addition group insurance, RGHS is applicable to all employees of the instituation.

Lady staff get child care leave (up to 730 days in full service period), maternity and paternity leave and other leaves like P.L, HPL, CL, SCL, and study leave.

Transperency of the governance system is managed by pay manager , and getting all the information on online portal for teaching and non teaching staff .

College has a system for internal and external auditing.

2(a): Institutional preparedness for NEP:

As the Government Shakambhar P.G. College Sambhar lake is affiliated to the University of Rajasthan, a state university, the implementation of NEP is the sole prerogative of the university primarily, and of the state govt. at large. The New Education Policy 2020 is to be implemented by the Rajasthan University from the session 2023-2024, for which the University and eventually the college has sufficient capability to cater to the needs and requirements of a smooth and flawless implementation of the policy.

1. Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary:

As National Education Policy aims at transforming India into a vibrant knowledge society, the Rajasthan University has taken appropriate steps and constituted a core committee headed by the Vice Chancellor of the university for the effective implementation of national education policy 2020. The committee is to

formulate a well defined roadmap for implementation of NEP 2020. As the University of Rajasthan offers programs in various disciplines as—Law, Management, Computer Sciences, Social Sciences, Media and Communication, Hotel Management, Life and Basic Sciences, Education, Humanities etc, Govt. College Sambhar lake also follows a multidisciplinary academic structure for programs and courses. The present syllabus structure is planned around various disciplines which makes it conducive for ensuring multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary. Thus, at present it is possible to offer courses drawn from various disciplines as a part of the NEP's inter-disciplinary program structure. The process of classifying courses of various programs as inter disciplinary courses is under process at the university level, the college also looks forward to adopt a flexible approach while introducing multidisciplinary programs as per the NEP. The college can offer inter disciplinary flexible course combinations according to NEP.

2. Skill Development:

The college has created an ecosystem to encourage and develop the carrier relevant skills in the students. Skill development in students is ensured through various programs and projects that are run under the guidelines of the Dept. of College Education, Rajasthan. The college offers certain programs which are specifically aimed at imparting precise skill sets to the students. The college is making immense efforts in providing value based education to the learners, and make them responsible citizens to ensure social justice and empowerment of the vulnerable and underprivileged sections of the society. The college has collaborated with various organizations—ESI Sports India Pvt Ltd., JKL University for skill -based courses. Skill-based projects are regularly given to the students under the IIC, YDC, NSS, NCC, Women's Cell and other academic and co-curricular programs. Skill-based projects are regularly given to the students that cover issues like gender issues, environment and sustainability, human values, and professional ethics. The college has established the Centre for Institutions Innovation Council (IIC) to enhance the professional and entrepreneurship skills in the students. The college also encourages the faculty members to up-scale themselves in the areas of active learning, alternative assessment, lecture design, outcome based education, and hybrid mode of education through various Faculty Development Programs (FDP) that are run at the university and directorate level for faculty to train them in teaching and research techniques.

3. Academic Bank of Credits:

The Academic Bank of Credit concept is yet to be implemented by the university and the state govt. For this purpose, the university has constituted a committee to prepare a path for effective integration of ABC in its academic programs.

4. Appropriate Integration of Indian knowledge System (Teaching in Indian language, culture, using online course):

Various value-added programs are offered in various disciplines, specifically in humanities on Indian languages, Indian knowledge systems, culture and values. Various cultural events are also organized regularly that inevitably incorporates the cultural and social ethos of India, the medium of which is usually the local, vernacular languages. Well known local artists and resource persons are invited to promote local music, art, language, and handicraft through demonstration lectures under the NSS, Rover Ranger, YDC and Women's Cell programs that are conducted or regular bases.

5. Focus on Outcome Based Education (OBE):

As per the university norms the college has already adopted outcome based education for all its programs and courses. Learning outcomes have been appropriately defined at the program level as well as at the course level (POs/PSO). Sufficient measures are being taken to facilitate the attainment of the learning outcomes. This process would further be strengthened and broadened as per the university guidelines after the implementation of NEP 2020.

6. Distance Education/ Online Education:

As the new education policy aims at an overhaulic positive change in the higher education system to overcome the obstacles, constraints hindering the path to equality and diversity, the college is also committed to promote distance and online education through various projects run by various agencies such as the Kota Open University and Indira Gandhi National Open University, Virtual Lab with IIT Delhi, RSLDC etc. During the Covid times the college has effectively adopted the online mode of teaching by creating various YouTube channels and delivering more than 1000 online lectures that are still facilitating and meeting the needs of the students from the remote areas.

The Curriculum:

The College being affiliated to University of Rajasthan Jaipur adheres to the syllabus as prepared and prescribed by the University.

We try to include moral and ethical values in the curriculum and try to provide our best of resources and infrastructure available.

The courses offered in the humanities stream relates to imbibing the concepts of transparency, honesty, accountability, respect for others, hard work, confidentiality, constitutional values, and professional ethics. Subjects like Political Science, Business Administration, English, Hindi, Sanskrit Literature, History, Economics, Geography, go on to cover the elements of professional ethics. The students in Science and Commerce faculty are exposed to learning the latest research findings, thus, creating high standards of professional and ethical requirements in their disciplines. Besides, under the activities of YDC, NSS, Women Cell etc., certain events in which invited lectures, workshops etc. are held with a view to inculcate the values of professional commitment, integrity, leadership, and communication skills. In addition, other programmes like ones related to entrepreneurship developments are also organized to help students learn professional standards.

Gender Sensitization towards gender issues is the need of the hour for our society and it is one of the thrust areas of the working of **WomenCell** in this college.

Women rights and women's contribution to the society are part of curriculum in subjects like History, Political Science, Literature etc. Writings of women authors are included in the courses of Hindi, English, and Sanskrit literature. Their footmark in the subject and emphasis on gender related issues somehow addresses the concerns of gender sensitization

Human Values –Basic human values like truth, love, loyalty, honesty, peace, compassion, and empathy etc. are considered necessary qualities to bring goodness of human beings. Hence, all the courses on Literature and Languages include the human values. Similarly, in Social Sciences, the papers of Economics, Political Science, Business studies, touch upon many chapters putting more emphasis on fundamental rights and basic human values. The compulsory papers of General English, General Hindi, and Environmental Studies for all the students in every faculty of learning, likewise, put anemphasis on similar issues of basic human values.

Anandam is implemented as a part of curriculum since 2018 and students are taught human values by working in community.

Environment and Sustainability - Environmental studies is an integral part of natural sciences like Botany, Zoology and Chemistry. In Botany and Zoology, at least, one paper is based on ecology and environment. Geography and other subjects of social sciences, also, incorporate the chapters on environment.

The paper that is worth special mentioning, here, is a compulsory paper for all students in the first year of undergraduate classes in all the faculties of learning that paper is **Environmental Studies** (*Paryawaran Adhyayan*) and is a compulsory one. The paper is, specially designed to impart awareness towards Environment and Sustainability.

Students are taken to field trips and they have to submit a report on biodiversity.

Learning experiences using ICT tools

The mode of classroom teaching practice is in line with latest methods. In addition to chalk and talk method of teaching, ICT gadgets are used extensively. For qualitative delivery of curriculum, teachers are persuaded to use the ICT tools more substantially in their lecture. Since use of ICT tools enables the person with digital literacy, innovative thinking, effective communication, and high productivity, it is a consistent endeavour of college and IQAC to procure and install more ICT based equipment in classrooms, laboratories, and seminar hall. Almost all the teachers of this college can use it. Innovative practices in addition to the lecture method are adopted to assure and enhance the academic quality. To keep our student and teacher's pace with the changing scenario, library is regularly updated with online resources, DELNET membership is regularly upgraded. Webinars are organised for the students on various topics using ICT. Student's participation in symposium/seminar (conducted by the college & other institutions) is promoted. P.G. students use projector for seminars and presentation. Since COVID-19 outbreak, subject-wise e-contents, videos and assignments for theory and practical prepared by all the faculty members were made available to the students on YouTube channel through teacher-wise playlists and Google Drive of the college and shared their links on the college website. None the less, certain measures to monitor the academic progress of the students, in practice are as follows- Under the directive of Commissioner College Education, Rajasthan a process of quarterly Test has been introduced. A date of the test for each month is decided before hand. Pattern of the question paper is well defined that is duly conveyed in advance to the students. Sometimes the faculty sets up question paper for district level examination as per direction from the Commissionerate of College Education Rajasthan, Jaipur. Faculty members are, further, encouraged to hold surprise class test in their respective classes to assess student's learning level on specific topic in the subject as well as to evaluate their own teaching style. Unless they appear and pass their respective University Examination for students. Unless they appear and pass their respective University Examination, usually held in March-April every year, they will not be eligible to hold the University Degree. For PG students it is mandatory to participate in departmental seminar. They are evaluated based on the presentation performance. It is compulsory to submit the project-report in few subjects and for P.G classes and is considered for assessment. The project-report is assessed by the external examiner during practical exams. In subjects with requirement of practical assessments like chemistry, physics, zoology, botany, maths and geography, the student's records of practical work are submitted, and marks are provided for the records/ fieldwork-reports in practical assessment/examinations as a part of the internal assessment. Mobile numbers of the incharge are provided on the college website for any kind of examination related issues or any other query.

Students have an option of **re-evaluation** if they are not satisfied with the marks awarded inuniversity examination.

Students in the final year of UG/PG degree courses are given a chance to appear in the **Supplementary Examination** which are generally held in September-October in the same year. Inaddition, students are, also, given a chance to improve their marks in 50% papers of previous year examination if they want to Failed students can reappear for exam next year as ex students.

At the college level students can give their complaints, in writing, to the Principal and, if necessary, the same is, immediately, forwarded to the University.

The student's grievances, at college level, are dealt promptly as the students have access to students grievace redressal committee , anti ragging committee and sexual harassement committee. There is a complaint box too where students can drop their complained. UploadAdditionalinformation

At the college level the principal is the head of the institution and holds command over day-to-day functioning of the Institution. The duties and responsibilities are shared among the senior faculty members who are given charges of Establishment section, Accounts section and Academic section to shoulder various administrative responsibilities. The Heads/ In charges of various departments act so by virtue of their seniority and are responsible for the academic activities of the departments. They include important basic activities of the college like, IQAC, UGC committee, scholarships committee, placement and career guidance committee, college beautification committee, RACE, examination committee, legal cell, gender sensitization and women harassment redressel committee, admission committee etc. One senior faculty member is made coordinator, while 01-04 junior faculty members too are in committee for work execution depending on the quantity load of the work, one non-teaching staff and one student representative, if required, one 4th class is also there to help in physical activity. In big activities like organizations of tournaments, seminars etc, student volunteers from NCC, NSS, and games are also taken for the proper management and organization. These subcommittees directly report the progress of the allotted work to the principal, when and where required. It indeed helps to unload the administrative heavy pile of work and proper dissemination of the management decisions. Staff council is also there which is a statuary body of the college, and all teaching faculty are member of staff council. The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/perspective/development plan etc

The organizational set up at the college is instituted as replica of that of any other Government College in Rajasthan. Simply to say that Government College, Sambhar lake is under administrative control of the Commissionerate of College Education, Government of Rajasthan. Therefore, the whole administrative setup of the institution is in line with the organizational structure as framed by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Rajasthan. Major policy decisions regarding the operational part of the Government Colleges of State are taken by the CCE (Commissioner College Education), Jaipur. Nonetheless, the colleges get freedom to create an organizational set up to fit into academic requirements of students.

Policies regarding appointment, service rules etc.- Appointment on gazetted positions is done through selection process of Rajasthan Public Service Commission. The rules regarding appointment, promotion, postings, service matters, leave-rules etc. are regulated through Rajasthan Service Rules. Major policy decisions like organizational setup, admission policy, seats persection, budget for salaries, promotional avenues, administrative chain of command and financial regulations etc. for college are taken at the level of CCE as per the government norms and in auniform manner for all the Government Colleges in the State.


Administrative set up at the College level-Under the leadership of Principal different sections and committees are formed officially to deal with various issues/responsibilities in the college.

Best Practices of College

The college has taken several initiatives for the quality assurance and effective implementation of the curriculum, student support, skill development, academic enrichment, teaching-learning process etc. Two of them have been constant and found out to have a great potential of being practically useful for the welfare of the local community. Both the practices have established many appreciable benchmarks along with awakening of the youth by making them capable, confident and ready for facing life situations and making community conservation efforts linked to to the global climate issue and socioeconomic lives of the locals by awareness for sustainable livelihood means. The details of both the best practices are given below:

I- Best Practice

Title of the Practice:

Providing opportunities to rural youth for channelizing their energy in games and sports.

Objective of the practice

- 1. To channelize the energy of the youth in more fruitful direction.
- 2. To motivate students to make career in the field of games and sports.
- 3. To build confidence in rural youth especially among girls.

4. To develop personality of rural students by inclusion of traits like leadership, self-discipline ,decision –making and healthy life style

Context

The college is situated in the rural area and most of the students belong to nearby villages where infra-structure is poor. Opportunities for personality development are meagre and socio-economic status of students is quite low. There are students who are physically fit but need to channelize their energies in creative works . This healthy practice gives them the opportunity.

We believe that "Healthy mind lies in the healthy body". Sports and games develop a sense of discipline and responsibility in the youth towards community and college as well. College aims to provide right atmosphere to tap and refine the latent talents by connecting them with games and sports.

It increases mental and physical agility and overall fitnessof the body that leads to good health besides developing leadership qualities. It provides

opportunity to shine individually as well as a team member.

The Practice

This college has made its bench mark in the field of games and sports during the last eight years. Students are identified for games and sports and polished by giving training to shine at various competitions. Regular practice in the campus under the bright guidance of our physical training instructor leads to expertise in sports and games . It has contributed consistently in increasing participation of our players at inter collegiate level , state level and representation at inter university tournaments at National level . The students volunteered and developed a play ground by "Shramdaan" and started practicing there for sports.

Our college organizes Inter —collegiate tournaments every year. In last five years it has won **125 medals** in Inter Collegiate. Tournaments - **38 gold** and **65 silver** and **22 bronze** medals in 10 games (individual and teams games). In 2017-2018 it won **15 silver** and **3 bronze** medals. In 2018-2019 it won **1 gold**, **31 silver** and **8 bronze** medals. In 2019-2020 **18 gold**, **17 silver** and **8 bronze** medals were won. In 2021-2022 **19 gold**, **2 silver** and **3 bronze** medals were added in college's cap. The tally of medals display a steep rise in its performances.

Obstacles faced

Most of the students are from rural background and have meagre resources and infrastructure to support them. They have poor transport facility and connectivity to their villages. They are also devoid of healthy diets needed for a sports person. The college does not have a stadium, track or any other ground for field activity.

Scarcity of funding for participating students and organizing sports. There is a need for a good playground.

Impact of practice

In last five Years **153 students** have participated in almost **14 games** at All India Inter University/west zone Inter University/Open National Tournaments. The graph of achievements is consistently rising. In 2017-18 - **28** students participated in which **,4 silver** medals and **1 bronze** medal was won at National games. In 2018-19 - 39 students participated, In 2019-20 - 38 students participated, In 2020-21 - 10 students participated in Open National Tournaments and won **5 gold** medals .In state championship **2 gold** medals were won. In session 2021-22 - **36** students participated in these tournaments.

Our college hosts at least one Inter -Collegiate Tournament every year. In 2017-2018 Kho-Kho (boys & girls) and Kabaddi (boys & girls) were organized in which our teams won silver medals each. In 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 Kho-Kho (boys) Tournaments were held. In these events our team won silver medals .In 2021-2022 Kho-kho (girls) Tournament was hosted by this college. In which our team won gold medal.

In 2019-2020 Arjun Drishti Tournaments were organized by Comissionerate of College Education at District level, Division and State levels. Our Institute organized Tournaments in 6 events at District levels and 2 events at Division levels. We won 69 gold medals at District level and 46 medals at State level. In total 158 medals were won.

The College has a Gymnasium of 16 station. The students and teachers avail the benefits of the gym.

We have a full set of mattress for Wrestling ,Judo and Wushu.

Many students have chosen B.P.Ed as their career.

Now even the local authorities are thinking of making a proper playground for practice of games.

II- Best Practice

1. Title-Efforts for the conservation of Sambhar Salt Lake-A Ramsar Site of India and the local biodiversity

2. Objectives

Since the year 2005, the faculty and students are making Sambhar Lake protection and conservation efforts as a mission in the best possible waywith following objectives:

- 1. To protect the Sambhar Salt lake and study the long-term physical and ecological changes
- 2. To identify, record and compile local fauna and flora, and compare with past records
- 3. To study the impact of lake deterioration on livelihoods of local lake-dependent communities
- 4. To create community awareness for the protection of the lake and for the fauna and flora of its unique ecosystem

3. Context

In the current time, existence of the lake has been threatened due to mushrooming of thousands of illegal/legal salt pans owned by local salt-producers and from the nearby districts, all around the periphery of the lake along with stealing of the brine from the main lake. It is leading to a great decline in populations of the local flora & fauna, specifically flamingos and extinction of bird species. Initially, local people and students were neither ready to accept excessive salt-mining as threat leading to extinction of their only source of income, nor were aware of biodiversity threats. A great need to spread community awareness at the grass-root level and collection of scientific data as a proof was felt by the faculty of the college, and hence, the mission to protect the lake and its ecosystem services. It was planned, designed and implemented in the best possible manner.

4. The Practice

The Sambhar Salt Lake situated locally, is a Ramsar Site with a huge source of salt since British period and is a well-known flamingo-habitatasa major tourist attraction. Unfortunately, the lake has shrunk to the half of its original size during last fifty years

Our college, being a premier institution of the area, take it as an institutional social responsibility to make local communities aware of thealarming changes proving fatal to their economic resource in future and can be saved if they use it sustainably. Faculty of science, despite of its limited resources, is constantly engaged in studying various aspects of the lake, such as, threats to bio-indicators, specifically flamingosby Zoology department(2006-08) and physico-chemical changes of lake water(2007-09) and heavy metals(2008-10) by chemistry department through UGC-sponsored minor projects. Multidisciplinary project on impact of lake deterioration on livelihoods of local communities, water bird studies and digitization of map was funded with Rs 8.20 lakhs by the state forest department (2017-2018). A major project (2020-21) on creation of People's Biodiversity Register (PBR) was funded with Rs 11 lakhs by the Rajasthan State Biodiversity Board to the Botany and Zoology departments. People's Biodiversity Register (PBRs) is indeed, a legal document which gives the legal right to a *gram-panchayat* on village biodiversity for benefit-sharing on collection and use of local biodiversity by outsiders.

We also began our community awareness work at the grass-root level by organizing a special work shop(2016) for the *surpunchs* of peripheral *panchayats* for PBR preparation and its legal monetary benefits(funded by RSBB), trained village youths by organizing workshops(2018)for identification of biodiversity (funded by the state forest department) and trained youth as village assistants in another workshop(2019) for creating PBRs (funded by RSBB).

Every year we distribute pamplets, booklets, posters in villages, organize rallies on biodiversity/ environment day and use local media to make local people aware with the help of science students and NSS volunteers. Our students work with the local branch of "Raksha', an animal welfare and protection group, and also learn bird-protection during *Makar-sakranti*- the festival of kites. UG students are given small projects (as a part of their curriculum)on local biodiversity, conservation values, ecosystem of the lake, satellite wetlands, flamingos & water birds etc. Nature club members are taken to field visits tolocal salt refinery, to the lake and its salt pans, to flamingo hot spotsevery year.

5. Evidence of success

The mission of protecting the lake and its unique ecosystem started firstly with the scientific studies of various aspects viaprojects. The visible impact of our projects are seen in the form of biodiversity conservation awareness in *gram panchayats* and Local administration. Our trained students from these villages are helping as village assistants. The college has become an integral point of local biodiversity conservation awareness to save the ecology of the lake and in turn, saving

the livelihood resource of the local people.

We successfully organized the workshops for making village *surpanchs* aware of biodiversity of the lake, its importance and laws related to make People's Biodiversity Registers at every panchayat. Almost 100 *panchayat* representatives registered and attended the workshop. The then Forest Minister called for the need to conserve biodiversity in the local dialect. Media published the news in a broad way. Likewise, other workshops were also successful.

A project related to socio-economic survey of peripheral villages, and estimation of lake-dependent population is one benchmark task because it gives an idea about the impact of probable extinction of the lake on the survival of the local community in next 50 years. Digitized map of the Sambhar Salt Lake was also made.

Yet, another benchmark project in identifying, compiling and creating PBRs of 22 peripheral village panchayats for the first time in the whole state makes it the first college of the Rajasthan state in such phenomenal best practice.

6. Problems encountered and resources required to implement the practice

It was realized that the real cause of rapid decline of the lake size and its ecology is, the local lake-dependent or salt-producing communities living in the peripheral villages of the lake. Low agricultural production due to scarcity of the water leaves no option but converting the infertile cropland into a salt pan(legally or illegally), and earn the livelihood. To make a visible impact in changing the mindset of the local communities in favour of sustainability of the lake, continued efforts are needed. Strong judiciary system, and a firm policy against illegal salt-miningand strict implementation are urgently required. Financial support is yet another requirement for the community conservation efforts involving college teachers and students

.7. Notes

Every college of the state can identify its local biodiversity, record and compile it and make community efforts to protect and conserve. It is also the best way to compare with the past records to find out extinct species. Rajasthan State Biodiversity Board, Jaipur is a statuary authority to verify and authenticate such data.

- . A few of them may become our future best practices as mentioned below.
- 1. The first government college in Rajasthan state to have Institution's Innovation Council as per norms of Govt of India, the Department of Higher Education, which makes students aware of skill development, patent, start-up related knowledge.
- 2. The first government college in Rajasthan to set up virtual lab in collaboration with IIT, Delhi. Undergraduate students are learning virtual practical exercise of the curriculum in the zoology department like animal dissections, and other experiments.
